

Herner, Robertson to run, opposed by lame duck

Two commissioners in each county of Ohio face the classic political dilemma before Feb. 2. They must wave the scepter or descend from the throne.

The incumbents in Huron County, Arthur F. Herner (R-Monroeville) and Donald Robertson (R-Norwalk), say they'll run again.

And they'll have party opposition.

Mayor Kenneth G. Salisbury of Monroeville, who declined to seek a second four-year term, notified the Huron county board of elections last week that he'll seek nomination by the Republican party for a commissioner.

But which one? Until Secretary of State Ted W. Brown settles a new but remote political law, nobody knows. Not even whether he must declare for one or the other.

Is the law in effect for the May 2 primary? What the law says, or seems to say, is that the commissioners will file for a new term beginning either Jan. 2 or Jan. 3, but not both.

As the Huron county board of elections now interprets the law, Salisbury would be required to file his petition either for the Jan. 2 term or the Jan. 3 term. This means he'll oppose either Herner or Robertson.

WHAT WILL OCCUR IN Richland county is anybody's guess.

The Republican incumbent, Richard McFarland, is a likely candidate to run again.

There are rumors that the Democratic incumbent, Fred J. Tonnenmacher, would like to quit and move to Florida, where he and his wife have just acquired a new home.

JUDGE JAMES J. MAYER, veteran Richland county common pleas judge, seeks another six-year term. He is a Democrat, resides in Shelby and is circulating a nominating petition now.

Lawrence Farley, 43, Monroeville, says he will oppose incumbent Huron County Sheriff John Borcia for the Republican nomination for that office.

A native of Monroeville, he is employed by Suhr Kitchens, Norwalk.

He volunteered for Army service during the Korean conflict. Upon discharge, he worked in Washington several years before returning east.

Married, he is the father of four children.

Can council justify pay raises by proving additional duties?

Can village council justify in writing a contention that two employees are entitled to pay increases exceeding the 5.5 per cent ceiling because additional duties are involved?

If it can -- and it will be called upon to do just that when it meets for the next-to-last time in 1971 in village hall Tuesday night -- William A. Forquer, village administrator, and Mrs. Quentin R. Ream, assistant clerk, will receive \$1,500 and \$700 pay raises, respectively.

Forquer's amounts to 17.6 per cent and Mrs. Ream's to 21.1 per cent.

An opinion delivered by Solicitor Joseph F. Dush is to the effect that the pay raises will not be prevented by the federal freeze if the council can prove each employee is expected to perform additional duties in his current assignment.

When Mrs. Ream's raise was approved by Forquer, he said recommendations deriving from the recent audit of village records by a state examiner will require additional services by Mrs. Ream.

Presumably these can be detailed without much difficulty.

But the council did not say in its action to in-

crease Forquer's salary, which was resisted by two members, Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., and Frank R. Garber, that he is or will be required to perform additional duties.

Reader dislikes salary raises

Sir: Having read about the proposed salary raises for the village administrator and assistant clerk, I can remain silent no longer.

That such an outrageous and unjustified proposal can be passed in council indicates that the local government is neither of nor for the people.

The federal government is run by a system of 'checks and balances'. To some degree this is also true of state and local governments. When a governing body can propose and pass excessive salary hikes, the system of checks and balances is violated. And here is clearly an example of blatant disregard for that system.

It is sad that the village of Plymouth does not need an administrator at the cost of \$10,000 a year. The fact that the incumbent has proven himself 'is no argument' that his salary should be raised a proposed 17.6 per cent. If anything, the fact that he has proven himself after a three month period indicates that he is doing his job and should continue. That is all he is expected to do.

If the council proposes a 21.2 per cent increase for the assistant clerk, the question is not whether or not she deserves it, but rather why she didn't merit a raise last summer when the other salaries were increased. The notion that because she didn't get a raise then, she should get one now belongs in the same category of argument as that famous and discredited slogan: Two wrongs make a right.

Furthermore at a time when the president is arguing to hold prices down and approve wage hikes of 5.5 per cent, these increases are excessive and by no means justified. Perhaps the approving council members feel that more money means better government. I would suggest that given the nature of any government body, none has functioned any better in the presence of more money. Finally, if the council members feel that raises must be handed out, I

offer this solution. Let the councilman who proposed the salary hike for Mr. Forquer (Robert I. Bachrach) and those who approved (Councilmen McEwen, Ramsey and Eichelberry) take up a collection among themselves for the \$1,500 and pay him. And since Mr. Forquer recommended the pay hike for Mrs. Ream, let him take the \$700 out of his pocket and pay her.

That should save the taxpayers \$2,200 and end this proposed foolishness about pay hikes voted on and approved without the consent of the governed. Sincerely yours, Charles D. Bachrach

 Lexington's Minutemen are favored to win the 1972 Johnny Appleseed conference championship and, with a sound victory over perennially strong Class A power St. Peter's under their belts, they lay it on the line tomorrow with Ontario.

If Lexington wins, look for the Purple and Gold to run off with the JAC title. The Warriors are second flight and rate with Loudonville.

Loss of Jim Cutright puts Plymouth in the third flight, together with Clear Fork, which the Big Red tackles on its floor tomorrow, the Colts favored by four, the home court advantage.

On the impression that Crestline has only slightly improved over a poor season last year, this leaves Fredericktown and Crestview to settle the leadership in the second division.

IS PLYMOUTH BIG ENOUGH to rebound with other than Lexington, which has a 6-5 pivotman of experience and with plenty of elbows?

Possibly so. If it can do so consistently, Plymouth can challenge Ontario for second spot and, with a break or two, even scare the Minutemen.

The Big Red has experience and some balance and a crackerjack shooter in John Conley. It also has good average height.

Its coach is new to the varsity assignment but did more than passably well with a reserve squad and if he's given a chance by the grandstand wolves, for the first few games,

at least, should do as well with the big team. But Red fans shouldn't delude themselves: absence of Cutright will be painful. He was a great rebounder, a better than average shot underneath and played the low post adequately.

Coch Bryan Neff will need to get sound performance from the five veterans and a good swing job from Lee Wilkins, a big 6-5 senior who has been slow in maturing.

In addition to Conley, the veterans are Bill Van Wagner, who measures 6-3; Larry Taylor, another 6-3 player; Brad ream, an inch shorter, and Jeff Fazio. There were times last season when Fazio's shooting was something to behold.

Among the 11th graders, Ray Hughes and John Haver appear to be the best of a so-so crop.

Conley and Van Wagner were rated by coaches in the league for second team selection in 1970-

71 and should improve sufficiently, barring injuries, to be candidates for all-conference choice this year.

THE TEAM THAT MAKES fewer mistakes always wins in schoolboy basketball. The one sure formula for winning is never take a shot that won't be made. No team with a 100 per cent shooting average has ever been beaten. But the computer shows that the team making 1.25 points every time it advances the ball can start saving up bus money for a trip to Columbus.

Can Plymouth do this? "We're sure going to try," says Neff. His enthusiasm and optimism are commendable and should not be put down until it is clear he has erred.

This is a good team that can be great if it wants to be. Certainly it cannot blame poor facilities anymore.

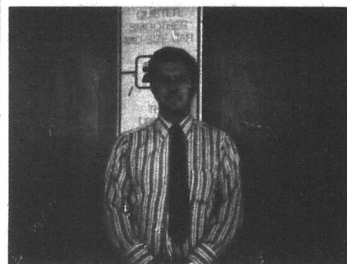
