## 'Mr. Shiloh' 72 years, Arlo Firestone dies

Arlo W. Firestone, 98, for 72 years a banker, realtor and insurance agent in Shiloh, died early Saturday in Central Park Nursing and Convalescent home, Allentown, Pa.

Only last week he received a 65-year membership pin issued by the Ohio grand lodge of Freemasonry.

He was a member of Shiloh Lodge 544, F.R.A.M.; of Shelby Chapter, Knights Templar, and of Angelus Chapter 522, O.E.S.

Born near Spencer, May 19, 1872, he forsook a career as a street car conductor in Cleveland to become a clerk in Union Trust Co. there.

When the Cleveland businessmen bought the

Shiloh Savings Bank, he came to Shiloh as secretary-treasurer. He remained an officer and director of the bank for 55 years until it was sold to First National bank of Mansfield Aug. 5, 1954.

Thereafter he served in an advisory capacity to the bank.

He was compelled by law to refuse many applications for loans, notably on farms. But his personal compassion of them prompted him to arrange loans privately.

These gestures not only saved scores of small farmers from bankruptcy but made of the banker an enormously wealthy man.

He was twice married. He was his second wife for 54 years before she died

Sept. 14, 1965.

Until he went to Allentown to live with a daughter, about three years ago, he remained active in real estate and continued to drive an automobile.

He is survived by two sons, Wallace B., Coral Gables, Fla., and Floyd A., Dobbs Ferry, N.Y.; a daughter, Mrs. Paul J. Fink, Allentown, Pa.; five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.
