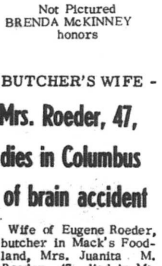

## Solicitor wants record set straight

Solicitor Joseph F. Dush regards a remark by a village councilman as a slur against his professional ethics and he sought satisfaction at the council's session June 1.

He didn't get much, although five of the councilmen were at pains to say the remark by Councilman Robert L. Bachrach was a personal observation and not the consensus of the council.

Dush took offense at Bachrach's statement of May 18 that "the plaintiff (A. L. Paddock, Jr., editor of The Advertiser, who filed suit against the village to recover the money due for legal advertising) and the defendant have the same lawyer".

Dush denied this on May 18. Mayor Hugh W. Washburn read from the summons that Paddock is serving as his own attorney.

The solicitor feels this is insufficient to clear his name and seeks some formal statement in the minutes to the effect that he did not and never has represented a plaintiff against the village.

He acknowledged June 1 that he has represented the editor in preparation of a will and of a bill of sale but in no other instance.

Bachrach declined to withdraw the remark in the June 1 session.

Confusion surrounding the revised traffic pattern in the Public Square was dealt with by emergency ordinance.

It is still not legally possible for a driver eastbound in East Main street who cannot find former street or to proceed in either Trux or East Main streets to Mill or Mulberry streets without a change of direction.

A larger sign is to be installed at the beginning of the parking lane.

Calvin French, a Trux street resident, requested that dirt be put in his back yard to fill holes caused by water going into the catch basin at the rear of his property. He also said that, when it was installed, during repairs made under the disaster fund he had been promised the Bachrach Cattle Co., which owns adjoining property, was to put in a dyke to divert the water from its tile.

This was not done, he said.

McKown said this is a private matter between Bachrach and French. Bachrach told French he had unfortunately built his house on a "water course" and since it was in a "hole" he could expect the waters to run toward it.

The matter is to be investigated by the administrator.

Only when there was a first class blizzard blowing or when the thermometer was hovering around 15 below zero (zero weather was considered very normal for Minnesota winters) did our mothers give us cautions. There was always the dog who needed a walk, which was the big excuse for mothers to use at the time: take him to your grandmother's and do five errands on the way. That is how they got away with it.

Now the big cry is that more and more parking lots are needed in small towns because most people wouldn't think of walking even two blocks to shop.

You wouldn't believe this, probably, but even when we were in high school, walking was "something to do". We would meet on a nearby corner and wander down to the park at the end of the street and even sat and watched the Missionary for a while.

Maybe it is just a fad, but real walking is staying a comeback now. People are taking it very seriously. Not only are they simply going short distances, they are walking in measurements of thousands of miles.

One of the most popular walks has become the Appalachian Trail, which is about 2,200 miles from the north-south, well-maintained trail begins (or ends, depending on which direction you are going) at

Springer mountain in Georgia and goes to Baxter peak in Maine.

Last year eight walked the entire trail. It took a "real" man, five months, but he did it. So far 53 have done the complete trail, but only 33 of them did it in one clip.

What is so amazing is that, for the most part, it has been older people who hiked. Mostly, probably, because they had the leisure to undertake it. Still some have done the hike in sections.

I am not sure how many states have set up hiking paths and it seems to me that it could easily be done so they are within reach of more people. The Appalachian trail must be lovely, especially in the spring, but how many can really reach it conveniently? Granted it is mountainous and scenic, but still each state has its parts which would be interesting to hike through. It just might be a terrific savings to highway departments, installing a trail with rest houses would certainly be cheaper than large strips of four lane concrete. Think what it would do to cut down on air pollution and at the same time keep people healthier!

**MAY BE A LAME** brain idea, but it does have possibilities.

For an experiment, try a walk to your nearest grocery store to see how you like it before you really consider one of a few thousand miles.

For this recipe you need buttermilk which is something most refrigerators do not always have.

Then trot home and start mixing. This is for a rum cake, which is easy to take on picnics because it isn't gooey.

## Mrs. Amburgy, 88, dies at Willard

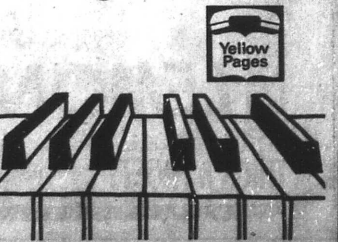
