He will fill the four-year term expiring Dec. 31, 1975, which was vacated by Hugh W. Washburn. Since the council did not elect a member within the 30-day period, the mayor appointed Akers.

He was appointed to succeed Washburn, who assumed the mayorship. The term expires Dec. 31, 1973. The council has 30 days to appoint a successor.

Mrs. Delores Baker, 65 Railroad Street, was appointed clerk by the mayor, the council concurring. She will assume the position April 1 when the present clerk, Quentin R. Ream, leaves office. She is a veteran employee of Plymouth Elevator.

## Collier says tax bills lighter because of law

Tax bills to be mailed for the second half of 1971 tax, probably about May 20, will be pleasantly surprised to all taxpayers, says Harold B. Collier, Huron county treasurer.

One of the provisions of the recently enacted Ohio income tax law is a rollback in the amount of tax. All bills will reflect this in the amount of 10 percent. This applied on the second half only for 1971 tax, but in the present law, all future tax bills will reflect the same.

Those taxes paid for the full year on the first half collection have now been refunded the 10 per cent rollback by the county auditor's office, with the exception of a few with trivial amounts. Those involved in refunds of less than \$1 may call at the treasurer's office before Apr. 20 if they wish to collect these small amounts.

# Parks full? Bake bread!

When those first balmy breezes of spring hit, you just can't help thinking of a good, restful vacation.

Where? That is a good question.

Since a vacation is to get away from it all, you should look for some peace and quiet.

After reading a bunch of statistics about our beautiful national parks, my first thought would be to say, "stay home!"

The figures of annual visitors to each one in 1971 are astronomical. Our smallest national park, Platt, south of Oklahoma City, had 4,147,900.

It is only 912 acres large, which means it had 4,548 visitors an acre. And how can so many people be peaceful?

Cape Cod National Seashore had 4,188,300 visitors, which certainly must have made swimming more like just standing shoulder to shoulder in the water. It has only 44,600 acres.

Now the Great Smoky Mountains National park, which had the highest number of visitors, 7,179,000, does have space to move around in, with its 516,626 acres and over 600 miles of horse and foot trails, besides its roadways for cars. That's where you can go, park your car and get out and walk.

The Grand Canyon, which you would naturally think would be a terrific vacation attraction, only called about 2,402,100 last year.

Our largest national park, Yellowstone, with its 2,221,773 acres, should be very close to shoulder in the water. It was just a 100 years ago that Gen. Benjamin A. Cowen, a native of Moorefield in Harrison county, pushed and cajoled Congress into setting aside the area for our first national park after he had seen

its beauty and thought it should be preserved from land grabbers. It now covers 3,426 square miles in three states, Wyoming, Idaho and Montana.

There were farsighted people back in 1872 and there are in 1972!

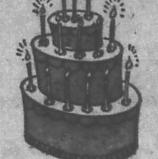
**PRESERVING SPACE** where people can simply wander about looking at trees and wild flowers has become very important. It is also important that we have an assured water supply, which means upland reservoirs. This, in turn, will take up some pieces of land that are essentially valueless in our production of food stuffs. Somehow the planners must find a way to utilize land that is not too productive or we will end up with a lot of nice places to go and not a darn thing to picnic on when we get there.

This can be a real problem. But forget it and let someone else worry about it, and start the sandwiches.

People at Cornell university's department of nutrition and food have come up with a very good enriched bread recipe that has all the stuff you really need to survive with.

Mix three cups of lukewarm water with two packages of dry yeast and two tablespoons of honey in a bowl. Let stand in a warm place for five minutes. In another bowl mix about (start with a little less) six cups of bleached enriched flour (read the labels for the brand) with a half cup of full-fat soy flour, three fourths of a cup of non-fat dry milk and three tablespoons of wheat germ.

Then add four teaspoons of salt to the liquid mixture and part of the dry mixture. Beat for a while. Add two tablespoons of oil or melted butter and add more of the dry stuff. Knead until the dough is smooth. Put it in a bowl and let it rise for about an hour, punch down, let it rise again for a half

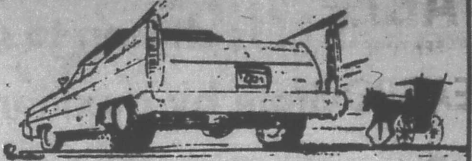

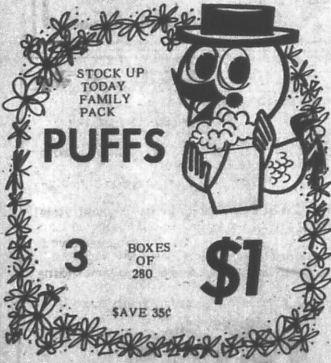

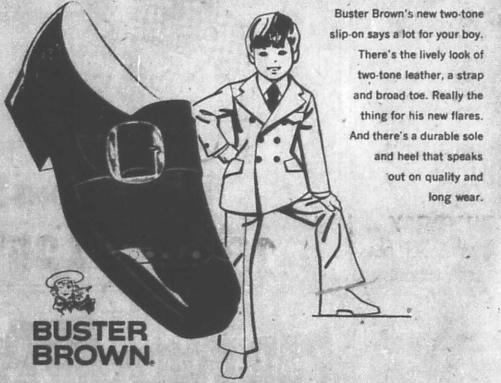
