That so many candidates seek election in the May 2 primary attests to the fact that the democratic system can work if we will try to make it work.

Machine politics is conspicuous by its absence this year; indeed, one wishes almost that an endorsed candidate were indicated in some instances, for then, at least, one would have some notion of the candidate's capabilities, whereas as it is the candidates are hardly known.

In principle, where an incumbent seeks reelection, he should be accorded that privilege unless his opponent convincingly explains why he should not be reelected. His opponent should have done so in public.

Which is why Mrs. Swanbeck and Mr. Harner are entitled to broad support. Neither of their opponents has convincingly said why they ought to be replaced.

Republicans will probably wish to favor John Arthur as nominee for treasurer, owing to long experience in the banking business.

Democrats will choose Tuesday a candidate to oppose the sheriff in November. We think Mr. Allison is the superior candidate.

Although we have on numerous occasions differed with our old friend John M. Ashbrook on some issues, he is clearly the superior nominee of his party for the 17th Congressional district seat and ought to be supported.

Mr. Johnson appears to be the desirable Democratic candidate.

In the matter of state issues, we oppose a state-authorized lottery and feel that it should be turned down, and we oppose Issue I.A because we think it gives legislators a blank check to authorize reimbursement for expenses without restraint of any kind.

Charles F. Bookwalter seeks to oust Robin T. Turner as state senator. He has earned that right, in our opinion. His victory would enable him to face Gene Slagle in November.

Richland countians face a number of candidates.

Mr. Cook seems to us the better qualified of the GOP nominees for representative from the 61st district.

Freeman Swank appears to be the outstanding nominee among Democrats for a county commissionership term starting Jan. 3.

Hollie Ceasars seems to be the superior candidate for the same office among Republicans.

Raymond Scott ought to be the Democratic nominee to oppose Richard McFarland, incumbent Republican, in November.

Republicans would do well to nominate William T. Cusic for clerk of courts and Richard Fridell, who has engineering experience and knows the intricacies of deeds, as recorder. Michael J. Smith has changed horses so many times that he has forfeited his right to support by his party. Vote for Donald I. Marsh for treasurer.

Democrats seem less divided.

Richard F. Tallman of Shiloh deserves the support of his neighbors in Plymouth, Cass and Bloominggrove townships in the race for the recorder's nomination.

George M. Griffith has experience in the treasurer's office and ought to be nominated, even though his opponent, Anthony Capadonna, is an honest and sincere citizen. If he loses, his party will take care of him.

Police wage adjustment apt to be enacted

Neighbor vs. neighbor race for commissioner on ballot

A neighbor vs. neighbor race for the GOP nomination for a term as Huron county commissioner highlights the election. Incumbent Arthur F. Herner, who lives in Route 99, faces the opposition of Kenneth G. Salisbury, 53 Ridge street, Montroseville, for nomination to a term to begin Jan. 2, 1973. Salisbury is a former mayor of Montroseville. He declined to seek reelection. The winner will face Max Van Allen, a Willard insurance agent, in November. Incumbent Ethel G. Swanbeck, Huron, faces party opposition for election as 72nd district member of the General Assembly by Lois J. McKempherson, a Wakeman housewife and part-time newspaper correspondent.

THREE REPUBLICANS seek the nomination for county treasurer, the office being vacated by Harold B. Collier after a generation of service. These are Edward C. Sperry, a former Montroseville tavernkeeper; John M. Arthur, a Norwalk banker, and Ardeth Chapp, Norwalk Fairfield. Only Democratic race at the county level is that for the nomination for sheriff, to oppose incumbent John, Georgia in November. Competitors are C. J. Allison and Loren R. Welch. Welch is a police officer at New London and formerly served as

such at Greenwich. Incumbent GOP Congressman John M. Ashbrook, Johnston, faces the opposition of William L. White, Mr. Vernon, a rabbit breeder and engineer. Other GOP races: Glenn F. Abel vs. Dale E. Bricker for state central committee; M. Joan Douglass, Mansfield, vs. A. Jane Fox, Ashland, for state central committee; Paul W. Brown vs. George C. Farris for justice of the supreme court; DEMOCRATIC RACES include: Charles W. Johnson vs. Raymond C. Beck and George L. Brecht, Sr., for member of Congress; George W. White vs. George M. NOTelCo adds to exchange

