## Back sewer bills reduced to one by Forquer

Action by Village Administrator William A. Forquer in enforcing an ordinance permitting termination of water service because sewer bills are delinquent resulted in fury last week -- but Forquer won.

Each delinquent, including a councilman, paid up. Mayor Hugh W. Washburn reported that his court paid \$632.80 into the village treasury for June.

Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., asked that the official minutes record her view that village premises should not in the future be used for money-raising activities.

She referred to an event conducted at the water plant site July 11 to benefit the Ruth Ford Henry Memorial Track fund.

Councilman Robert I. Bachrach admitted he had given permission for the use of the site, in his role as chairman of the utilities committee.

Councilman Robert A. McKown said the village has two choices, to buy the equipment illegally by not advertising for bids and breaking the costs down in various parts so that no one bill will exceed the legal limit of \$1,500 without advertising for bids, which he said had been done in the past, or requesting the school limit its use of electricity until the bids are received legally and the equipment purchased and installed.

The council agreed to follow the prescribed legal method.

Village Administrator William A. Forquer said once the village equipment is installed, it is likely the school will have to change part of its wiring that was not properly installed, and will not coincide with the village facility.

Why this delay should occur now is a puzzle to school officials.

The village says the proper information was not communicated to it in sufficient time for planning and execution to occur.

## High school completion delayed '12 weeks' by lack of transformers

Bids for about \$4,000 in electrical equipment to serve the enlarged Plymouth High school will be sought at once, village council ruled Monday night.

Temporary equipment is now being used. Thomas Baker, electrical department supervisor, thinks it may be about 12 weeks before the equipment will be available for installation. Meanwhile, the school building is not receiving adequate power to serve all its facilities, including the cafeteria, which was to be opened with the building at the beginning of the coming school year.

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School authorities point out that simultaneous notice of new electrical requirements was transmitted at Shiloh and the work was completed in proper time. One of them implies that the question of a "closed" lunch hour, which will prohibit pupils from leaving the high school grounds, is the crux of the matter. "Twelve weeks will take us almost past Christmas," the authority said. "You can sell a heck of a lot of hamburgers and French fries in 12 weeks."

The council agreed to a request of the Fate-Root-Health Co. to use Charles Rhine armory as office space for engineers coming into the company.

The firm wishes to use it for a period of less than a year until its own building is ready for occupancy. The company will pay for utilities and maintenance, all that is allowable under the village's contract with the U. S. Corps of Engineers.

McKown pointed out the office space is desperately needed and that there is the possibility that Impax, Inc., may be moved to another city so that its building can be used. This would be a loss of jobs to the village.

Forquer asked the council to agree to a contract governing his employment. The contract, in accordance with the village pay ordinance and other ordinances which provide for sick leave, vacations and such, also states that he may not be prevented from operating a private business or from procuring employment additional to his position as administrator, including that of sewer inspector, so long as it will not interfere with his efficiency and performance

of his duties as the administrator.

Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., said such a contract is unnecessary since Forquer is protected by existing ordinances and by state laws governing the position.

McKown said it is not unusual for a village to have a contract with an employee and the village in the past has had many such agreements. He also pointed out that the contract states that should Forquer resign, he must give a 30-day notice which, in the long run, will help the village by enabling it to have time to find a replacement.

# Peaches and rum make fine jam

In our wonderful civilization, you can buy just about everything you want; no standing over hot stoves to cook out of pure necessity which even 20 some years ago was done so a family would have enough stored up for winter months. But who can resist the pure joy of doing it to have something special? Start hunting for small-ish jars which you have tucked away here and there all year long. In fact, the smaller the better, because sometimes when some special thing is open, you really only want it for one meal. We have also discovered that the longer a jar is opened, what is in it loses its flavor and simply isn't as good as it should be.

You can try all sorts of different things which you will not find on the grocery store shelves like peach rum jam. This is it.

Two and one-fourth cups prepared fruit (about two pounds fully ripe peaches)

Two tablespoons lemon juice (one lemon)  
One teaspoon ascorbic acid crystals (optional)  
Two teaspoons rum extract

Five cups (two and one-fourth pounds) sugar  
Three-fourths cup water

One box (one and three-fourths ounces) powdered fruit pectin  
Wash, scald and drain containers and lids. Use only containers that have tight-fitting lids. (Or use a automatic dishwasher with really hot, 150 degree or higher, rinse water).

Peel, pit, and grind or chop very fine about two pounds peaches. Measure two and one-fourth cups into a large bowl or pan. Squeeze the juice from one lemon. Add two tablespoons to fruit with ascorbic acid and rum extract.

Thoroughly mix sugar into fruit; set aside. Mix water and fruit pectin in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil and boil one minute, stirring constantly. Stir into fruit. Continue stirring about three minutes. (A few sugar crystals will remain). Ladle quickly into jars. Cover at once with tight lids. Let stand at room temperature until set (may take up to 24 hours); then store in freezer. If jam will be used within two or three weeks, it may

be stored in the refrigerator.

Yield: Six cups, or about six eight-ounce jars.

ANOTHER RECIPE IS for strawberry and banana jam.

Four cups prepared fruit (about one and one-half quarts fully ripe strawberries and three ripe bananas)  
Five cups (two and one-fourth pounds) sugar  
One box (one and three-fourths ounces) powdered fruit pectin

Crush completely, one layer at a time, about one and one-half quarts strawberries.  
Mash three bananas to a fine pulp. Combine fruits and measure four cups into a large saucepan.  
Measure sugar and set aside. Mix fruit pectin into fruit in saucepan. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. Immediately add all sugar and stir to a full rolling boil and boil hard one minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim for five minutes to cool slightly and prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glass jars at once with one-eighth inch hot paraffin.

Yield: Approximately seven medium glasses.
