



# Plymouth whips South Central, 22 to 0

## Three score touchdowns

Plymouth blew past South Central, 22 to 0, there Friday night, showing at times that it can be a fine football team. The Trojans threatened only twice, late in the game. It took an aroused Red defense to throw South Central back from the Plymouth six yard line.

Coach Larry Root was merciful. After his team had the game locked up, he inserted every player save one -- John Conley, the veteran halfback, suited up and almost ready to go, but kept out by his coach to avoid aggravating a painful groin strain.

The visitors set out with a vengeance and stormed 74 yards to the Trojan 16 before losing possession on a fumble, one of three such costly mistakes this humid night. A poor punt that carried only 12 yards from scrimmage gave Plymouth possession at the Trojan 47. But on first down, from the South Central 34, Bill Van Wagner

made his only mistake of the night: he fumbled. Guy Ebinger recovered and another Plymouth threat went by the boards. NO FUMBLE CAN BE forgotten. Some can be forgiven. Van Wagner's is in this category. He carried the ball 11 times for 62 yards and took a pass for another 26 yards. He scored the last point after touchdown on a bull-like slam into the right side of the Trojan line that carried two tacklers into the end zone with him. The clock read 4:55 in the second period when Plymouth got on the board the first time: The Trojan punted 29 yards to the South Central 47. In 10 plays the Big Red was in the end zone. Larry Taylor sneaking in from a yard away. His pass to Jim Cutright, good for 22 yards, carried Plymouth to the Trojan 21.

Taylor rolled out to his left for the PATs. Plymouth was to score the next time it got its hands on the ball. And that wasn't long, either. After Van Wagner kicked off -- and Root has his work cut out for him to improve the kicking game, for neither the kicking off nor the punting was satisfactory -- Rich Dyer smeared Ebinger for one and Tony Amstutz forced a fumble by Ebinger that lost nine to the Trojan 29, where Taylor recovered. TAYLOR PASSED ON second down to Kim Carter, good for 12, sent Ray Hughes, who was to carry 17 times for a net of 71 yards, with a pitch-out for two and then called on Carter. He shot outside left tackle for 15 yards and a second score. The clock read 2:37. Carter's try for PATs was short. Plymouth clearly dominated in the first half. South Central did not advance into Red territory, had a net rushing yardage of minus eight, didn't rack up a first down until only 1:07 remained in the half, and had thrown the ball seven times with three completions for 17 yards. Plymouth, meanwhile, had 10 first downs, 123 yards rushing, 34 yards passing on two completions in four tries. The two lost fumbles cost Plymouth dearly. A third fumble blunted a Plymouth drive in the third period. The Big Red had reached midfield after a 16-yard pass completion to Cutright when another fumble was lost. South Central then made its first penetration of Red territory. Thanks to the splendid running of a skinny freshman, Charley Goodman, who used to be enrolled in Plymouth schools, the Trojans advanced to the Red 10 before running out of downs. Ply-

mouth punted out, very short, to the Red 34 and South Central again drove for a score. On second down, Ebinger's pass for Dan Fidler was deflected. Mike Glorioso nailed it and Plymouth was in business at the Trojan 34. It wasted no time. Taylor took it to a third touchdown in seven plays. There were two minutes 22 seconds left when Hughes belted in from five yards away, he having made 22 in a slant outside left tackle on the previous play.

SOUTH CENTRAL WAS dead thereafter and tried desperately to connect with an aerial to become respectable. Root started some green hands and most of them performed well. There are some names that have been obscure heretofore that will be as familiar as Kilroy before the season is over. Among these are Rich Dyer, Rod Heydinger, Doug Smith, Gary Bisel and Kenny Sexton. Taylor's performance was certainly superior to anything he has shown so far. He still throws the ball with a singular lack of authority, but what counts is that receivers can hang on to them. Van Wagner is a gem and the wonder is that he wasn't used more. Hughes may perhaps be the best all-around athlete Plymouth has ever produced. Score by periods: P 0 14 0 8 -- 22 S 0 0 0 0 -- 0

# Just what has the Plymouth Village Council been doing?

When the present council took office most water meters had not been read -- were unreadable or meters were in need of complete rebuilding. Improvements by way of new water lines and added fire hydrants are some of the new things done by this council to give our community better service. A more specific list of improvements follows below. -- Please read on, --

- Water Department
1. We have made major repairs at the water plant, painted the entire interior including motors, pumps and pipes. Rebuilt filters, rebuilt Zeolite bed, spending approximately eight to ten thousand dollars doing so. Also repaired ceiling, upgraded by installing new furnace, winterized, and improved the quality of the water plus a new water proportioner and a new automatic chlorinator.
  2. We installed approximately one and one half miles of new water lines on Beelman street, school house, Springmill road plus new fire hydrants.
  3. We have finished a new water well, new pumps and are working on the second well to insure ample supply of water in the future.
  4. We removed the old barn and debris at city water plant, hauling 25 loads of junk away.
  5. We conducted a rate survey for water to make the water plant self-supporting.
  6. We revised all water tap fees and hookups to create an equal policy for all users.
  7. We have collected 90% of the delinquent sewer bills and water bills.
  8. We have replaced approximately 200 city water meters.
  9. We enacted legislation which prevents expansion or extension of city water and other services beyond the corporation limits.
- It is recognized that other improvements are needed and these will be accomplished as time and money permit. Next week we will discuss improvements to sewer and streets. All of these items were accomplished by this present council.

