New signs set for roads

New highway signs — stressing symbols rather than words — are being erected in Ohio's roadways under the supervision of the state highway department.

E. L. Toberen, deputy director, Division 3, says the program of introducing the new signs is continuing on schedule.

Last month the new "Do Not Enter" signs began appearing and the new "yield" signs started going up Apr. 5.

The new markers are part of a new international method of signing through vivid symbols. Instead of saying "School Crossing", a sign will have a vivid picture of children crossing a street.

For the present the symbol signs will be accompanied by lettering. In the future the lettering is scheduled to be dropped. This will eliminate the language barrier and make traveling Ohio's highways simpler for foreign visitors and for those who do not read well or know the English language sufficiently.

According to Toberen, the sign changeover began five years ago when the national joint committee of uniform traffic control devices decided to revise the standards of signing in the country. In most cases, the signs this committee came up with were symbols which had been in use in Europe or Latin America.

They provide quick recognition along with breaking down language barriers through the use of symbols. Getting used to them will help Americans to travel more easily in other parts of the world.

COLORS AND SHAPES are crucial to understanding the new system.

Yellow is a warning, red means stop, green indicates directional guidance, blue is for motorists services, black on white is for regulations, such as keep right, or for speed limits; brown is for recreation and orange is for construction and maintenance warnings.

Warning signs are diamond-shaped, traffic regulations and guidance signs are rectangular, octagons mean stop and inverted triangles mean yield.

Eventually 9,500 signs will be replaced in the rural state highway system and many more will be replaced by local government authorities throughout the state.

Ohio and all other states must conform to the new standards by Dec. 31, 1974.

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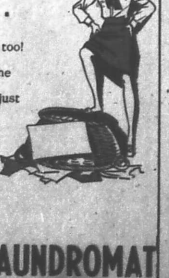

VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 11. The Administrator shall receive an annual salary of \$9,907.50 payable as follows: 10% from the Street Fund and 90% each from the Electric Fund, Water Fund and Sewer Fund.

SECTION 2. That the Chief of Police shall receive an annual salary of \$7,885 and shall give bond in the amount of \$1,000.

SECTION 3. That patrolmen shall receive an annual salary of \$5,644.25 and shall give bond in the amount of \$1,000. All new patrolmen shall be on a probation period of six (6) months.

SECTION 4. After completing six months probation, all patrolmen shall receive an annual salary of \$6,541.00 and shall give bond in the amount of \$1,000. Such patrolmen shall receive additional compensation in the amount of \$50.00 annually when required to work the second shift.

SECTION 5. The Police Dispatcher shall receive an annual salary of \$1,680. All part-time patrolmen shall receive an hourly wage of \$2.50 and give bond in the amount of \$1,000.

SECTION 6. The court clerk and bailiff shall be paid an hourly rate of \$2.50 from the general fund and give bond of \$1,000.

SECTION 7. That employees of the Electric, Sewer, Street and Water Departments shall be paid in accordance with the following schedule:
Class I Employees \$8,967.50
Class II Employees (Skill Labor) \$3,500 per hour
Class III Employees (Regular skilled labor) \$2.90 per hour
Class IV Employees (Common labor) \$1.00
\$2.30 per hour
Class V Employees (Student labor) \$1.65 per hour

SECTION 8. That the Park Custodian shall receive a monthly salary of \$184.60 payable from the park fund; said salary is payable only during those months that are part of the park season as designated in the Park Board.

SECTION 9. That the Assistant Fire Chief shall receive an annual salary of \$3,481.50, 25% shall be paid from the General Fund, Electric Fund, Sewer Fund and Water Fund.

SECTION 10. That the Fire Chief shall receive an annual salary of \$700 from the Fire Fund, payable semi-annually.

SECTION 11. That the Assistant Fire Chief shall receive an annual salary of \$500 from the Fire Fund, payable semi-annually.

SECTION 12. That Volunteer Firemen and five (5) men from the C. D. unit shall be paid for each fire call at the rate of \$2.00 per hour with a minimum of \$2.65 per call, payable semi-annually from the Fire Fund.

SECTION 13. That Volunteer Firemen shall receive \$3.50 per practice not to exceed 12 practices.

es annually, payable semi-annually from the Fire Fund.

SECTION 12. That the Technical Advisor of the Sewerage Disposal Plant and the Water Plant shall receive an annual salary of \$1,200, payable in monthly installments, 50% from each the Water and Sewer Funds.

SECTION 13. That employees of the Cemetery Board shall receive salary in accordance with the following schedule:
Class I Employees: \$1,600 annually from the Cemetery Fund.
Class II Employees: \$2.40 per hour payable from the Cemetery Fund.

SECTION 14. That all fulltime utilities and services employees shall be covered by Blue Cross and Blue Shield coverage. The Village shall bear all expenses in connection with such coverage.

SECTION 15. That the amounts payable by the Village to Blue Cross and Blue Shield shall vary in accordance with the premiums fixed by Blue Cross and Blue Shield. The Village Council shall determine from time to time the names and job descriptions of the various employees who work a minimum of 40 hours per week, who shall qualify for such coverage. The decision of the Council shall be final with respect to the employees who qualify for the Blue Cross coverage and Blue Shield coverage.

SECTION 16. That the pay periods for the covered and hourly paid employees unless otherwise specified in this Ordinance shall be every other Friday at noon beginning January 1, 1972.

SECTION 17. Salaries and hourly wages stated in this Ordinance shall be in effect since January 1, 1972.

SECTION 18. That any Ordinance or part of any Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 19. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio for the reason that salaries must be paid to Village employees for the safe and efficient operation of various departments of the Village and that this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect, from and after its passage.
