

# Dump body crushes worker

A 66-year-old part-time village employee was crushed to death by the body of a dump truck in the maintenance shed at Charles Rhine armory Monday at about 1 p. m. Lee Arthur (Bill) Pittenger, New Haven, was found by a co-worker, James Jordan, shortly thereafter. His body was pinned between the chassis and dump body of a village truck. The body had been hoisted and perhaps fell on him when he sought to remove an oil plug.

Jordan summoned police. Auxiliary William Garrett reported to the scene and with the help of Harry Forquer and Councilman Kenneth Echeberry succeeded in raising the body and extricating Pittenger.

Pittenger was rushed to Willard Area hospital where he was dead on arrival of fractures and massive hemorrhages.

A widower since Feb. 28, 1968, he was born in Richland county July 5, 1903, and lived many years near Ganges. He had retired as maintenance employee of Bachman & Castle Co.

He is survived by four sisters, Mrs. Lois Underwood, Greenwich; Mrs. Mary Phillips, Baltimore, Md., and Mrs. Esther McLaughlin and Mrs. Elinor Myers, Shiloh route 2, and a brother, Ross, Ashland.

The Rev. Paul Brown, New Haven United Methodist church, will conduct services today at 2 p. m. from Myers funeral home, Greenwich. Burial will be in Edwards cemetery, Ripley township.

### It's official! Population proclaimed to be 1,993

A somber note crept into Tuesday's session of village council.

Mayor Hugh Washburn expressed his sorrow for the tragedy which took the life of Lee (Bill) Pittenger Monday afternoon.

The mayor reported receipt of an official proclamation from Ted Brown, Secretary of State, fixing the population of the village at 1,993.

Councilman Edward O. Ramsey expressed chagrin, which he said is shared by other council members, that the emergency police schedule was published locally. He said it gave wrongdoers a time

schedule and that the vandalism in the Plymouth Elementary school may have been caused by it.

While Police Chief Robert L. Meiser was recovering from injuries, the department was short hended. Some periods during each 24 hours had no police on duty. Meiser returned to duty this week.

Ramsey also reported he met with federal authorities to inquire about having the Huron river cleaned, from the section which was done with Plymouth's share of disaster funds to the Willard reservoir.

He was given several suggestions of other authorities to solicit and was told the matter would be looked into.

Ramsey said the village's request for \$880 for police equipment will probably be forthcoming this year from funds of the Richland North Central System of Government, an agency to aid law enforcement activities.

The finance committee said it needs time to study the renewal of time deposits of the electric reserve fund, which were to be renewed last month. Councilman Ken Echeberry said four members of the Civil Defense unit and four vol-

unteer firemen attended the arson school in Ashland. He said because of delays on equipment, the new fire telephone system is at a standstill.

A three-year mutual fire protection agreement was signed with the Village of Shiloh.

Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr. said arrangements are being made to chart Greenlawn cemetery with volunteers as soon as weather permits.

Councilman Robert A. McKown asked how she proposed to do the work.

She said the best method is for the sexton to identify each lot and section from the records that exist.

The main problem is there is no accurate record of who is buried within each family plot.

## 4% of housing lacks plumbing: county census

Richland county's official population in the 1970 census was 129,997, up 10.4 per cent from the 1960 figure of 117,761, the Bureau of the Census reports.

Official population of Ohio was 10,652,017, up 9.7 per cent from the 1960 population count, which was 9,706,397.

The 1970 census counted 121,127 white persons in Richland county, 93.2 per cent of the total 8,669 negroes and 201 persons of other races. In 1960, 94.1 per cent of the population was white.

The census showed 11,428 children under 18 years; 35,410 in ages five through 17; 72,190 people 18 through 64, and 10,969 who were 65 and older. The population 14

years and over included 62,434 married people, 6,303 who were widowed, 3,323 divorced and 21,478 never married.

Richland county's 1970 population was classified as 69.6 per cent urban, and 30.4 per cent rural. There were 39,871 households, with 127,010 persons, including 6,210 one-person households. In addition 2,896 persons were living in group quarters.

