Council moves to install new traffic signals in Square

First steps to improve the traffic signals in Public Square were taken by village council Tuesday night.

A routine ordinance required by the state department of highways was passed. It concerns the traffic signals, which have won approval by the state.

Last year, the state questioned if a traffic signal is necessary. After a local traffic survey and one made by the state, the state now agrees that a signal in the Square at the intersection of Routes 61 and 603 is a necessity.

Three plans for traffic signals are being prepared by Urban Livengood, Jr., village engineer, to be submitted to the state for approval.

The system will be installed with Plymouth's share of issue I funds allocated to Richland county. The village is to receive \$5,000.

Livengood estimates the costs will be broken down thus: \$1,000 for poles,

\$300 for cable box, \$500 for controls, \$720 for eight lights, \$2,000 for labor and construction of islands and \$452 for contingencies, thus making the total just under the \$5,000 earmarked for the project.

It cannot be installed until state approval is gained.

Solicitor Joseph F. Dush advised council to advertise for bids, "since this is one complete project."

Oscar C. Gowlitzka offered the village first chance to buy a plot of ground adjoining Greenlawn cemetery. It contains about six acres.

If the village or the cemetery board is not interested in purchasing the land, he is considering installing a trailer court. He inquired about what would be necessary to comply with village regulations.

'The Drunkard' to close Huron Playhouse season

"The Drunkard, or The Fallen Saved," the most celebrated of the old-time temperance melodramas and America's most enduringly popular play will be the closing show of the 23rd season of the Huron Playhouse.

Complete with musical variety acts, this production will play a five-night run, Aug. 10-14, in the air-conditioned McCormick school auditorium in Ohio street.

Written by W. H. Smith in 1845, "The Drunkard" broke all performance records providing 19th century audiences with heart-rending entertainment as the handsome young hero falls prey to the dangers of Demon Rum. Although audience tastes have changed, "The Drunkard" continues to provide charming entertainment as a replica of an exciting period in the history of the American theatre.

The play depicts the decline and degradation of Edward Middleton, a "dissolute collegian" who falls prey to brandy and whisky, driving his innocent wife and babe from upstate village to city garret, and himself to the Bowery. The villain has, of course, forged a will and driven an innocent witness to Ophelia-like madness. But an ever-loving wife, a devoted brother, and a wealthy philanthropist make vir-

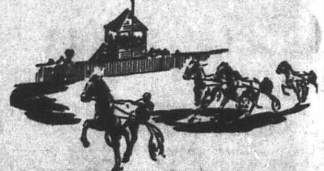
