65-mile winds tip roots, trees

The roofing business took a sharp turn upward here Thursday morning. There was some interruption of municipal power, with which utility personnel sought to cope as they were able.

Subscribers to cable television complained of interruptions and workmen of Continental Cablevision of Ohio, Inc., were here through the mid-evening to restore service. The Ralph D. Reams had earlier been dived out, their chimney by high winds a few days before and were "making do" until warmer weather with a makeshift arrangement, mercifully undamaged.

A. C. Martin, 22, Plymouth, escaped injury Dec. 13 in Route 103 south of Willard.

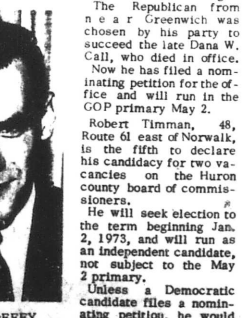

For Her, Happiness Means Involvement

By ENID NEMRY

Eleanor Searle Whitney is rarely what people expect.

The fashionable and wealthy, who are one part of her life, often describe her as "much too attractive to be a missionary."

On the other hand, the hundreds of student organizations, clubs and religious groups to whom she lectures are frequently surprised when she shows up in colored, textured stockings, mid-length skirts and chunky, chic jewelry.

Mrs. Whitney is both attractive and rich (her divorce from Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney in 1958 resulted in a settlement estimated in excess of \$3 million), and she enjoys the advantages those assets provide. She says, however, that the wealth that has freed her from the necessity of earning a living, has also brought certain responsibilities.

"Those to whom much is given, much is expected," she says, explaining her almost full-time involvement in religion and in charitable causes. "It isn't enough to write checks. One must give of oneself. I don't think there should be a life moment in anyone's life these days."

"Mrs. Whitney, who attended more than her share of charity balls, luncheons and theater evenings during her 17-year marriage to the industrialist-sportsman, and is still seen at some of the most glamorous social events of any season, doesn't denigrate these methods of fund-raising. But, she says they are no substitute for personal involvement.

"There are more miserable millionaires in the world than many of the people down there in the flophouses," she said the other day. "People with money are searching for reality, truth and what they call happiness. Involvement can become one of the most exciting, stimulating and rewarding things in life."

Although Mrs. Whitney had been active in charitable causes for many years, her contribution of time as well as money began in a more serious way in the period when she also discovered the meaning of religion. Although she was a sixth generation Lutheran, she became an Episcopalian when she was married to Mr. Whitney.

It was the year before her divorce ("my faith helped me through that") that she met Billy Graham and attended some of his crusades.

"I realized then I had always called

myself a Christian, but I had been a pew warmer," she said. "I used to think good Christians were kooky, far-out, intellectually retarded and socially inhibited."

Since that time, and what she occasionally refers to as her "rebirth," Mrs. Whitney has spent a major part of each year speaking to service and women's groups and participating in campus and religious meetings. The subjects vary, but religion always plays some role.

Her evangelical zeal, she said, is sometimes disconcerting to acquaintances and friends, a varied group that includes people from the musical world in which she was active before her marriage. (She was a concert and opera

singer for a short time after her graduation from Florida Southern College.) "Sometimes I go to parties and people will say, 'Eleanor, what is this kid you are on? Can't you find something better to do? You don't look like a sky pilot!'"

The happiness she prefers to call "inner joy" has made her philosophical about such observations. "Back of that facade and mask we all wear is a gnawing fear, a sense of boredom," she said. "People with money go around bored, and because they are bored, they want more kids. They stop scolding when they have more trouble and can't cope with it."

"Golf all day and bridge all night," she continued. "Can you think of anything more deadly? It's unfortunate that some of these people have the wherewithal to keep seeking instead of having to cope with reality. They keep hoping to find fulfillment flitting from new houses to new husbands."

Her own divorce, she said, forced her to come to a conscious decision about her future.

"The normal desire of any feminine woman is to have a home and husband, warmth, affection and the opportunity to help her husband. When a woman has a great upheaval, she can either rush into the arms of the first available man and think that will solve her loneliness and strife, or she can evaluate the demands on her at the moment."

Mrs. Whitney's demands involved her son, Searle, who is now a 24-year-old graduate student. She took a house in Locust Valley, L.I., near his school, and began rebuilding her life by trying to help others.

She now keeps two secretaries busy with the 100 or more letters she receives each day ("you'd be amazed at the number of young people who write to me with their problems after they've heard me speak at their college"), travels a great deal, very often at her own expense ("my speaking is never contingent on a fee, but if the organization can afford one, I take it and give it to charity") and tries to keep abreast of both friends and fashion when she returns to New York.

"I think everyone enjoys looking at something attractive," she said. "We should all be as attractively dressed as we can be."

"You don't have to be dowdy and poverty-stricken to be a good Christian."

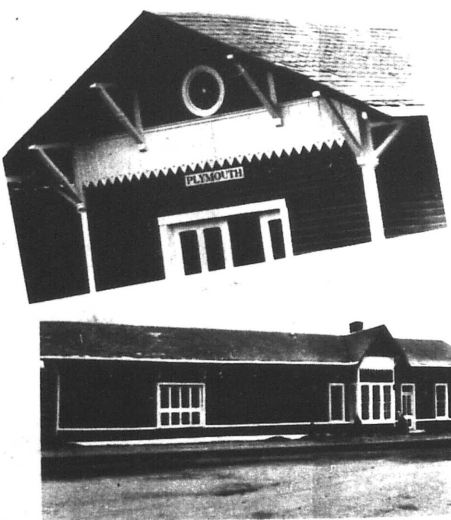
