Population up 9.4% since 1960

Population of Plymouth increased by 9.4 per cent from 1960 to 1970 to 1,993 persons, of whom 171 didn't live here in 1960, the federal decennial census shows.

Of the total of 1,993, 812 dwell in Huron county. The figure increased by 42 in 10 years, or 5.6 per cent, indicating two demographic factors: land values in Huron county tend to be higher and therefore more exclusive and availability of rental properties is lower.

The growth of 171 was chiefly in Richland county, or 129 persons. Population of New Ha-

ven township increased by only 87.

Population of Shiloh advanced by 12.8 per cent, from 724 to 817 persons.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP population amounted in the 1970 census to 8.9 per cent, up from 2,069 to 2,254. Cass township figures were up 10 per cent, from 1,605 to 1,765, and Bloominggrove township population up 10.4 per cent from 922 to 1,118.

Only Tiro and North Fairfield showed decreases.

The Voice of The Advertiser - An ombudsman

Cyrus Eaton is a very rich man. He is sometimes not exactly our dish of tea, but we cannot help but admire his ability to make money and his willingness to express his convictions.

Recently he filed suit in court against a large utility, claiming that damages were due because the utility removed a good number of trees from his property unlawfully.

The judge ruled that Eaton's rights had been invaded. A jury will decide how much redress he shall be paid.

Naturally, no amount of money will restore the trees.

But we are struck by the fact that not everybody similarly offended could afford to seek justice.

Sometimes we tend to agree with those young radicals who amend the pledge of allegiance to the flag by saying "one nation under God, seeking liberty and justice for all."

Once, when we ourselves were involved in action at law, the plaintiffs observed, "Just how much expense can the defendant stand?" They obviously were disgruntled that we sought to reach justice by opposing them. In time, justice was had, at considerable expense, because there were fees to pay the court and to an attorney.

Which is why we believe that the equivalent of the Swedish ombudsman should be adopted in Ohio to insure that every citizen can obtain justice, regardless of the expense, when it appears that justice may be denied him because he lacks funds with which to prosecute his claim.

This is no criticism of the bar. A lawyer is entitled to his fee, whatever it may be, so long as it is fair and equitable. And he should not be expected to litigate every winnable case for his horizon. Many lawyers take cases for plaintiffs who haven't a dime, against whom torts seem outrageous and unconscionable.

But if it is unreasonable to expect every lawyer to so perform, it is likewise unfair to expect any lawyer to so perform.

An ombudsman, or something similar, would assure every Ohioan of at least a fair review of his complaints. In some counties there is a public defender, who serves in criminal cases. It was the justification of civil wrongs that impelled our forefathers to include a declaration of independence. So far as we can tell, there were no persons who distinguished

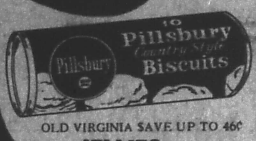
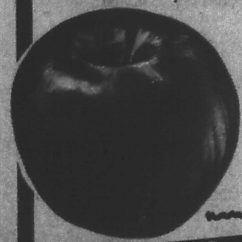

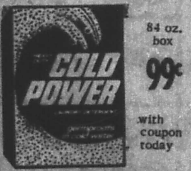
