 His lucky choice was Canoner II. The Yorks now live in Columbus.

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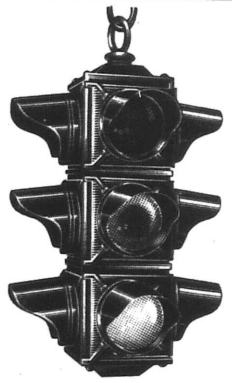

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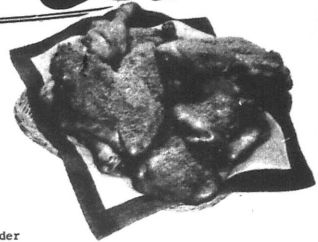

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'Twas Vermonter who first found how stomach digests food

It is beginning to look as if stomachs have become our nation's most popular pastime — either what goes into them or how to get rid of them. And just how many know how the ordinary tummy actually works?

Granted it isn't a very interesting thing to the average person who does not have a scientific outlook about such things, but how it was all discovered is a fascinating story. It all started with a young man, William Beaumont, who had served his medical apprenticeship in Vermont. Back then, just after the War of 1812, you learned by doing rather than listening. He then applied for a job, which he got, as an assistant surgeon in the Army (he also had to enlist to get it, but he got it). His first post was Ft. Mackinac, which was then the center of John Jacob Astor's fur company.

It was quite a gathering place for trappers. After trapping for months in the cold northland, the boys really whooped it up when they got together. That is how a young French Canadian was accidentally shot in the stomach. The young doctor was called to treat the gaping wound.

With kindness — the doctor even allowed the young St. Martin to move into his home so he could continue to treat him — and constant care, the wound began to heal, and this is about where the amazing part began. Beaumont realized that it was healing in such a way because St. Martin refused to submit to an operation to suture the lips of the wound together that a permanent hole would lead into the stomach.

He realized that he could actually watch the digestive process, which in 1825 was barely known. This was the beginning of his experiments of the gastric juices that digest foods.

THIS MUST HAVE BEEN about the time that the young St. Martin took to hooch with a vengeance in his spare time when the doctor was not poking around, inserting pieces of roast beef, then yanking them out to see at what point they were beginning to become digested into the stomach.

He tried all sorts of things, cabbage, pork and hundreds of foodstuffs.

He discovered that bread and cabbage, cooked beef and pork were quite quickly digested. Raw meat was not nor were oily foods. Fish was. These are the things we all know today without studying a working tummy as he did.

EVENTUALLY THE two parted company when the doctor was transferred to Niagara Falls. Being close to home, St. Martin simply vanished in the night to happiness in the woods and no poking doctors. And where, no doubt, he could eat all the fried, greasy things he wanted, like French toast, bacon and fried eggs.

That combination can make a very tasty, quick-when-you-are-tired supper for two. At times is has also been Sunday dinner.

Add to what remains a tablespoon of corn starch mixed with a fourth of a cup of cold water and stir until it thickens. Pour over the chicken.
