

Mrs. Paddock, Vandervort enter mayorship race against Washburn

Three candidates seek the mayorship of Plymouth in the Nov. 2 general election. Incumbent Hugh W. Washburn, who succeeded to the post on the resignation of William Fazio, will be opposed by Harry A. Vandervort and Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr. Vandervort has been an unsuccessful candidate for the village clerkship in the past. Mrs. Paddock was defeated once in a race for councilman and then won election to that post, the first woman ever chosen by ballot to be a policy making officer of the village.

She said she is running because so many people have asked me to do so, so that I can try to carry out the program that I promised the voters four years ago, but which the council has stubbornly refused to even debate. WITH THE DEADLINE to file nominating petitions only 13 days away, no one has so far come forward to seek a councilmanic seat. Mrs. Paddock's candidacy for mayor means her chair will be open. The term of Robert A. McKown expires. He is now undecided to be a candidate.

Illness of J. Phillips Moore means that he will not seek election in his own right to the office to which he was appointed to succeed Mrs. Harold Lippus. No one has so far said he will run for clerk-treasurer. Two vacancies will occur on Plymouth Board of Education. Terms of William Rook and John F. Swartz expire Dec. 31. Rook has said he won't run again. Whether Swartz will seek a third term is undecided.

Joseph D. Johnson, Plymouth, is defendant in an action laid in Huron county common pleas court by Huron County Banking Co. to recover \$1,273. Bachrach Co., Plymouth, is defendant in a suit for damages filed in Huron county common pleas court by L. A. Pretz, Weston, seeking judgment of \$20,240. The suit was originally filed in Richland county common pleas court, but Bachrach's attorney, Paul Miller, Norwalk, argued successfully his client has a right to be sued in the county of his domicile. Duane Lee Owens, Shiloh, is defendant in a suit laid in Richland county common pleas court by Vincenz and Grace Hoskins, alleging they received damages amounting to \$25,911 in a collision in Miller road north of London West road.

The Voice of The Advertiser - For growth, proposals

We report today the splendid success of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. in its newest venture, the fabrication of the complete line of Yale trucks of the Eaton Corp. The first truck is assembled and tested and ready to be shipped. Acquisition of this business will mean at least 87 jobs, of which 67 will be absorptions from the foundry that was closed down. That a \$1.4 million order to supply locomotives to a Turkish coal enterprise was received last week means the factory will be at full employment for a least the next year.

When everybody is complaining of soft economic conditions, this is a fine piece of news.

What concerns us is what 20 or 25 new jobs will mean to this community.

Competent research shows that for every 25 new jobs, a town must have two new retail businesses, two new school classrooms, two new teachers, 20 new houses, storage space somewhere for 29 new cars.

Those who fill these jobs won't be ribbon clerks. They must be possessed of technical skills that aren't acquired quickly, or they must show signs of being able to acquire such skills with a minimum of on-the-job training. They will not be marginal people and they won't settle for marginal housing, of which we have a surfeit.

For our part, we want these new people to stay in Plymouth. For too long we have raised crop after crop -- our young people who finish high school -- only to see it sold in another market, thereby depriving us of its civic and economic potential.

Those who may seek these new jobs deserve opportunities to settle here.

Where there is marginal housing available for rent, it must be refurbished so that it is not marginal housing.

Where there is no housing, efforts must be launched to make available attractive sites within the corporation on which these jobholders can erect new housing.

Where the doors of churches, clubs and personal society are closed, these doors must be opened.

The candidates for mayor should be expected to spell out how the village should proceed, at what cost, if any, to the public purse, to accommodate the new as well as to make what we have work most of the time.

These proposals should be brought before the electorate with no delay. The next four years will be critical to the survival of this community. Only by careful management effected by competent managers whose sole interest is the common good, as distinguished from an interest in resolving of special problems of special citizens, can Plymouth expect to endure.

We await these proposals with consuming interest.

Shiloh clerk to get raise to \$2,280

Salary increase for Shiloh's clerk-treasurer, to take effect Jan. 1, was approved by its village council July 14. The pay was raised from \$166 to \$198.34 a month. Ohio law prohibits the raising of the pay of an elected officer during his term of office. Incumbent clerk-treasurer is Mrs. Robert Book, who intends to seek reelection. Pay of the street supervisor was raised \$50 cents an hour to \$3. Fee to obtain electric service will now be \$5, an increase of \$4. Board of public affairs voters will connect electric service Mondays through Fridays from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and Saturdays from 8 a. m. to noon. Weeds must be moved during the June 1-June 15 period and again during the Aug. 1-Aug. 15 period. The village will mow the weeds and bill the property owner. Mrs. J. J. Chihra was appointed by Mayor Grady McDonald to seek help from the Richland County Regional Planning Commission to obtain financial support for the brick-paved recreation area. Nathan Bailey, Sr., owns land in Noble road that will be re-zoned from commercial to industrial to permit establishment of a junk yard there.

