The Advertiser won first place for news coverage, second place for sports coverage, third place for advertising and women's news and honorable mention for make-up and typography. W. B. Rogers, school of journalism, Ohio State University, judge, in news coverage, said "The Advertiser did the best job with solid Page 1 stories."

Prof. Jay Black, school of journalism, Bowling Green State University, judge, in sports news, said, "The one thing that struck me in this paper's sports coverage was its honesty! The articles and outlines were extremely honest in assessing mistakes of coaches and athletes. Blind loyalty was not a part of this page. Plenty of names and statistics found thorough." "Excellent local-level concept, style lively and attractive overall" was what judges of the Women's page said about The Advertiser.

First place in general excellence went to the Erie County Reporter, Huron. The Willard Times was third place in general excellence in its circulation division, over 2,000 but under 4,000 subscribers.

Biggest tax bill sent by Payne to freeholders

Biggest real estate tax bills in Plymouth's 156-year history were distributed to Richland county taxpayers early this week. Treasurer Charles C. Payne said the total to be collected before Mar. 12 is \$6,815,092. And, he said, he will make a special effort to collect \$998,502 in delinquent real estate taxes, using a new law that empowers the treasurer to take action after one year of delinquency. The old law restrained him from such action before three years of delinquency.

Budget up \$28,751 over record '70 level

An appropriation resolution was approved Tuesday night calling for anticipated expenditures of \$96,765. This is \$28,751.27 more than last year. It is also \$22,405 above anticipated revenues calculated by the Richland county auditor. Mayor Hugh M. Washburn said the increase of water rates and the adjustment of electric meters will produce this additional amount. The auditor was not aware, he stated, that these increases had come about and that last year's revenues, \$130,450 (last year's figure was \$125,672.52); water department, \$42,500; (last year's figure was \$26,022.57); sewers, \$27,300; and general bond retirement, \$6,000 for principal and \$3,360 for interest.

The breakdown is: mayor's salary and expenses, \$1,900; clerk, \$4,600; solicitor \$700; clerk of courts, \$1,000; council, \$1,400 which is a total of \$9,700 for the general government of the village. Other appropriations are police, \$26,750; fire department, \$9,300; assistance to the needy, \$500; parks and playgrounds, \$3,300; planning commission and zoning board, \$2,000; street re-paving and maintenance, \$24,200; transportation facilities and street repair, \$1,600; cemetery, \$10,165; electrical department, \$130,450 (last year's figure was \$125,672.52); water department, \$42,500; (last year's figure was \$26,022.57); sewers, \$27,300; and general bond retirement, \$6,000 for principal and \$3,360 for interest.

Bachrach said the village will have more complete insurance coverage in the future. The difference of charges, from about \$3,200 annually to \$4,200, is the result of higher premiums.

State to force schools into consolidation

Consensus of four leading legislators -- Speaker of the House Charles Kurfess, Sen. Stanley Aronoff, Rep. E. W. Lamson, chairman of the House ways and means committee, and Rep. Richard M. Christiansen, a ranking Democrat -- and of the governor's principal legislative aide, John McDonald, during a conference Friday is that reorganization of local school districts into a single county district, with one board of education and one superintendent, and implementation of the present county school districts into "education resource centers" having regional responsibilities, is the way to solve Ohio's school problems.

only \$7,200 behind each pupil. Thomas Clark, assistant school superintendent in Columbus, told Monroeville Local School district he thinks Huron county ought to have at most two high schools in addition to Norwalk in order to meet the minimum enrollment figure of 300 pupils (and 2,000 in grades K-12). BY THIS STANDARD, Richland county would have only five non-city schools, Madison, Clear Fork, Lexington, Ontario and approximately a consolidation of Plymouth and Cresview, with Lucas to be annexed to an adjoining district, perhaps Clear Fork or Madison.

IF THE STATE comes up with additional financial support for local school districts, both Clark and the legislators seem to feel there will come to be additional state controls: the state will force consolidations as the price of greater support. Where the state would first apply pressure is in granting state funds for housing construction. In its form now is the \$50 in high school-2,000 in district level. Its reasoning is that the cost of building will go up before it comes down. The ability of the small district to fund a building program diminishes with time. If state funds are denied without consolidation, consolidation will result.

"We must await the governor's proposed budget, and he says he won't bring it until the last minute on Mar. 13, the date by law when it must be submitted. And I don't blame him," says Kurfess. Object in eliminating local school districts and establishing of a county district, for tax purposes and for cheaper and more effective administration, is to equalize educational opportunities by applying a single tax base to every pupil in the county. Lamson, a veteran legislator who lives in Ashland county, cites one district in his county where there is \$77,000 behind each pupil (Washington) and an adjoining district where residents drive work at the Chrysler plant there, but dwell in low-cost housing in a neighboring area, there is

"Will it be done in this session? I could hope so, but I can't guarantee anything until I see what the governor has in mind." What's the best advice for the small school district? "If you've got to build, I'd say look around for the soundest consolidation you can find," said one legislator, "and try to make it work. If you don't have to build, start getting your house in order and be thinking about consolidation anyway. Because if it's coming, whether we like it or not, and the timing will depend upon how far the legislature wants to go about providing new funds -- really, what I mean is how far will the people of Ohio go in providing those funds -- and how well we can succeed in telling the people of Ohio a truth they up to now don't want to recognize, which is that real estate taxes are not really very high in this state, not by comparison with other states less wealthy than Ohio."

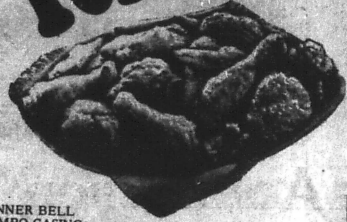

Red trims Freddies, Cougars in league play; record 10-6

Superior rebounding, chiefly by Bill Van Wagner, who took down 19, and by Jim Curtright, with 16, led Plymouth past Fredericktown in a Johnny Appleseed contest here Saturday.

The 64 to 59 victory assured the Big Red of a winning season. It was the 10th success of the year against six losses, five of them in league play. Plymouth ought to have won by a more emphatic margin. It led by six at the half and promptly blew the lead and trailed for a time thereafter.

Two free throws by Van Wagner with 2:40 on the clock in the third period broke a tie at 39 and gave Plymouth a lead it never thereafter forsook.

Fredericktown crept to within six with 1:38 left and was dead at that point. Plymouth did not shoot exceptionally well -- it was 25-for-55 -- but it collected 51 rebounds, 23 more than the visitors, and that was the story.

Fredericktown shot 23-of-64 from the field. The Freddies missed seven free throws, Plymouth eight.
