Township to share cost of operating ambulance

Plymouth township trustees informally agreed to share one quarter of the costs of operating the ambulance service Tuesday night. The arrangement, however, is to be for a trial six month period. By then, both village council and the trustees hope the costs of operating the service will be established. Trustees Paul Stoodr, Virgil Baird and Frank Fenner and their clerk, Joseph Laach, thought this is a fair arrangement, to which Councilman Donald E. Akers also agreed. Tentatively the extent of the service into the township will go just past

Stroup road. From that point on, all agreed, it would be more practical to call the Shelby service. The council hopes to make a similar arrangement with New Haven township to serve the area more or less corresponding to that is served by the Plymouth Fire department. If New Haven agrees to the arrangement, the village will pay half for its share. Persons seeking the service in the townships will pay the same rates as in the village.

Borgia spent \$1,387 to win his reelection

Sheriff John Borgia spent \$1,387 in his successful campaign for reelection as chief law enforcement officer in Huron county, he said in a sworn statement to the county board of elections. Incumbent Probate and Juvenile Judge Russell T. Antrim spent \$180. Three candidates said they spent nothing. These are Kenneth G. Kirk, Democratic aspirant for county clerk of courts; Urban C. Livengood, Sr., unopposed for county engineer, and Phillip M. White, Jr., unopposed for county court judge.

Seven youths held in drug raid here

Seven persons, including two females, one of them a juvenile, were arrested here Saturday after a narcotics raid at 49 1/2 Dix street at 9:55 p. m. Plymouth police, assisted by the chief and two officers of the Willard department, executed a search warrant issued by Huron County Judge Phillip M. White, Jr., on application of Chief Robert L. Meiser. They found disposable syringes, several small bottles of pills, at least

two bags of what they believe to be marijuana, one pipe and other pieces of evidence. The apartment, part of the former house of the late David E. Scarsfield at the southwest corner of Sandusky street and Dix street, had been under surveillance for several weeks, police said. The first occasion for such surveillance was a routine complaint by a neighbor that cars belonging to its occupants were illegally parked.

A stakeout in an adjoining house was established by local police some hours before the raid. One officer said he saw 'unmatured conduct' by at least one of the females. Charged with frequenting a house in which drugs were found, and taken to Huron county jail, the accused are: Pamela Irelan, 18, Pine Grove Trailer court, Plymouth route 1; John Thompson, 20, Ft. Wayne, Ind.;

Mike McGahhey, 18, 49 1/2 Dix street, formerly of Willard, where his father is a school teacher; Allan Coovert, 21, 49 1/2 Dix street; Timothy Layne, 20, Bullhead road, Willard route 2; Roy Dent, 18, Crestline; A 15-year-old girl, sister of one of the accused. These will be arraigned in Huron county common pleas court. Coovert pleaded guilty and was fined \$1,000 and sent to jail for six months. The others pleaded not guilty. Bond was set at \$2,000 each.

Jury indicts Wilson Selick for murder

A former pupil in Plymouth High school was indicted for first-degree murder by a Hamilton county grand jury Friday. Wilson R. Selick, 25, is accused of the fatal stabbing, with malice aforethought, of Harold Davis, 48, in the Cincinnati suburb of Reading on Oct. 26.

Landfill rates raised 50 cents by Huron county

Cost of using Huron county's landfill will rise on Jan. 2. Commissioners voted Nov. 20 to increase the rates from \$1.50 to \$3 a ton. Minimum rate for cars hauling trash will be 50 cents. But for loads over 250 and under 675 pounds, the rate will be \$1. And over 675 pounds but under a ton, the rate is 16 cents for each 100 pounds. This rate now is 12.5 cents for each 100 pounds.

Collier to resign as treasurer

Harold B. Collier, Huron County treasurer, will resign, effective Jan. 1. Although his term runs to Sept. 1, 1973, for personal reasons, he chooses a retirement now. A successor will be named by the Huron county GOP executive committee.

Shiloh to erect new fire station

Three bids to construct a new fire station were received by village council at Shiloh Saturday. Apparent low bidder was W. A. Vanasdale, Inc., Shelby route 2, whose tender was in the amount of \$30,881 for an all-metal 60 x 70 feet building. Second low bidder was DeMar Co., Mansfield, at \$31,000. Janotta & Henner, Inc., Monroeville, bid \$35,900. The building will be erected on land to be acquired from Shiloh United Methodist church. It abuts the church's parking lot.

As a condition of purchase, the village is obligated to improve the parking lot. The building will be funded by a loan from First National Bank of Mansfield. It will be settled by charging rent to Bloominggrove and Cass townships and by appropriating from the fire fund. Firemen will furnish the building from their own resources. The council will vacate a 16-foot alley adjoining the site to afford more room for the installation.

A 39-year-old Plymouth man is in critical condition in intensive care in Mansfield General hospital as a result of a beating early Nov. 23. Gordon (Corky) Hunter, son of Mrs. Martin (Berri) Hunter and the late Mr. Hunter, Fenner road, underwent brain surgery after the beating. Employed in a cafe at Mansfield, as swamper and bartender, he sought to call police to quell a fight when he is said to have been assaulted. Police said Hunter was knocked down outside the bar.

Reabirds clout Big Red, 64-47

Gary Kaufman led Loudonville past Plymouth in a Johnny Appleseed conference game here Friday night. The score was 64 to 47. Kaufman scored 19 points, eight of them in the first period, as the Redbirds led all the way. They jumped out to a 12 to 0 lead before Plymouth's coach called a time out and by the end of the first eight minutes, the visitors led, 20 to 0.

