

Friest who raised \$1 million to build church gets new post

The man who conceived and built St. Joseph's Roman Catholic church is leaving Plymouth.

The Rev. William Conces, who also serves as Roman Catholic chaplain of the Ohio State reformatory at Mansfield, will report to Our Lady of Lourdes Roman Catholic church, Genoa.

His transfer, announced by the Most Rev. John A. Donovan, bishop of the diocese of Toledo, takes effect July 1.

His replacement is the Rev. George M. Koerber, who has been associate pastor of Little Flower Roman Catholic church, Toledo. Father Koerber will also serve as reformatory chaplain.

FATHER CONCES came here in 1951. He found the church as un-duplicated anywhere. Father Conces searched for an unusual design for his new church. This he found in an architectural magazine, which portrayed the work of Edward J. Schultz, a Cincinnati architect, who was given a free hand.

Says Schultz: "The Christian concept of the Trinity was the dominant concept in the design. The plan, triangular shaped, symbolizes three persons in one -- God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, thereby using architecture to bring a gratifying medium between art and religion. The main entrance into the narthex containing the baptismal font expresses the prescription that one enters the church through baptism."

"The triangular plan is practical, as 90 per cent of the congregation is only 20 feet from the sanctuary. The plan coincided with the church addition to become a more intimate part of the church."

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The black marble altar stands before a bronze filigree of panels featuring a fish-shaped cross, the early Christian symbol. Over the altar, on a black crucifix, is a white-wooden figure of Christ. Flanking the altar in side shrines are full-color wooden statues of the Blessed Virgin and the Sacred Heart. Two enormous stained glass windows in the north and south parts of the triangle show the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove emanating rays of light and a giant hand of God symbolizing the act of creation.

Having raised the money by a method which can only be described as unduplicated anywhere, Father Conces searched for an unusual design for his new church. This he found in an architectural magazine, which portrayed the work of Edward J. Schultz, a Cincinnati architect, who was given a free hand.

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Youth, 21, drowns at Norwalk

Grandson of V. L. Suton, New Haven, 21-year-old Max Lee Suton, Monroeville, drowned Sunday at 8:30 a. m. when he tried to retrieve a fishing bobber from Norwalk reservoir.

The youth, with his mother, Mrs. Juanita Suton; his girl friend, Kathy Kessler, and a friend of his mother, Milton Duncuchel, of Monroeville, had spent the night at the reservoir.

Miss Kessler said young Suton drowned about 20 feet from shore. His mother said he was an excellent swimmer. Miss Kessler reported the bobber broke loose from his fishing line. He plunged into the water to retrieve it, reached it, turned toward shore and went under the water. He surfaced and called for help. His arms were thrashing when he went down again.

Cheryl Hokes, Norwalk, was also fishing at the reservoir. Hearing cries for help, she swam to where Suton disappeared but could not find him. Divers searched until the body was recovered at 10:04 a. m.

Young Suton, discharged from military service in October, was employed as a printing press operator at Sandusky. His father, Virgil, Sandusky; a sister, Mrs. Dreauna Dale Brunner, Willard, and another grandfather, G. B. Duckette, Asterville, N. C., also survive.

Two motorcyclists severely hurt in Rt. 61 crash

Ohio sales tax stamp system originated in 1935, when the state was hard pressed for liquid funds. To obtain sales tax revenue at once, without waiting for merchants to remit the stamps due later on, the state sold sales tax stamps to them. They then collected the money from the customer at the point of sale. In effect, the merchants lent the money to the state by buying the stamps in advance.

The redemption feature was added to the tax scheme in 1939, to help in enforcing the law. The notion was that purchasers would demand stamps from the merchants if they were worth something, therefore forcing merchants to support the stamp plan.

As first, redemption began at three per cent of face value of the stamps, which ranged in denomination from one cent to 15 cents. In 1959 this was reduced to two per cent. For most of the time Father Conces was collecting stamps, they were worth three per cent. In 1959, also, the use of stamps in motor vehicle transactions was eliminated and the stamp system ended in January, 1962.

