**Too easy on deadbeats?**

The village has been too accommodating to delinquent subscribers to utility service, Councilman Kenneth Eichelberry charged during the village council meeting Feb. 1.

The council accepted the only salt bid it received, that of Morron Salt Co. about the same as last year's price.

The bid of Standard Oil of Ohio to furnish petroleum products was accepted over that of Marathon Oil Co. The Solbit bid was less for each item with one exception, that of heavy duty oil, five cents less a gallon.

A request by teachers of Plymouth Elementary school to put a no parking ban at the west side of the school when buses are loading and unloading pupils from 3 to 4 p. m., had to be refused. In order to receive any funds from issue 1 money to improve traffic flow, the street must remain a two-way thoroughfare.

The council suggested that it could make a no parking zone in front of the school building during this period, which could relieve the situation of congested traffic.

# Big Red's second half sinks Freddies for 10th victory

Plymouth took all of the first half to get started before breaking it open at Fredericktown Friday night.

An outstanding scoring performance in the third period, which began with the visitors a point behind at 37 to 36, led the Big Red to victory.

The score was 92 to 73. Only once before this season, when Plymouth played Buckeye Central here Dec. 23, has Plymouth scored as many as 92 points in a game.

PLYMOUTH WON THIS one because it outbounded Fredericktown, 56 to 31, Lee Wilkins taking down 18, Bill Van Wagner 12 and Larry Taylor and Brad Ream 10 apiece; because it outshot the Freddies, 35 to 28, Plymouth having 71 tries for a 49 per cent average, Fredericktown 73 for only 38 per cent, and because Ream did a good job on Chris Reppart, Fredericktown's top scorer.

Playing with the remnants of the flu, Reppart scored only 14, 10 of them in the first half, and of these eight from outside. Larry Taylor led all scorers with 29 points, a

season high for him. Ream and Ray Hughes, who probably ought to have been a starter from the beginning of the season, even as a diamond in the rough, because he has another season of eligibility left, bagged 18 apiece. Wilkins chipped in with 15.

PLYMOUTH WAS HARD pressed to keep up in the first 16 minutes. It made too many mistakes and it allowed the Freddies to control the pattern and tempo of play.

But Taylor's howitzer shot with 6:44 remaining in the third quarter gave the Big Red a lead it never thereafter gave up. Ream's rebound at 6:23 established a four point bulge that Plymouth steadily embellished.

To have scored 80 points in the period on only 25 advances means the Big Red played up to a standard sufficient to warrant a trip to Columbus.

Coach Bryan Neff obviously hasn't much on the bench. There were only eight dressed for combat Friday night and one of these had limited eligibility because he played in the reserve game. Injury and resignation have de-

pleted the team number.

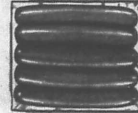





**AN ORDINANCE** CREATING AN AMBULANCE SERVICE DEPARTMENT WHICH SHALL FUNCTION AS A SEPARATE BRANCH UNDER THE SAFETY SERVICE DIVISION OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO.

**SECTION 1.** There is hereby established and created an Ambulance Service Department for and in the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and the same shall be organized and function as an independent department under the Safety Service Division of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

**SECTION 2.** The function of the Ambulance Service Department shall be that of protecting lives and providing routine and emergency ambulance services to all residents of the Village of Plymouth and to those within a radius of five (5) miles thereof.

**SECTION 3.** The Ambulance Service Department shall be maintained under the State Civil Service System, in so far as applicable employment, suspension, termination, reduction in force, lay offs, classification, benefits and pay rates shall come under and be governed by Village ordinance and State statutes which govern and apply to police and fire personnel.

**SECTION 4.** The Ambulance Service Department of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall have a chief executive or department head, designated Chief of Ambulance Service, appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of the legislative authority. Said Chief of Ambulance Service need not be an elector of the Village of Plymouth at the time of his appointment but shall become a resident within six (6) months after confirmation by the legislative authority. The Chief of Ambulance Service shall not be an elected official of the village at the time of his appointment or during his tenure in office. The Chief of Ambulance Service shall serve at the pleasure of the Mayor and legislative authority of the village and may be removed without cause by the Mayor with the consent of a majority of the members elected to the legislative authority of the Village; or he may be removed without cause by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the members elected to the legislative authority of the village, without the consent of the Mayor.

**SECTION 5.** The Chief of Ambulance Service shall manage, conduct and control the Ambulance Service Department and shall make such regulations as it deems necessary for the safe, economical and efficient management of said department and service to be rendered thereby.

The Chief of Ambulance Service shall appoint officers, employees, agents, clerks and assistants, provided such positions are just authorized by the legislative authority of the Village but such appointments shall be subject to approval by the Mayor. All appointments and mayoral approval thereof shall be in writing and shall be filed with the Village Clerk.

The Chief of Ambulance Service shall be under the general supervision and control of the Mayor and shall have such other powers as are prescribed by the ordinance of law and which are not inconsistent with the ordinance.

No person shall receive an appointment under this section unless he has not more than sixty days prior to receiving such appointment, passed a physical examination, given by a licensed physician, showing that he meets the physical requirements necessary to perform the duties of the position to which he is to be appointed as established by the legislative authority of the village and has received training in accordance with minimum standards established by the legislative authority of the village. Expense of examination and schooling shall be paid by the legislative authority of said Village.

**SECTION 6.** Parsons, Corporations and Firms or other services have been rendered by the Ambulance Service Department shall be charged and billed by the clerk of said Village in accordance with rates established by the legislative authority.

**SECTION 7.** This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, and its economic effect from and after its passage by two-thirds vote of council.