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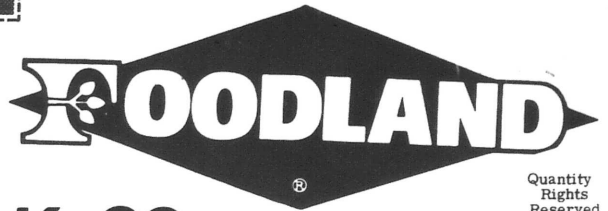
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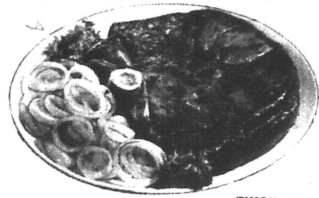
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# Feed football filbert, counsels Auntie, an old TV widow

That season is here again, and it won't go away for months: football on just about every station your television set can reach.

It is a very strenuous time for those bleary-eyed watchers who sit and stare straight ahead, not knowing if it is night or day, rain or shine, outside.

There is nothing more shattering than to have the wrong team win, so the blow has to be softened a little. Nothing helps as much as a tasty peace offering from the kitchen.

Bring out a bag of potato chips and a bowl of a dip.

If you have a blender, mix up a half cup of pecan pieces with a quarter cup of milk and about a teaspoon of salt. Blend this until the nuts are very, very fine; actually you can buy them this way. Then add a cup of cottage cheese and another quarter cup of milk. Mix up really well and serve. The next course can be a helping of rice salad,

which is filling and nourishing.

Cook a cup of rice and cool. Add a half cup of salad dressing with a tablespoon of dry mustard, some salt, a little bit of Worcestershire sauce and a drop of Tabasco, but just one!

Toss the dressing with the rice and a cup of cooked peas, one of cooked, diced carrots, half a cup of finely cut celery and a half cup of pickle relish.

This is for a warm day. Should it be a cold day, then try Chinese fried rice, which is equally as good and nourishing.

Pour enough oil in a skillet to cover the bottom and saute a cup each of chopped celery and onions until they are tender. Add three cups of long grained rice which has been cooked separately, two cups of uncooked sliced mushrooms, a cup of water chestnuts (thinly sliced raw potatoes will do the trick just as well, and cheaper, too!) and three tablespoons of soy sauce. Simmer for about 10 minutes. Stir a little

so it doesn't stick. If you have any leftover pork, chicken or fish, it can be added.

IF YOU START A LEMON roll at half time, it should be ready to eat at the end of the game. It will be a great help to lift any unhappy spirits over the outcome of the score.

Mix four eggs with three fourths of a teaspoon of baking powder and about a quarter teaspoon of salt and beat until pale and thick. Gradually add three-fourths cup of sugar and beat very well with an electric beater.

Fold in carefully three-fourths cup of flour and a teaspoon of lemon juice.

Put mixture in a jelly roll pan that is lined with greased wax paper. Bake at 400 degrees for about 15 minutes. When the cake pulls itself away from the sides of the pan, it is done. roll the cake lengthwise in the wax paper until it cools, then unroll it and spread it with a lemon filling, re-roll, and chill and sprinkle it with powdered sugar.

Any lemon filling recipe

will do and you can even use a package mix.

If you happen to have enough eggs, you can make your own. You need three plus one yolk, a cup of sugar, grated rind and juice of two lemons and a half cup of butter. Cook this all together in a double boiler until thick. This with stirring will take about a half hour, but it is worth it.

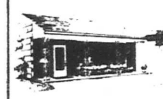

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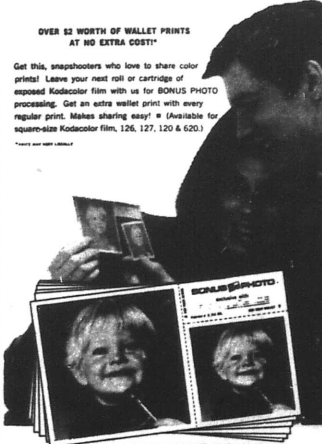
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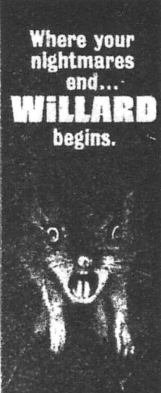
