Bigger schools?

A business community that is steadily eroding can little afford the loss of trade that will result from a closed lunch hour in the high school.

Nevertheless, the board of education could hardly have done otherwise.

Electors of the school district insisted upon a high school cafeteria when the proposal to expand the building was made. Many of them said then that the cost of feeding a high school pupil in a local restaurant was prohibitive by comparison with the cost in the school cafeteria. To tell them their children could take lunch in the elementary cafeteria was to waste one's time: high school pupils apparently are so spoiled they don't want to walk, or ride a bus in inclement weather, a mere 500 yards to the cafeteria. A Class A luncheon will be served in the high school cafeteria, the hot portions prepared in the elementary school kitchen and fetched to the high school in thermos containers -- at 50 cents a pupil.

Any pupil may carry his lunch or may eat no lunch. But none will be allowed to go home for lunch, not even if he lives next door to the school.

The new system will mean more effort by the school staff. Discipline problems will increase. Pupils who use tobacco must under the new system do without it from 7:45 a. m. to 3:15 p. m. Perhaps there is a good thing, but there are certain to be violations. If the principal deals with the first ones harshly, perhaps the situation can be controlled.

From our standpoint, the only justification for a closed lunch hour is whether a better education can be assured. This and this alone is the only justification for any step the board of education may take.

We are hopeful that the results of a closed lunch hour will be beneficial to the pupils -- it's obvious that an economical, planned and balanced meal at lunch will contribute more to a pupil's well-being than more expensive fried meat, fried potatoes and a carbonated drink -- and not harmful to those of the business community who cater to the demands of the pupils faithfully and, so far as we can see, to the mutual benefit of pupil and restaurateur.

Malainy resigns

Donald Malainy, village administrator, resigned Tuesday night.

His letter said that after four months on the job he found the requirements to demanding for the salary of \$8,500 a year.

An emergency ordinance was passed which eliminates the sewer service charge for water users outside the corporation.

Presented by Councilman Robert A. McKown, the ordinance was passed by five members of the village board.

Robert A. Malainy, Jr., said they feel that water and sewer charges are compatible; that if one was paid, the other should be paid.

Malainy said there may be a state ruling requiring water users to pay the charge. Solicitor Joseph Dush said there is not.

McKown contended it is a useless charge, since it is highly improbable

the village could afford to install a system to serve these households in the future. He estimated to do so would cost another \$300,000.

Right now there are 21 delinquent sewer accounts, five within the corporation and 16 outside. It will be these 16 who will not be billed any longer.

H. E. ORDINANCE, however, does not make any provision for amounts owed the village by the 16 householders. For the most part they are in East street, Plymouth East road and Route 61 north and south residents. Dush said since the sewer charges are billed with water and electricity, those services cannot be disconnected to collect the back sewer bills.

McKown also introduced another ordinance which was approved on its first reading. It prohibits the extension or expansion of village owned, operated or controlled utilities and sewer by the corporate limits.

The ordinance does not apply where services have already been installed outside the village. It provides for emergency services in case of fire or other temporary emergency if so declared by the mayor.

MALAINY REPORTED Carl Beverly has been employed by the village,

mainly for mowing, and that work is progressing on repairing all the mowers.

He also said a number of new poles have been installed and transformers moved to where they will fit by size for the electrical demand.

Controversy arose over payment of legal advertising to the Plymouth Advertiser. The editor, A. L. Paddock, Jr., instituted a suit for payment last week in the Huron county court because the finance committee, Bachrach and McKown, refused to authorize payment.

Bachrach says that because Mrs. Paddock is a member of the council, it is an illegal bill, and constitutes conflict of interest.

The Ohio Revised Code states that if a newspaper exists in a community, the legal advertising of the municipality must be published in it. An attorney-general's opinion says an editor and publisher may serve on a legislative body and still have the legal notices published in papers of ownership.

Mrs. Paddock acts in a capacity which is common and well known as an unpaid, non-owning individual with the paper.

Bachrach accused Dush of being the Paddock's lawyer. He said "both the village and the newspaper

have the same lawyer." Dush immediately demanded an explanation as to why his integrity as a lawyer was being questioned.

Mayor Hugh Washburn then read the summons notice, which said that Paddock is representing himself in the suit.

Councilman Wayne E. Strine moved that no legal advertising be placed in The Advertiser until a court decision is rendered. Dush replied the law requires the legal advertising be published locally. Strine then suggested the Plymouth High school paper be used.

The discussion died at this point.

Mayor Hugh Washburn announced the meeting with the FHA office in Columbus will be Thursday. He is required to attend with Maynard McCadden, the district FHA representative, Eugene Gerken, the engineer, Councilman Edward O. Ramsey and William Fortaker, who is a member of the sewer committee as a non-council member.

The mayor expressed his gratitude to the Bachrach Co. for assisting during the clean-up day with trucks and personnel. It was done at no charge.

Collier issues second half bills

Second half 1970 real-estate tax bills have been mailed, says Harold B. Collier, Huron county treasurer.

The total charge to the treasurer for this half is \$3,266,570.09, including special assessments totaling \$67,565.66. Real-estate tax charge of \$3,179,004.43 includes the June tax and all prior delinquencies.

Bills were mailed a few days earlier than usual on account of the increase in postage of May 16. The treasurer reports a savings of about \$250 by mailing them early. All payments being returned by mail after May 16 must bear the new eight-cent postage.

This merely extends the time for payment to the usual date of June 20, Collier says. Payment will be honored, however, as of June 21 because June 20 is a Sunday.

Two-way radio suggested for village efficiency

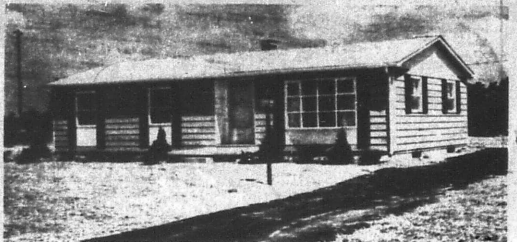

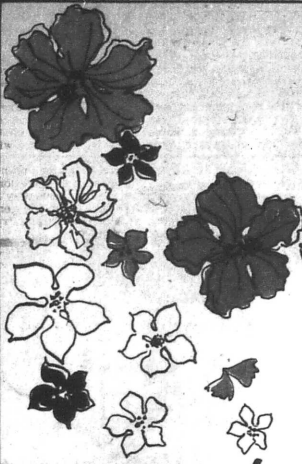

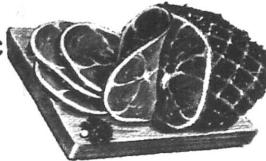
