The board confirmed that increased appropriations of \$200,000 in the teacher salary account will go for salary raises being negotiated now with Plymouth Education association.

Total appropriations for 1971 amount to \$915,862.26, up from \$827,000 last year. The increase amounts to 17 per cent. Projected expenditures amount to \$610 for each pupil enrolled.

Non-certificated employees numbering 39 will also get a raise during 1971. Bus drivers will be paid \$5,000 more, janitors \$5,500 more, other employees \$2,035 more.

Appropriations to cover personal service obligations amount to \$456,350, for supplies \$58,400, for maintenance materials \$2,500, for equipment replacement, including a new school bus \$11,000, for contract and open order service, \$51,000, for fixed charges \$110,300, for contingencies \$17,012, for capital outlay \$9,000, for general fund debt service \$200,26.

Some individual appropriations were raised substantially in anticipation of price adjustments. One of these was tuition to other district, increased by \$2,000 to \$5,000.

RENTAL FEE FOR THE new gymnasium will be \$20, of which \$5 is for the custodian and \$15 to cover out-of-pocket expenses of the board. Fee for the old gymnasium and for that at Shiloh remains at \$6.

Change orders were approved so that new carpeting may be laid on the floor of the high school library, but a new lighting scheme for the old gymnasium, costing \$3,000, was not included.

The Voice of The Advertiser -- Why bids?

Ohio law now requires competitive bidding for contracts that exceed \$1,500.

Legal advertisements stating what will be bought, and when, and under what circumstances, must be published in advance of the date when bids will be received so that the public's rightful interest will be protected.

Exceptions are permitted by law whenever there is a justifiable emergency that will not allow of sufficient time to solicit bids.

This is not a right to be abused.

Those who think that the requirement to advertise bids is a get-rich scheme for newspaper publishers simply ignore the facts.

The first is that the rate for payment for legal notices is set by law; the General Assembly in its wisdom has decided upon a rate that it finds to be fair and equitable for the service performed. No publisher may exceed that rate.

Competitive bidding affords the public a number of advantages, among which are:

1. The lowest price consistent with the quality of goods and/or services to be furnished can be had.

2. Collusion between suppliers and village officials and/or employees can be prevented.

3. A broad spectrum of similar products, types, styles or models of goods can be examined without loss of money that could occur without competitive bidding, for the reason that all who seek to do business with the municipality are urged to display their wares.

4. The public that foots the bill has a right to know with whom the municipality trades, and under what conditions, and to insist upon a performance bond or other surety that the goods or services furnished will be as represented.

The law does not permit a contract that exceeds \$1,500 in its entirety to be broken into two contracts or two billings, to escape the requirement to advertise for bids on purchases exceeding \$1,500.

The custom of the courts in Ohio has been to take the word of the municipality in cases of force majeure -- that is, when a "justifiable emergency" occurs. 'Law and order' is top issue in Shiloh, new mayor says

 Harry Foster hasn't been mayor of Shiloh very long -- he succeeded Marion Hughes Dec. 23, 1970 -- and there was a flood of rumors that he might resign.
 "The rumors were true," Mayor Foster says, "but my wife received so many telephone calls urging me to stay on that I decided to do just that."
 The issue was strict enforcement of the

traffic code and the attitude toward law enforcement manifested by the police chief, Byland Church.
 Foster says Church has in fact been lenient. "He and his men (Kenneth Horton is deputy and Clarence (Joe) Harris serves as part-time deputy) have warned innumerable violators time and again rather than issue a summons on the spot." He cited one occasion when Church and his staff warned about

