

Mrs. Paddock blamed

Overnight resulted in failure to bill Continental Cablevision of Ohio, Inc., for use of utility poles, administrator William Forquer told village council Tuesday night.

A sum of \$918.77 is forthcoming from the company, which pays for rental of utility poles for the company's lines.

Forquer said the village does not have a copy of the contract which sets an annual rental fee of \$2.50 each for 191 poles. He discovered the discrepancy after investigating the possibility that several areas of the village not served by the company might receive the facility.

Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., was blamed for the oversight. "She was on the council at the time," he said.

Forquer said he wants

to see the general fund and street fund "out of the red."

Mrs. Paddock said the general fund could save \$75 a month by disengaging the accounting firm hired early in 1970 at the suggestion of Councilman Robert Bachrach to check the village's bookkeeping system. Her motion to that effect died for want of a second. But she allegedly introduced no suitable explanation of what the accountant is supposed to do as ever been offered. She was given none Tuesday night.

The village has a clerk elected to do the accounting and the state auditor's office checks the village's annual reports for accuracy. In fact, a state examining board is now doing routine audit of village records," she said.

Bachrach suggested she

ask the Cleveland accountant just what he is doing. To this she replied that she had done so on several occasions and had received "an evasive reply." Bachrach asserted the state's bookkeeping technique for the village is "not very businesslike and needs re-doing."

COUNCILMAN FRANK R. Garber inquired what responses the village had received from the B&O railroad about repairing the bridge in West Broadway. Forquer said a letter was written to the company but that no answer has been received. Walkways on the bridge are deteriorating badly and are almost unsafe for school children. Forquer said the AC&Y railroad has agreed to allow the village to clean up its right-of-way

through the corporation and it will pay the cost, since the railroad lacks the manpower to do the work.

Forquer reported that Urban Livengood, Jr., is preparing new plans for traffic control in the Square that will comply with state requirements. A meeting is imminent between the highway department and the village to approve the new plans.

The present routing and parking system is only temporary, Forquer said. He also recommended the village consider the purchase of a utility breaker, which the cemetery and other utility departments could share. It would facilitate the digging of graves when the ground is frozen. Cost of the equipment, a little over \$1,300, he suggested, should be paid one third by the cemetery and the remainder divided among other departments.

Police subdue ex-sailor intent on murder, suicide

A 24-year-old unemployed ex-sailor who wants to be a policeman, upset because his estranged wife would not allow him to see their child, held police at bay with a shotgun and a butcher knife at his home at 27 Park avenue for 45 minutes before he surrendered Friday night.

Walter Stover first threatened his father, Richard, an Ohio Power Co. lineman at Willard, with the knife. The elder Stover summoned police. Sergeant Robert Seal responded, they sent for help. Sergeant James Meiser answered. The pair then called the veteran chief of police, Robert L. Meiser. Eventually Willard police and Huron county sheriff's deputies reported to the scene.

One cartridge of tear gas did not convince Stover to lay down his shotgun, with which he threatened to "shoot you all," but Meiser employed "my most important weapons -- calm and conversation" and shortly the two emerged from the house.

But not before Stover threatened to use the butcher knife on himself in a dramatic suicide threat.

Stover was taken to the police station and lodged in the jail.

Meiser said Saturday Stover must respond to a summons in Huron county common pleas court charging non-support. Meiser will discuss with Huron County Prosecutor Bernard W. Freeman what charges to file against Stover as a result of Friday's fracas.

The whole question of prosecution may remain moot.

Young Stover agreed Saturday to be admitted to Tiffin State hospital for observation.

right-of-way within the
Village which is neces-
sary for the aforesaid
improvement shall be
made available therefor.
(b) That the Municipality
will acquire an addi-
tional right-of-way re-
quired for the construc-
tion of the aforesaid im-
provement.

(c) That arrangements
have been or will be made
with and agreements ob-
tained from all public uti-
lity companies whose
lines or structures will
be affected by the said
improvement and said
companies have agreed to
make any and all nec-
essary plant removals or
rearrangements in such
a manner as to be clear
of any construction cal-
led for by the plans of
said improvement and
said companies have ag-
reed to make such nec-
essary rearrangements
immediately after notifi-
cation by said Village or
the Department of High-
ways.

(d) That it is hereby
agreed that the Village
shall at its own expense,
make all rearrangements
of water mains, service
lines, fire hydrants, val-
ves boxes, sanitary sewers
or other municipally own-
ed utilities and/or any ap-
purtenances thereto, wheth-
er inside or outside the
corporate limits as may
be necessary to conform
to the said improvement
and said rearr
