



These young people have held fast to their spiritual gifts while the so-called realism has turned out to be degeneracy.

They see a mocking bird putting on a mimicry performance and their idealism is strengthened. They watch a beautiful sunset and get spiritual reassurance and faith in their love. They watch a jet plane maneuver in the sky and their spiritual gifts are awakened.

They attend church and receive joy from it, a joy that enables them to laugh at problems and face them with courage. Other spiritual gifts such as a sense of humor, enables them to laugh at troubles and cares and to overcome them. In short, their church life and their ideals enable them to have a bright and cheery outlook always.