The doughy priest collected about 75 million stamps between July, 1952, and January, 1962. Refunds amounted to \$858,872. Unsolicited cash donations brought the total to \$910,986. Most of the money, clerical help and such were about \$449,000, leaving a net of \$550,000 with which to build the new church and remodel the rectory.

Five youths fined Jail sentence suspended if \$50 fine paid

Five youths were convicted of disorderly conduct in Mayor Hugh W. Washburn's court Thursday night.

Three of them pleaded no contest and two pleaded guilty.

A sixth, who pleaded not guilty, was dismissed when charges were drawn. Police said Roger Richards, Willard, was helping police to quell the disturbance.

Washburn fined each \$50 and costs and sentenced each to 10 days in jail, which sentence was suspended upon payment of the fine. A bench warrant was issued for Patrick Sherman, also involved in the scuffle.

\$280,000 sought from Issue I

A plan to correct traffic bottlenecks at the Square will be submitted to the Huron County Planning commission as the first step in obtaining funds, estimated at \$280,000.

Village Administrator William A. Forquer told village council June 15 the plan calls for an \$80,000 improvement of Brazilian and New streets (by which southbound traffic in Route 61 would be eased past Plymouth Elementary school), a \$60,000 improvement of North and Porter streets and a \$140,000 expenditure in West Broadway from the Baltimore & Ohio railroad west to the village limits.

Funding would come from issue I approved statewide two years ago. Mrs. Wanda Lynch succeeds Mrs. Wayne Gebert as custodian of the village building. She will be paid \$275 an hour when she is assisted by her children and \$2 an hour when she works alone.

Two recent electrical outages, one lasting 40 minutes several weeks ago and another for 20 minutes June 12 night, have occurred. Forquer said June 12th's outage was caused by overloading and blowing a fuse. Councilman Kenneth Echebri reported the water line installed in Millville Ohio Telephone Co. concession stand cost the park board "very little" since Millers' Hardware & Appliances donated 340 feet of pipe and the necessary fittings and the booster club donated a frost-free hydrant.

Councilman Robert I. Bachrach said an official of Northern Ohio Telephone Co. told him the company has applied to the PUCO to raise local rates.

Consensus of the council was it wishes to talk to a company representative before giving any backing to the proposed raise.

ORDINANCE 10 - 71
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING LAWS ON TRAFFIC COMING IN ON ROUTE 603 OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

SECTION 1. All traffic coming West on Route 603 will proceed to the traffic light, as thru traffic; only traffic wishing to park shall enter Main Street and proceed at speeds not to exceed 10 Miles Per Hour. All traffic on Main Street will stop at the stop sign and then yield to all traffic on Sandusky St. This Ordinance shall be and remain in force and effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

SECTION 2. Penalties no less than \$5.00 and not more than \$25.00.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, welfare, and safety and shall go into immediate effect, the reason for this emergency being that the traffic regulations here provided is to protect the lives and health of the people of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

ORDINANCE NO. 8-71
AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, PROVIDING FOR THE EXTENSION OF EXPANSION OF VILLAGE OWNED, OPERATED OR CONTROLLED UTILITIES AND SEWER 2. LETTING ITS CORPORATE LIMITS.

Whereas: The Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, in order to achieve the best protection for its inhabitants and their property and to insure fair and equal treatment to all, deems it expedient and essential to establish a uniform policy governing the expansion or extension of utilities and sewer within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

SECTION 1. It is hereby ordained that no utility or sewer, operated or controlled by the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall be extended beyond the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio. Nor shall any such utilities be sold, bartered, donated or supplied in any manner, to service private persons, corporations or things not situated or permanently located within said corporate boundary.

SECTION 2. Letting be ordained that this ordinance shall have no application in instances where utilities of any nature have previously been extended beyond the corporate limits but shall on and after the date of the enactment hereof, prohibit the extension, enlargement or extension of said facilities presently in existence, maintained and controlled by the Village within its corporate boundary.

SECTION 3. Notwithstanding the provision of the ordinance, utilities may be supplied for use and consumption outside of the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, for fire purposes of fighting and preventing fire and for any emergency, temporary in nature, declared by the Mayor of said village, to exist.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall be and remain in full force and effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