Northern Ohio Telephone Co. workmen installing equipment in the Plymouth central office to expand and improve service for area customers. C. T. Winn, Norwalk district commercial manager, says the \$50,000 project will provide equipment for 100 new customer lines, more telephone number terminations and more calling paths to Norwalk. The job will add 14 Plymouth-Norwalk trunks and 19 from Norwalk to Plymouth. This decentralization of the long-distance trunking facilities should improve the availability of long-distance trunking facilities to the customer, says Winn. To handle the greater equipment load, new storage batteries are to be installed with this project, Winn notes. He explains telephone equipment operates on direct current (DC) rather

than ordinary alternating current (AC). "What happens is this: AC power is fed into power equipment and charger," the manager notes. "The charging facilities keep the storage batteries up to capacity while DC power is drawn from them to run the switching equipment." Completion of the entire project is scheduled for mid-year. The Plymouth exchange serves 1,182 telephones in a 27.5-square-mile area of Huron, Crawford and Richland counties,

Scents for milady make sense

Another happy holiday is coming -- Mothers' day -- and there are all sorts of nice things to give mothers. I really think, though, that it's a toss-up between candy and perfume as the most widely given gift. Throw in a few posies, and you really have a present.

Candy one eats, flowers one looks at for the most part, but it's the perfume which really does something to one.

A New Jersey pharmacist has theories about scents. He says that certain ones do certain things. They are most suggestive. He recommends that a hostess who wants to impress her guests should put a couple cakes of yeast with a little flour and water near a heat outlet. The emitting odor will make everyone say, "Boy what a cook!" This way she can get by with a simple meal of baked beans and wieners which will taste like a feast. He also says that some odors like milk suggest security, and that gasoline and ether are fright odors.

He has a theory that

doctors can "smell out" their pregnant patients and those with diphtheria, diabetes or metal poisoning. This sounds logical, since we all know that the body does give out odors and especially those from following certain diets. The odors of patchouli, which is an East Indian mint, and sandalwood give oriental scents a churchlike atmosphere that makes people more subdued. The odors of alcohol turn them into real creatures of galeity.

Perfume has been used through the ages, once people discovered that it made them more attractive to each other. Cologne, of course, began in the German city of that name -- when some one made up a mixture of lemon and bergemot, which is a mint-like odor from the rind of a citrus tree. When the Pilgrims arrived here they found the local Indians doused with scented bear grease. Dolly Madison sprayed the White House with great regularity whenever a Congressman from the West whom she did not like visited it.

THERE ARE CERTAIN basic ingredients used to

day to make scents. They can be the real thing, like violet leaves, which takes 35 pounds to get one pound of oil, or ambergris, which sailors used to obtain from the ocean water above a sick whale. For the most part it is now created, since sick whales are not too easy to find to keep the supply adequate. It can be reproduced for about \$17 a pound.

The other main source is jasmine. The petals of the flower are laid on lard, which takes on the fragrance. After the lard has seeped it up, it is warmed with alcohol to separate the perfume oils from the fat. Then the perfume is extracted by distillation from the alcohol.

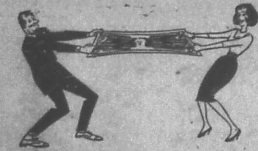

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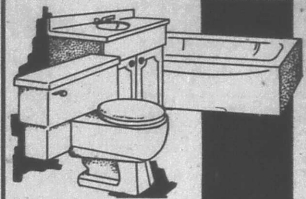