The 1970 census counted 41,631 housing units in Richland county, 29,006 of them occupied by owners, 10,855 occupied by tenants and 1,760 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 69.7 per cent, compared with

67.7 per cent in 1960. Among single room dwelling units there were 32,638 single family houses, 7,999 housing units in multi-unit buildings and 972 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 6.4, compared with 8.8 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 38,175 had piped water, toilet and bath, while 1,696 lacked some or all plumbing.

The median value of owner-occupied houses in Richland county was \$15,900, compared with \$12,500 in 1960. The median rent for tenants in 1970 was \$77 a month, compared with \$75 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

## Simulator to go 'public'

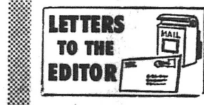

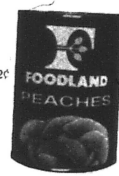

# Study of death class draws NU students

There are really just two things in the whole world any of us can be certain about. Birth and death.

There can be no doubt about either one. Little ones arrive with great frequency and we all know how and why.

Eventually, they (and we, too), which is a disturbing thought) vanish.

As the years come and go, it is a subject that I hardly think about simply because I do not want to. It is nice to think everything will just go on and on, there is still so much to see and do.

But, somehow, the idea is always with us.

Now the subject has become one of the most popular courses offered at New York university. 225 students are now enrolled in the course called "The Meaning of Death".

Dr. James Carse, chairman of the history and literature of the religion department of Washington Square college of the university, is the instructor. He says the enrollment could be doubled and that it is the most popular course he has ever taught.

HE SAYS ITS POPULARITY is because the subject is irresistible and such a mystery that the human mind desires to explore, knowing full well it will still remain an unsolvable mystery.

Dr. Carse feels that each person has his own personal concern with the subject, and that it is the central theme of every religion. As a result his students will have a reading list which covers the world religions.

This whole thing simply amazes me. What is more amazing is that students are the new generation and one would not think that they wouldn't even give a passing thought to what is inevitable. As one said, "You should be able to face death knowing something about it". Perhaps it is our warlike tendencies which make it so darn popular since it gets closer and closer to the younger generation.

Since spring is around the corner (which one, though, is a little hard to say at the moment) you should start planning ahead so you will be able to do all that happy house-cleaning.

Make up a batch of cookies. This recipe makes five dozen, so they should last while you are busy washing curtains and windows.

They are called Coconut Oat Drop cookies.

Start with two and a fourth cups of sifted flour, one teaspoon of salt, half a teaspoon baking powder and soda. Mix and stir in two cups of rolled oats.

In another bowl cream a half cup each of regular shortening and butter, a cup each of white and brown sugar, then add two eggs and two teaspoons of vanilla.

Mix well, gradually add the dry ingredients, then add a cup of chopped up walnuts or pecans and a can of coconut.

Chill for a while, then drop by teaspoonfuls, shaping them roundly as much as possible, on a greased cookie sheet. They can be flattened out a little by pressing them down with a fork.

Bake until lightly brown at 350 degrees.

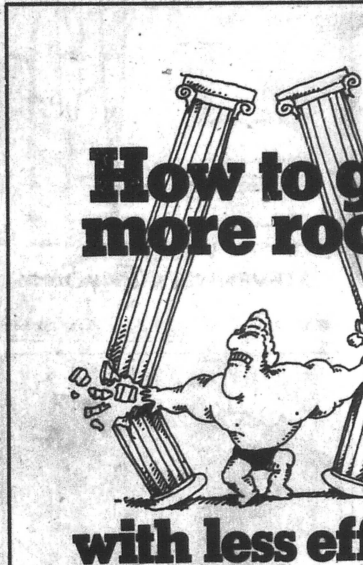

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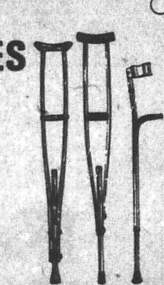
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
