

## Parents of first graders say size of classes too large

Size of first grade classes in Plymouth Elementary school is too large, four mothers are complained by one father told Plymouth Board of Education Monday night.

They have been working with the teachers as aides to help pupils with their reading. One mother, Mrs. Richard Plymale, said the classes of 32 pupils are simply too large for the teachers to deal with. As an aide, she feels "frustrated" in her efforts to help.

At the beginning of the school year, eight first graders were transferred to Shiloh Elementary school. She suggested they be brought back, another teacher be hired since there is a classroom available, and the present classes trimmed to an easier number to work with.

Mrs. James C. Root said the problem really began last year with a large kindergarten class. Both mothers said these years are extremely important to the child to start its educational experience.

Both Supt. John Fazzini and Principal Herman Workman contended the classes would be just as successful with 32 pupils. Because of an unexpected illness among faculty members, a monthly reading program

has been delayed, but is to be put into effect shortly.

They pointed out it is better to have two really good grade teachers than to take the chance of hiring a third who may not be so adequate.

Mrs. James Will agreed with them.

Fazzini told the parents the school cannot guarantee a child will learn more in a smaller class. He stated it depends upon how mature a child is and if he is ready to learn.

R. Harold Mack, president, said this is the first time the board has been aware of a problem and said it should study it in detail and then make a decision.

The board gave its approval to the Comprehensive Plan for Special Education, an enlarged program initiated by the State Department of Education to provide learning facilities for handicapped, mentally retarded and emotionally and neurologically disturbed.

The district now has 14 per cent of its pupils testing at 80 or below on the intelligence quotient tests. Fazzini pointed out the board that 48 are working with the speech therapist and there are 30 more who should be so assigned

but cannot because of lack of time.

A county inspection of the Shiloh buildings showed they are in reasonably good condition and need a few minor repairs.

Mrs. Jerry Kilgore and Mrs. Robert Wagner were given formal contracts as bus drivers for the kindergarten classes, along with their regular routes. The route takes them each 90 minutes daily. This had to be determined before the contracts could be formalized.

Ivan Hawk, board member, asked Fazzini if they had been paid illegally.

Andrew Adams, Shiloh route 2, was employed on probationary period as night cleaner at the high school to replace David Conley who has found other employment.

Approval was given to Paul McClintock and Jerry Julian to assist the track coach. They will be assigned to the junior high school.

McClintock will start a junior high wrestling program as an intramural sport.

The board will meet with representatives of Plymouth Education Association to negotiate contract terms Nov. 30 at 7:30 a.m. in the high school library.

Fazzini told the board

only two children in the district are attending private schools, one in Shelby and one in Celeryville, and that 542 annually, all the state allows for private transportation, is being paid to each parent.

Joseph Teglavic, president of the high school student council, asked for approval to use the ratings as prepared by the National Catholic Office in choosing a movie to be shown during the Christmas assembly and for the Junior-Senior prom next spring.

He pointed out it is a wider and better selection and is a better guideline to follow.

He mentioned a movie chosen will first be approved by Principal E. Scott Blackburn, who said good judgment must be used so that no pupil is offended by any type of assemblage program.

Mack said "what is best for the most" is a good guideline and said Blackburn's judgment must be relied upon.

## Gerken to get part of fee for sewer work

Village council heard report on progress of Phase III of the sanitary sewer project Nov. 7.

The council also agreed to a part payment of the bill of \$9,468 for the engineering services of Eugene Gerken for work done on Project III of the sewer system.

Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., suggested that the council agree to pay him \$3,468 from the sewer fund. This will be reimbursed when the village sells bonds to finance the upcoming project.

Solicitor Robert A. McKown said that Gerken has received the signed easement of Floys Noble, the last easement needed on the sewer project. He was in question because Noble did not believe he owns the land through which the lateral sewer line in the north side of the Public Square would pass.

The next stumbling block to his signing the easement was that he wished to be assured that his trees and stone wall would not be disturbed. A change of wording in his easement was made. McKown said that Gerken has also approved it.

Noble also wishes to be reimbursed for \$75 of lawyer fees he incurred in Florida. The mayor referred the problem to the finance and sewer committees.

Councilman Edward O. Ramsey suggested pressure be applied to householders to cut trees that endanger village utility lines. A list prepared last year by village employees exists and some of the trees on it have already been cut down. But it appeared to some councilmen to be incomplete. Advice is to be sought from John Kaple on what trees should come down.

# In mud at Norwalk -- St. Paul's 42, Plymouth 6!

St. Paul's blew Plymouth out of the stadium at Norwalk Saturday night with a well-executed first half and administered a sound thrashing to the Big Red, 42 to 6.

Plymouth should have stayed home. It was a miserable night all the way around. There are countless mothers of players who must still lament the tiresome task of extracting the mud of Witney field from uniforms that this season saw only three victories, all of them in Johnny Applesseed conference play.

The Big Red met three teams from the supposedly weaker Firelands conference and lost to all three.

**THE FLYERS STRUCK** early, taking advantage of a Plymouth mistake. Kim Carter's fumble, after he lost 12 yards seeking to pass off the shotgun, was recovered by Mark Schaffer.