F-R-H moves first Yale unit, gets \$1.4 million locomotive order

First unit of the Yale lift truck produced here rolled off the assembly line of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. Thursday and impressed a bevy of executives of Eaton Corp., Banner Corp., and the First National Bank of Mansfield. The construction is the result of an agreement between Banner and Eaton by which the former acquired all manufacturing rights to the entire heavy industrial fork lift trucks, ram trucks and dye positioning trucks for fabrication here.

A small towing tractor used chiefly for towing aircraft is included in the Eaton line. Six of these are in production here now and will be shipped to Chile. The heavier trucks are used in steel plants and other heavy industries in the United States, in the United Kingdom and in West Germany. Eaton Corp. will continue to be sales representative for the truck line and will deal with all matters of service of the vehicles. Part of the new line is assembled in what was for many years the F-R-H foundry. It was closed six weeks ago and converted to accommodate

the truck line and heavy welding. W. ROSS EAMES, vice-president, Eaton Corp., was guest of honor at a special luncheon in two ancient cabooses refurbished by F-R-H for such purposes. He was presented with a specially fabricated patio grill made in the form of a railroad locomotive, his facsimile signature denoting the locomotive as No. 7 in the W. R. Eames railroad. Other guests at the luncheon, of which Miles Christian, executive vice-president and general manager, was host, were James Peacock, Eaton Corp.; Samuel Krasney, chairman, Banner

Corp.; William Barker, president, Banner Corp.; Gordon Colton, executive vice-president, Banner Corp.; Hugh W. Washburn, mayor of Plymouth; Avery C. Hand, Jr., president, First National Bank of Mansfield; Ralph Lemunyon, senior vice-president of the bank; Tip Grimm, Banner Corp.; Marvin Krasney, Banner Corp.; and Dr. C. O. Butner, member of the board of directors of the bank. During the morning, F-R-H announced receipt of a \$1.4 million contract to furnish Diesel hydraulic underground locomotives to Turkish Coal Enterprises, Ankara, Turkey. The locomotives must be completed before July 7, 1972.

Frank Garber appointed to seat on council vacated by Strine

A former Plymouth school teacher, Frank R. Garber, is the fourth new council member to be sworn in during the last two years. He will fill the remaining two and a half years of the term of Wayne E. Strine, who was elected to a four-year term beginning in 1970.

Garber, now an industrial arts teacher in Ashland schools, has lived here since 1952. He has been teaching in Ashland since 1962. He is a graduate of Bowling Green State university, where he received both his bachelor's and master's degrees. He and his wife, Alyce, live in Springmill road. They have one son, Vincent, and four grandchildren.

Garber was sworn into office Thursday by Mayor Hugh W. Washburn and assumed his duties Tuesday night. He will be a member of the building and streets and cemetery committees. The council accepted a petition from four property holders in the neighborhood of Park avenue and Walnut street to vacate an alley which bisects the area. the last couple of generations (and that is most of us) have lost something.

THERE IS A SAYING that there is nothing new under the sun. It can be almost unbelievable at times. Some one, some time, some place has done it before, and now all of a sudden there is a great movement toward more simplicity in living, like the purer foods versus the processed and frozen.

Back in the days when cooks had more time than things to do, they came up with all sorts of lovely things, like preparing rose, violet and mint can still be done.

First, be sure you have not sprayed what you are going to work with. Civilization does have its little drawbacks.
It is quite simple, but does take time. Prepare the petals or leaves by washing well in icy water, drying carefully and spreading them out on a clean paper.

Mix two cups of sugar with one of water and cook until it reaches the soft ball stage. It you have a thermometer, this should be about 240 degrees.
Add petals and leaves, being sure they are completely covered, and bring it to a boil once more.
Take it from the stove and pour into a bowl and let sit overnight.

The next day remove the leaves and petals, stir in another half cup of sugar and cook to the soft ball stage again. Drop the things back in again and let sit another night. Once again, drain the petals and leaves out, heat the syrup up again to the boiling point, and back in goes everything.

By now the syrup will become grainy. This you pour on to paper. After it is quite spread out, you carefully separate each piece so it dries nicely.

Store in a good tin until you are ready to use them. It may take three days to brew this up, but it is worth it. Just think how nice it will be on a blizzard winter day to have a cup of tea with a beautiful little leaf floating on top to give it a flavor.
