Clinic set here for new pupils Wednesday

A pre-school clinic for children entering Plymouth Elementary school for the first time will be conducted there Wednesday.

Pupils whose surnames begin with the letters A through J should report, together with a parent or guardian who can exhibit a birth certificate and the required inoculation certificates, in the morning.

Pupils whose surnames begin with the letters L through Z and a parent or guardian should report in the afternoon.

All beginning pupils must be six years old before Oct. 1 to enter the first grade or have attended a full year of kindergarten.

Children whose sixth anniversary will fall in October, November or December may be tested to determine their readiness for first grade if application is made before May 8.

All applicants must be inoculated against poliomyelitis, pertussis (whooping cough), smallpox, measles and tetanus before they may enter school. The tuberculin skin test is required.

Parents who find Wednesday inconvenient may call the principal to arrange another appointment.

Council adopts three changes

Three innovations were adopted after suggestions by two councilmen, James L. Jacobs, Sr., and Frank R. Garber, during the village council meeting Mar. 21.

Jacobs suggested that signs at two service stations bordering the square be taken down since drivers cannot see to make turns. The proprietors will be asked to remove them.

He also suggested the village adopt a new method of collecting traffic tickets, similar to one used in Shelby, which has the ticket on a small envelope in which the fine may be placed and deposited in the drop box at the village building.

The council again discussed the cost of living ordinance but took no action. The ordinance was adopted in the fall of 1970 after utility employees had received a second raise during that year. All employees were given raises by Ordinance 470.

IN 10-COUNTY AREA --

10,695 jobs to open soon?

Job opportunities in a 10-county area including Huron, Richland and Crawford counties will increase by nearly one half in the next six months, the Ohio Bureau of Employment Services said Mar. 21.

A total of 10,695 jobs -- 6,035 "replacements" and 4,660 "new" ones -- should be available between May, 1972, and November, 1972, in Huron, Richland, Crawford, Ashland, Erie, Lorain, Knox, Wyandot, Marion and Morrow counties.

The figure is based on data supplied by the employers themselves, said F. Louis Gillespie, supervisor of technical section, manpower development services, ODES, Columbus. "We sent questionnaires to 525 employers out of 53,300 in the 10-county area. These 525 hire 66 per cent of all workers in the 10-county region."

Manufacturing jobs will provide the greatest number of openings, Gillespie said. Construction work will take 25 per cent of the increase.

The survey, Gillespie added, shows that demand for skilled labor will exceed the supply, forcing employers to break down the skilled jobs so that less skilled workers can perform the work incompletes.

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John Anthony Serrano---his impact on Ohio school finance

Until seven months ago, 11-year-old John Anthony Serrano was just a typical American boy, virtually unknown outside of his Whittier, Calif. neighborhood. Now, however, his name is known to educators in all 50 states. Soon the name Serrano will be widely known to legislators and the general public all across the nation.

John Serrano, by chance, happened to be the lead plaintiff on a list of poor family clients in a lawsuit alleging that California's system of financing elementary and secondary schools is unconstitutional — a violation of the equal protection clause of the United States Constitution.

The California Supreme Court, in a historic decision on Aug. 30, 1971, upheld the lawsuit. The court ruled that California could no longer finance its schools through a property tax system containing serious inequities. The case is called Serrano vs. Priest (the treasurer of state in California).

Since last August, federal courts in three states — Texas, Minnesota and New Jersey — have ruled unconstitutional the school finance systems of those states.

Ohio's turn is coming soon. The Ohio Education Association has already filed suit in federal district court asking for a similar ruling against Ohio's school finance system. A decision is expected some time this summer.

What does it all mean? Here are some important questions and answers.

Q. — What was the basic ruling in Serrano vs. Priest?

A. — The California Supreme Court found wide disparities in property tax wealth among school districts. Some had lots of industry and/or expensive homes. Others had no industry and only modest homes. With California's substantial dependence on local property taxes to finance schools, the court held "that this funding scheme invidiously discriminates against the poor because it makes the quality of a child's education a function of the wealth of his parents and neighbors."

Q. — Does the Serrano decision mean property taxes can no longer be used to finance public schools?

A. — No, not at all. The decision simply says that a state cannot permit some districts to spend more money than other districts on each child's education merely because the former districts have a lot of property tax wealth.

Q. — Just how do disparities of property tax wealth among school districts serve to discriminate against youngsters?

A. — To cite the most gross disparity here in Ohio, the richest school district in the state is Cuyahoga Heights with taxable valuation per pupil of \$211,401. Every mill of local property tax will produce \$211 per pupil revenue to the schools. The poorest district in

the state is Huntington Local in Ross County with taxable valuation per pupil of \$3448. Every mill of local property tax will produce only \$3.45 per pupil. Cuyahoga Heights' 10-mill local tax rate produces over \$2,000 per pupil each year. For Huntington Local, 10 mills would produce only \$35 revenue per pupil.

Q. — If the Federal court in Ohio rules our system unconstitutional, what will happen?

A. — The court will undoubtedly give the legislature some time — perhaps a year — to devise a new system.

Q. — What's the solution?

A. — I believe I have a sound, workable solution in house bill 1112, the major new education finance bill I introduced two weeks ago. It would retain property taxes as the cornerstone of school finance for Ohio, but it would guarantee that each mill of property tax would produce the same amount of revenue in every school district in the state. Revenue for each school district would be a function of tax effort, not of tax wealth.

Q. — How would the bill work?

A. — Every school district would be guaranteed \$25 per pupil revenue for each mill of local property taxes, with the norm being \$750 per pupil income from a 30-mill tax rate. The \$25 per pupil per mill would come from a combination of local tax rate and state aid. For example, a school district with \$20,000 taxable valuation per pupil would receive per mill \$20 locally and \$5 from the state. A district with \$10,000 valuation

per pupil would receive \$10 locally and \$15 per pupil from the state for each mill of taxation.

Q. — Will all districts be able to spend only \$750 per pupil?

A. — No, at the option of local voters, each school district could levy taxes at the same \$25 per pupil per mill) above the standard 30 mills, to a maximum permissible total of 45 mills.

Q. — What about wealthy districts like Cuyahoga Heights?

A. — Such school districts would have to divest themselves of taxable wealth or merge with nearby districts to get their taxable valuations below \$25,000 per pupil. No school district with over \$25,000 taxable valuation per pupil could continue to exist. This provision, which would affect 64 of Ohio's 625 school districts, will be controversial, but I see no other way to meet the requirements of Serrano vs. Priest and similar rulings.

Q. — Will your bill mean higher taxes at the state or local level?

A. — I don't believe any increase in state taxes would be required. Local property tax rates would go up in 60 or so wealthy school districts which are currently below the state average. Tax rates would go down in about 150 poor and medium-wealth school districts which now are above the state average. Rates would be unchanged in the other 400 school districts.

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