20 violators over a six-hour period.
 Church deserves more money, the mayor says. "His skill as a policeman and as a man has brought a new and better police department to Shiloh," Foster says.
 For his part, the police chief says the department is well-equipped. The mayor is no more strict that was his predecessor, Church adds. In his own defense, the chief asserts he allows drivers a "cushion" of 10 miles an hour over the limit before he makes an arrest. And as for fines not being low here, he said, "how else are you going to make people remember the law is being kept here?"
 "O. U. R. PRESENT jail," adds Mayor Foster, "was no doubt adequate 40 years ago. But in 1971 it is highly inadequate. To properly deal with cases, we will have to enlarge and improve our jail, if we can find the funds to do it."
 Foster says he ran as a councilman in 1969 because he felt "it was time for a change, the people running this town had let things go for too long, and I knew no one else would do it so I ran for office."
 What achievements can he claim?
 Drainage tile has been installed along the Penn Central right-of-way, to correct high water problems. With former Mayor Hughes' cooperation, weeds were cut and village land was policed. Rest rooms for both males and females at the Little League baseball field have been painted and the refreshment stand painted. The Scout house was "in terrible condition, I started the hall rolling and now it is being used by Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts". The brick pond was crawling with weeds, which were removed. "Everyone in Shiloh

knows raw sewage was dumped into the brick pond. Now it is stopped except when high water forces the valve to open. We're now awaiting word on when tile can be laid to the pond. The state must act first by putting in its tile when Shiloh can put in its own tile. An overflow will be installed and there will be chlorination. Then we may get permission to stock the pond with fish, so people can have a fishing place in the summer. And we hope to get rid of the sewer tiles that drain into the pond. In the long run, we want to use the pond for skating in winter."
 FOSTER COMMENTS the clerk, Mrs. Robert Boock, for efficiency, knowledge of her duties and cooperation, and thinks the attitude of village council "couldn't be better". He praises the fire department and says it is well equipped. "But let's face it, sooner or later a new firehouse will have to be built."
 Policy for the future?
 "To do what's right for Shiloh, if arrests are going to put things right under control and

For Saturday's lunch, you can have a big fruit salad with anything in it and all you want. Dinner is the same as Friday's. Sunday is the traditional chicken day. For lunch,

cold chicken with tomatoes and grapefruit. For dinner, chicken again with tomatoes, grapefruit, carrots, cabbage and beverage.

IF YOU KEEP AT THIS for two weeks, you are supposed to shed 20 pounds, which seems like a lot in such a short period, so a little cheating may not hurt too much.

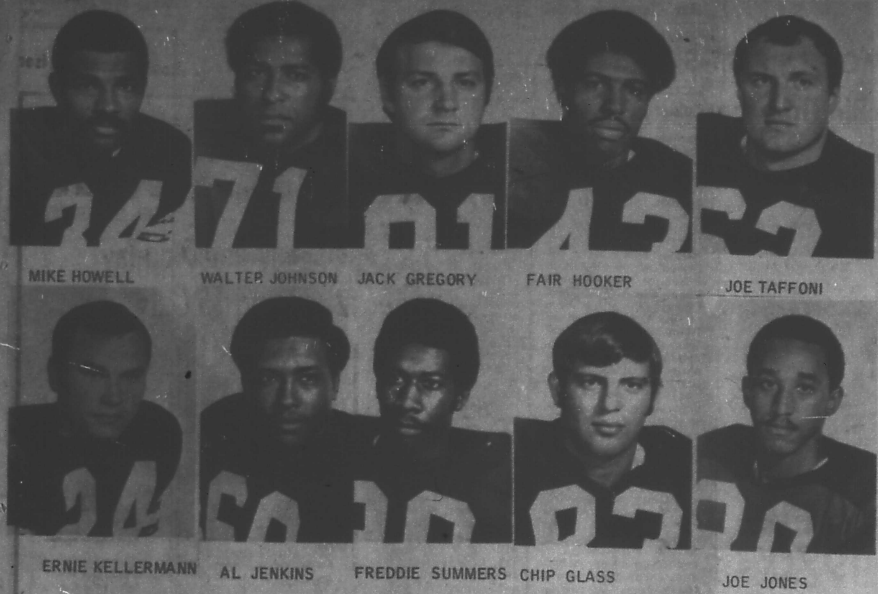