After an offside penalty set them back 12 yards, they set them back five yards, the Flyers covered 43 yards with a nifty flat pass from Chuck Hohler to Mike Pusateri. Pusateri outfoxed all the Red defenders and even though the PAT play was a failure, it was child's play thereafter.

Umpire Denizil Long said he was hard put to call all of the offenses in the line play and blamed fighting between themselves in the Plymouth line for the poor performance.

Plymouth penetrated to the Flyer 20 in the next series, only to pick up a major penalty for which here were seven this night, with two refused, and the Big Red couldn't get close enough to equalize it.

**A SECOND FUMBLE** BY Plymouth on the first play

of the second period resulted in a second score for St. Paul's.

Tom Rekart fell on the ball at the Plymouth 25. Tom Bellamy, who was to run up 192 yards rushing, swept left end for the TD.

Rekart ran left end for the PAT's.

St. Paul's scored again in the next series. Fielding a Red punt at its 22, the Norwalk eleven went 78 yards in five plays.

The last one was a slammer, a 73-yard pass-and-run play from Hohler to Doug Coletta. The run for PAT's failed but the damage had been done. Plymouth was never again to be a factor.

After a pass interference penalty against Plymouth gave the Flyers a first down at the Red seven late in the first half, Hohler threw to Norb Gross, a big end, for another score and the Flyers went to the dressing room at halftime with a 28 to 0 lead.

They showed no signs of letting up.

**IN THE FIRST SERIES** of the second half, the Flyers scored yet again.

This one came on a 30-yard shot by Bellamy off left tackle with 8:38 re-  
maining in the third period.

Bellamy poked through right guard for the PAT's. It was a rough game and neither coaches nor officials seemed to be able to keep the players under control. There were two token dismissals, Kim Carter for Plymouth and Dale Rinner for St. Paul's. The way the teams were going, neither loss hurt very much.

Plymouth had its only showing hour late in the third period.

Two 15-yard penalties against the Flyers contributed 30 of the 70 yards necessary to score.

**A 21-YARD PASS** COMPLETION from Ray Hughes to Mike Hamman gave the Big Red first down at the Flyer three.

Even so, it took four plays to get it home, the last one by Rich Dyer, running at fullback in place of the ousted Carter.

Dyer's run for PAT's was short.

The Flyers weren't dead by any means.

They came back for another score before forsaking the game to allow the second and third teams to dirty their uniforms and run up the laundry bill.

After Plymouth kicked off, the Flyers wasted no time. On second down, Pusateri hit left tackle, shook off two tacklers like an angry bear among bees and sped 60 yards for pay dirt.

The run for PAT's was short but the damage was done.

**PLYMOUTH WAS BEATEN** because it did not come to play a game of football. St. Paul's is not all that tough and its coaches admitted as much.

Nevertheless, the game was not without its bright spot, although the knowledge gained comes too late. Ray Hughes is the best punter on the squad, based on performance with a soggy football in heavy mud. He kicked the laces off the ball, a creditable performance under such conditions.

# Time to leave JAC is NOW!

By THE OLD TIMER

The 1972 Johnny Applesed conference football season now a thing of the past.

Ontario won it for the third straight year, continuing the dominance of the "big" schools.

Fredericktown sought to leave the league last year, then opted to stick it out for a while.

Fredericktown now claims to be the smallest school in the conference, measuring by total enrollment in kindergarten through 12th grade. It is a borderline Class AA school and rates well in the computerized standings in its region.

IT'S NO SECRET THAT Fredericktown, with a great football tradition, is unhappy that it can't be first.

When Fredericktown has a great season, such as . . . in football, other larger schools, who have the manpower every year, clinch the title.

Plymouth is the smallest high school in the league, which means a heck of a lot more than Fredericktown's claim to being the smallest school system in the JAC.

Not since the Big Red entered the league has

it been able to challenge for the football crown. Plymouth is competitive in all other sports and indeed, in at least one of them, with absolutely no facilities, ranks among the top three.

The time is long past due when Plymouth should get out of the JAC.

We've argued until we're blue in the face that what ought to be done is to approach Seneca East, the consolidation of Atica and Scioto-Republic, and induce the Eagles to apply together with Plymouth for admission to the Firelands conference.

The advantages to this solution are evident:

1. Ten schools of roughly the same size, all of them Class A save one, Edison, which is just over the line, and all showing roughly the same rate of growth.

2. Distance between schools is far shorter than in the JAC, and over safer roads. Greatest haul in the Firelands conference would be to Black River stadium, a couple of miles beyond Sullivan, straight down U. S. 224.

3. All of the schools are, or soon will be, equipped to play night football save Seneca East, which is beginning in 1973 its first full football season.

4. Only one non-conference football game

need be scheduled and no non-conference basketball games. The basketball season could be a double round robin or a single one, as in the Northern Ohio league.

Minor sport activities are growing. Cross country is taking hold in the FC. Some schools are

playing tennis. All of them play baseball. A few have undertaken golf. All have track and field squads. Some are deep into wrestling.

6. Where rivalries are strong, attendance is equally strong. Witness the standing room only crowd that saw New London and

St. Paul's in the rain a year ago. Monroeville and St. Paul's is always SRO. In fairness to the players and their supporters, a change ought to be made. This change seems the right one to make.
