

# Bachrach resigns councilman

Robert L. Bachrach resigned as village councilman Tuesday night as the council officially acted on three other resignations. Village Administrator William Forquer and Bachrach said they resigned because of a letter to the editor published after the council approved two pay raises in excess of the allowable five and one half per cent set by the federal government. They accused the newspaper of dictating the letter written over another name, that of Bachrach's second cousin. Mayor Elizabeth Padock told Bachrach she

disappointed that he would resign, since he had been elected by the people and was only two of six councilmen so chosen and she feels he owes them the duty to serve. He said "the people let me down". Clerk Quentin R. Ream said he is resigning because the work load is too much with his regular employment and he does not feel he can handle it over the course of a few hours to devote to it. Councilman Hugh W. Washburn gave no reason for his resignation.

The council appointed Mrs. Thomas F. Root, who is now serving on the village planning commission and working on a zoning ordinance, to fill one vacancy. No action was taken on the other vacancies. APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1972 were approved as prepared by the clerk. They call for an expenditure of \$321,754.93. The figures for each department are fairly close to what the village operated on in 1971.

The paid holiday problem was again tabled until a better interpretation of the wording of the ordinance can be determined and an exact list of which employees actually worked on the seven designated holidays in 1971 can be prepared. Bachrach said all of the pink slips on which the police department writes its hours are completely missing from the pay vouchers so that no one can

accurately check who worked which days. The council approved overtime work for the assistant to the clerk and the administrator so they may complete their checking of water meters necessary for the new sewerage hook-up. Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., suggested a percentage of fines collected by the mayor's court be put aside in a special fund for a new cruiser. Solicitor Robert A. Mc-

Kown said he would research the proposal but thinks the general fund, into which the money collected is deposited, is the one fund which cannot have a reserve. Jacobs also suggested that Patrolman Dennis Sprowles, who is now attending police school, given a police telephone in his home. The committee is investigating the possibility of having telephones placed in several locations in the village so that a portable telephone may be used, to eliminate the policeman on duty from having to return to the Square. The council approved the Booster club's request to stage its annual carnival on the Square July 24-30. Location of the new rest rooms for Plymouth Mid-ger league field will be investigated because of complaints from neighbors living close to the field. They say the rest rooms are being installed too close to the road.

## Growth 9.4% between '60-'70

Final census count shows Plymouth's population of 1,993 by the 9.4 per cent over the 1960 figure of 1,822. Growth in the Richmond county portion amounted to 12.3 per cent, from 1,052 to 1,181. Growth in the Huron portion was 5.5 per cent, from 770 to 812. New Haven township grew by only 2.2 per cent, from 7,009 to 7,166.

Plymouth township increased by 9.5 per cent, from 2,089 to 2,275. Cass township grew by 10 per cent, from 1,608 to 1,766. Shiloh's growth amounted to 12.8 per cent, from 724 to 817. Bloominggrove township grew 3.8 per cent, from 922 to 1,003. Auburn township lost population. Decreases ranged from 9.5 per cent, from 1,140 to 1,032.

Examiner finds evidence of conflict of interest

Two findings of adjustment transfers totaling \$3,824.34, overdrafts of \$9,691.98 in the general fund and \$5,398.84 in the street maintenance and repair fund, in violation of Sec. 753.13 of the Revised Code of Ohio, 24 instances of action by simple motion instead of ordinance or resolution, and five instances of conflict of interest amounting to \$138.71 were reported by a state examiner for the period July 2, 1969, to July 31, 1971. But the first six months of the period reviewed fell within the service of the four man bloc that campaigned as a ticket and won election as councilmen in November, 1969. The adjustment transfers require that \$3,000 be placed in the electric fund and the remainder, that \$824.34 be placed in the state highway improvement fund from the street construction maintenance and repair fund. ONLY THREE OF the actions of which the examiner disapproved were taken by the council that was defeated Nov. 3, 1969. The other 21 occurred between Jan. 6, 1970, and July 27, 1971. The conflicts of interest found by the examiner in what he said was only an examination of sample groups of vouchers and warrants occurred Mar. 12, 1970, July 17, 1970, and July 31, 1971, payment of \$71.22 for meals for prisoners to the Front Street Inn, of which Washburn, councilman and then mayor, is the owner; July 17, 1970, payment of \$28.09 for meals for prisoners to Curly's Drive In, of which William A. Forquer, then councilman and now village administrator, was owner; and on Feb. 12, 1971, payment of \$39.40 for batteries to Bachrach Co., of which Robert Bachrach, councilman, is owner.

"No certificate of the clerk as to date and publication of the ordinances was found in the record of ordinances as required by Sec. 731.24, Revised Code. "No master control card or ledger was maintained by the utility clerk. Errors in posting were not always corrected properly due to lack of operating training of the clerk. Therefore no accurate monthly records of total amounts billed and arrears were maintained. "Cancelled bonds and coupons were not offered for counting. Available records were used including Peoples National bank and vouchers and cancelled warrants of the village. Neither a bond record nor a debt record was maintained by the clerk. "No record was maintained of the names and addresses of those customers whose deposits made up the balance of total amounts billed (security deposits) fund. Although duplicate receipts were

issued for deposits, such deposits went back many years and no record existed of refunds made other than cancelled warrants. "Ordinance 79, dated Jan. 5, 1943, provided for the cemetery trust fund to be invested in U. S. Treasury Bonds and the interest therefrom to be deposited in the cemetery fund of the village for general use. Resolution 28-70, according to council minutes of Dec. 15, 1970, was passed amending the 1943 provision and allowing investment in notes. However, Resolution 23-70 was not recorded in the clerk's resolution book and the original resolution cannot be found, although the Dec. 15 minutes record its passage. "A 5.6 per cent pay increase was enacted for all police department employees by passage of a motion by council on Jan. 14, 1971. There is no provision to set salaries by simple motion of council."

## Measles vaccine essential for children 1-10, Linn says

To combat a predicted epidemic of rubella ("regular" or 10-day measles) in 1972, all children between one and 10 not immunized should obtain inoculation at once, says Dr. George Linn, commissioner. He estimates there are about 4,000 children in Huron county in this age group who have not been immunized. A combination vaccine can be given to protect against both rubella and rubella ("German" or three-day measles). The Huron county department of health urges parents of children between one and 10 to ask their family physicians to immunize them. If this is not feasible,

children may be brought to the immunization clinics every Friday evening 1 and 3 p. m. at the health department offices in the courthouse at Norwalk.

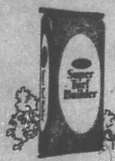

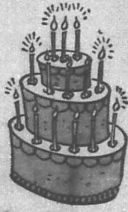

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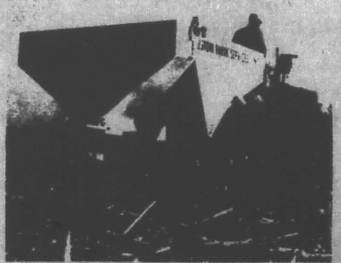
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# Red nine sets 18-game slate with five veterans


