Legion to sponsor mass class reunion

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the first class to be graduated by Plymouth High school, Ehret - Parsell Post 447, American Legion, will urge all living alumni to route here May 27, Commander James L. Jacobs, Sr., announces.

"We plan to solicit the assistance of a knowledgeable member of each class to invite all graduates to come to Plymouth May 27," he says, "when the post will stage the annual Memorial day observance. We have approved for sanction to conduct two foot races in the village, one for high school boys and their schools, and one for bona fide amateurs who are out of high school, with suitable trophies to be awarded the first three finishers."

Thereafter they will hold open house at the Legion post and invite every graduate of Plymouth High school and his or her family to participate. "Mary Faye park will be open for the day and will serve as a place where alumni may congregate and visit."

"Plymouth High school will be open so that alumni who have not seen the recent additions may inspect it and renew acquaintanceship."

"We plan to pay special honor in a brief ceremony to the Class of 1922, all of whom are living, the Class of 1947 and the class to be graduated May 28."

"We have solicited the cooperation and participation of the several churches so that a low-cost, fixed menu luncheon will be available for alumni and their families who may not wish to picnic in the park or who find the local restaurants

The foot races will start from the parking lot of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic church immediately thereafter.

"Our target time for conclusion of these events is 12:30 p. m.," he says.

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Gas bill to rise 10 cents a month

Average bill of natural gas customers in Plymouth will increase about 10 cents a month beginning May 1, because of increases in the cost of gas to Columbia Gas of Ohio, Inc., from its suppliers, it was announced Friday.

The adjustment is passed on to customers through provisions of the village's contract with the gas company.

The adjustment - 66 one-hundredths of a cent per 1,000 cubic feet - will apply in 294 Ohio communities.

He was taken to the emergency room of Willard Area hospital, examined for fractures and released.

Shiloh fire district opts for its own ambulance

Shiloh and its fire district will seek to go it alone in establishing an ambulance service.

Village council and the trustees of Cass and Bloominggrove townships decided April 12 to organize an independent ambulance service to serve the fire district.

They did so after Kenneth McFarland, chief of the Franklin township fire department, told them how he organized its service.

He said population of the area to be served must reach 4,000 before federal assistance can be obtained.

Population of all of Cass township and of Bloominggrove township approximates 3,500.

Councilman Delmar Nesbitt was named to represent the village on the committee, to serve with representatives of each of the townships.

Solicitor Robert A. McKown agreed on that point, but said that a resolution of intent could be passed by the council that could be used as a guide in the future, but would not guarantee what Ramsey wants.

It would cost at least \$7,000 to repair now since neither storage tank has been touched for a number of years, the council agreed that repairs are needed and accepted the company's offer.

The council agreed that a new ordinance should be enacted to make peddling in the village more difficult for the flood of salesmen who appear periodically. The solicitor is to study various ordinances. Jacobs said ordinances already enacted should be more effectively enforced. Other councilmen pointed out that garbage is being burned and dogs are allowed to run freely. The mayor said that such offenders should be summoned by the police department to appear in court to answer the charges.

Clean-up days were decided upon. Huron county side of the village will be done on Apr. 29 and the Richland side on May 6. Help from the Boy Scouts will be sought. Village employees will pick up trash placed at the curb-side on those days.

Annulment aim of Steven Clark

Steven E. Clark is seeking an annulment of his marriage to Betty J. Clark, Shiloh, in Richland County common pleas court.

He charges neglect and cruelty. They were married here June 23, 1971.

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The mayor said Maynard McFadden, Newark, district director of the Farmers Home Administration, says that as soon as the village's engineer, Eugene Gerken, sends in requested papers, the village would be given approval to advertise for bids on the planned sewer construction. McFadden told her the FHA's Columbus office had asked for the papers on Mar. 27 but had not received them. She is engineering Gerken during the afternoon of Apr. 18, when he said he is completing them and will forward them to Columbus immediately.

The council set the effective date of employment for the new administrator as May 15. Kenneth Amburgey, Ada, who is taking the position, will receive his bachelor's degree in engineering from Ohio Northern university on May 14.

The solicitor will prepare a contract for him to sign. The mayor forwarded a copy of a known contract to McKown by mail. It apparently was lost in transit.

ORDINANCE NO. 7-72 AN ORDINANCE TO FIX THE SALARIES OF THE ADMINISTRATOR, CHIEF OF POLICE, PATROLMEN, STREET SUPERVISOR, ELECTRIC AND WATER DEPARTMENT EMPLOYEES, PARK CUSTODIAN, ASSISTANT CLERK, FIRE CHIEF, ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF, VOLUNTEER FIREFIEMEN, TECHNICAL ADVISOR OF THE SEWER DISPOSAL PLANT AND THE WATER PLANT, SERVICES ATTENDANT, CEMETERY SEXTON AND ALL EXTRA LABOR AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE

Class I Employees \$8,967.50
Class II Employees (Skilled Labor) \$3,40 per hour
Class III Employees (Regular skilled labor) \$2.90 per hour
Class IV Employees (Common labor) \$2.30 per hour
Class V Employees (Student labor) \$1.65 per hour

SECTION 7: That the Assistant Fire Chief receive an annual salary of \$3,481.50, 25% shall be paid from each the General Fund, Electric Fund, Sewer Fund and Water Fund.
SECTION 8: That the Fire Chief shall receive an annual salary of \$700 from the Fire Fund, payable semi-annually.
SECTION 9: That the Assistant Fire Chief shall receive an annual salary of \$500 from the Fire Fund, payable semi-annually.
SECTION 10: That the Volunteer Firemen and five (5) men from the C. V. unit shall be paid for each fire call at the rate of \$2.65 per hour with a minimum of \$2.65 per call, payable semi-annually from the Fire Fund.
SECTION 11: That Volunteer Firemen shall receive \$3.50 per practice not to exceed 12 practices.

SECTION 12: That the Technical Advisor of the Sewerage Disposal Plant and the Water Plant shall receive an annual salary of \$1,200, payable in monthly installments, 50% from each the Water Fund and Sewer Fund.
SECTION 13: That the employees of the Cemetery Board shall receive salaries in accordance with the following schedule:
Class I Employees: \$1,600 annually from the Cemetery Fund.
Class II Employees: \$2.40 per hour payable from the Cemetery Fund.
SECTION 14: That all lifetime utilities and services necessary shall be eligible for Blue Cross and Blue Shield coverage. The Village shall bear all expenses in connection with such coverage. The amounts paid by the Village to Blue Cross and Blue Shield shall vary in accordance with the premiums fixed by Blue Cross and Blue Shield. The Village Council shall determine from time to time the amounts and descriptions of the various full-time employees who work a minimum of 40 hours per week, who shall qualify for such coverage. The decision of the Council shall be final with respect to the employees who qualify for Blue Cross coverage and Blue Shield coverage.
SECTION 15: That the pay periods for the salaries and hourly paid employees shall be as specified in this Ordinance shall be every other Friday at 4 p. m. beginning January 1, 1972.
SECTION 16: Salaries and hourly wages so stated in this Ordinance shall be in effect since January 1, 1972.
SECTION 17: That any Ordinance or parts of any Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.
SECTION 18: That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and that this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect, from and after its passage.