Plymouth closed the gap slightly in the third period when it outscored Loudonville by four. But lack of experience and poorer shooting cost the Big Red any chance of making a contest of it. Loudonville shot extremely well. In the first half it missed only seven shots and overall it bagged 27 of 55, just under 50 per cent. Plymouth, meanwhile, showing that it lacks game experience, converted only 18 of 60.

THE REDBIRDS OUT-rebounded Plymouth, 32 to 26. Craig McPherson, who led Big Red scorers with 15 points, took down 11 caroms. Plymouth committed 12 turnovers, but the scorer was generous.

There were signs that some players are not in sound physical condition to play 32 minutes of school boy basketball. When one sees a player bent over and gasping for breath at the half, one is fairly certain that fellow is not in shape. Coach Bryan Neff was forced to go his bench earlier than fans had calculated and he got average output from one of his substitutes. This was Joe Laach, who scored seven.

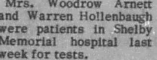

Nesselrode pudding just right for Yule

This is the season everyone brings out his favorite recipes.

For hours I have been rummaging through the drawer that is stuffed with bits of paper cut out here and there and hand-written, gathering them all up. On a red ink-written card which is half unreadable because stuff spilled on it, I found our recipe for Nesselrode pudding. It was something I grew up with, but only at the holiday season. We never had it during the rest of the year. It was considered a great treat.

It is really simple, but there is more than the average family will eat at a meal, so it is kind of a special thing for guests.

It is airy and light, and after a rather heavy meal, an ideal dessert.

Start with five eggs that are separated. Beat the yolks with a half cup of sugar. Add this to two cups of hot milk. Be care-

ful with it, do not scald it. Cook it for a minute or so, until it coats a wooden spoon. Meanwhile have a package of plain gelatin dissolved in cold water. Add this to the milk mixture. Stir it very well so it all dissolves. Then add a bowl of two thirds of raisins (these really should be boiled up a little bit in water so they puff up), three tablespoons of shaved almonds, which can be bought in a package; a small piece of citron cup up very finely and a few cherries sliced up in delicate pieces. Add a small pinch of salt to bring out the flavor. Set the pan in cold water with all this in it for about five minutes to cool it.

Beat the five egg whites until stiff and fold them into the other mixture. You may add a teaspoon of vanilla and a tablespoon of brandy or rum at this point. Pour into a mold and chill before serving. It can be made the day

before you use it.
IF THIS IS JUST FOR A family meal, it can be served bare, but you can perk it up with whipped cream for anyone you want to impress. Frankly, it is better bare.

While all this is cooking, you can pop a medium amount of popcorn. Let it cool, and after the pudding is completely finished, get out a needle and a very long piece of rather strong white thread.

Then start making a Christmas tree decoration. Why I am even writing this, is beyond me, because everyone should know it, but at about every sixth or seventh piece of popcorn, put in a cranberry and keep on going until your thread is finished. Then start all over again. They can be used on your tree or strung here and there about the house.

They are decorative and great for youngsters to make. Should you have a bunch of cats, keep them high up or they will be nibbled at. We have one strawflower-eating kitten and she has done away with nine straw flowers from a lovely arrangement that was eight. Popcorn will probably cause her to go wild with joy.

If she cannot get it alone, she will have help. There is no such thing as a "dumb" animal. They are smart enough to simply put it over and make us wonder how it all happened.

When we came home last week after four days away I realized that our cooker had gone through a lot of dog biscuits, more than if handed out one at a time. The answer was forthcoming from our little

friend who took care of them. The kittens got into a tussle on the kitchen counter and accidentally knocked an open box onto the floor. There was nothing accidental about it all, really. Lulu simply sat on the floor wagging her tail while her friends figured out a way to get the dog biscuits to her as a friendly gesture. They all won and they all work together to outwit us. We are merely people.

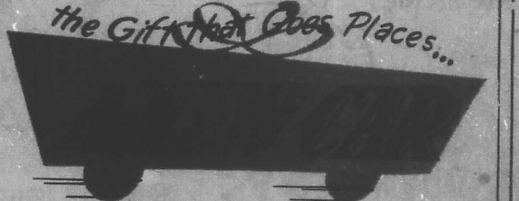

ORDINANCE NO. 14-72 AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, FIXING A DEPOSIT FOR UTILITY SERVICE TO BE FURNISHED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1: Effective December 1, 1972, the Plymouth Village shall require of each new customer of the utilities department a deposit of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars except that no security deposit shall be required of new customers who own real estate in the Village of Plymouth for which utility services are requested. It shall be incumbent upon the customer to provide evidence of ownership to the Clerk of said Village to be exempt from said security deposit. And Contracts and all other purchase agreements which do not vest title in the customer shall not be deemed evidence of title sufficient to warrant an exemption from the security deposit requirements.

SECTION 2: Upon termination of said contract, for any reason, the customer shall forthwith be entitled to a refund of the said deposit, after his or her account with the Village is settled. Said security deposit shall bear no interest. The Clerk of said Village shall be authorized to apply the security deposit to any unpaid utility if the account with the Village is not settled within thirty (30) days after the utility services are disconnected.

SECTION 3: The Clerk of said Village shall permanently maintain a separate ledger in which the names of those customers making a security deposit shall be entered and the date thereof. The Clerk shall also enter into said ledger the date said security deposit is refunded to the customer or applied to an unpaid account pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance, upon discontinuance of utilities services. Each customer shall be required to affix his or her signature on a line opposite the entry of his or her security deposit upon refund of said deposit by the Clerk.

SECTION 4: It is further ordered that Ordinance No. 7-62 adopted May 1, 1962, and Ordinance No. 15-71 adopted November 16, 1971, shall be and are hereby declared void.

SECTION 5: This ordinance shall be and remain in full force and effect from and after the earliest time allowed by law.
