USPS sets open house here today

Insauguration of the new United States Postal service today will be celebrated in Washington, D. C., and in every post office across the country.

Postmaster Raymond L. Brooks announces the public is invited to visit the local post office today and enjoy the hospitality of the men and women who comprise the new U. S. Postal service.

Dedication ceremonies in Washington will be hosted by Postmaster General Winston Blount. Local guests at the dedication will include members of Congress, former postmasters general, the board of governors of the new Postal service and their wives as well as assistant postmasters general, headquarters personnel and other dignitaries.

Visitors to the post office will be given a souvenir envelope imprinted with the old and new designs of the postal service. This envelope will also be made available in limited numbers as a first day cancellation stamp or as part of an eight cent stamp - by stamping and canceling half of the souvenir envelope. In advance, this will be the first time first day covers have been available in all U. S. post offices.

Conflict of interest opinion sought of attorney general

In service by Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., as a councilman in conflict of interest by reason of the fact that her husband owns and publishes The Advertiser, in which legal notices of the village meet by law be printed?

Rhodes, two teachers quit, six new ones hired

E. Steven Rhodes, principal of Plymouth High School since 1969, resigned June 23.

He will become assistant principal of Fostoria High school.

Two other resignations were accepted by Plymouth Board of Education. Six new teachers were hired.

The board formally declined to seek membership in the prestigious North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. It is understood, although the board did not publicly say so, that a condition of admission would be additional accreditation of the superintendent of his replacement, neither of which the board now contemplates.

Mrs. Thomas Needs, fifth grade teacher in Shiloh Elementary school, resigned because she anticipates confinement.

Mrs. Helen J. Solle, Willard, a 1970 graduate of Calvin college, Grand Rapids, Mich., will teach fourth grade at Plymouth.

Miss Rosalind Patrick,

John C. O'Malley, Cincinnati, a graduate of Green Hills High School and of Miami University in 1971, was hired to succeed Thomas Whitacre, who moved to Belleview schools, as instrumental music teacher.

Roderick C. Brown, a 1971 graduate of Wilmington college who lives in Charleston, was hired to teach junior high industrial arts and social studies.

Miss Sylvia S. Woods, Lucas, who attended Kent State and Ohio State universities before obtaining her degree in 1971 from Mt. Union college, Alliance, will teach third grade at Shiloh.

Miss Opal E. Wise, Loudonville, a 1971 graduate of Bowling Green State university, was hired to teach fifth grade in Plymouth Elementary school.

Mrs. Lana Hoff, bus driver, will be paid \$300 each. Charles Guthrie will receive \$150 as custodian.

Marvin Smedley was hired as cleaner at \$1.90 an hour, retroactive to

June 1. He will receive \$4.10 for the period Aug. 1, 1971, to July 30, 1972.

James Haney was hired to do summer painting at \$2.50 an hour.

Salary index for head bus driver was adjusted from 70 per cent to 67 per cent of the base of \$6,250.

Nancy Reeder, Sherry Shepherd, Richard Baugh, Richard Dyer and Jimmy Beverly will be paid \$1.60 an hour for 24 hours weekly by the Mansfield Neighborhood Youth Corps to serve as summer cleaners.

All sixth graders will be assigned to Shiloh Elementary school next year, by county rule.

All seventh and eighth graders will continue to attend Shiloh Junior High school.

Approval was given to expand pupil parking at the high school by paving the site of the former tennis court. Carl Montgomery, Plymouth route 1, was hired to do the work at \$1,200 for an area measuring 125 x 150 feet.

A delegation from Shiloh was told the board has no intention of selling the school annex there. Shiloh's village council seeks the building to house the fire department.

Supt. John Fazzini reported "more and more pupils are not paying the fees for certain classes and for workbooks". He said three graduates were denied diplomas because they refused to settle up for outstanding fees.

Subscribers to natural gas will pay 17.100 of cent per 1,000 cubic feet more effective July 1, the council was told, owing to increases to the supplier, Columbia Gas of Ohio, Inc.

Boyer complained of injuries but did not seek treatment.

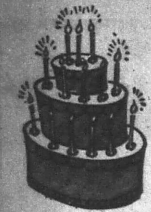
Harris was charged with failure to yield the right-of-way when turning left.

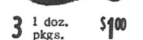

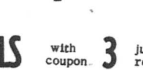
