Slowly but surely, they will get fixed up, but it does take time, so I have devised an answer to that one. I cheerfully say "we will do it, but first our own alley gets fixed!" They think I am kidding, I am not.

Then you are supposed to know things you never even dreamt of learning, like reading blue prints for sewers, it is surprising how easy they are - if you have four years of engineering. At least I have caught on to how the pages are numbered, which is a help.

On the side you have to be a Perry Mason and a Sherlock Holmes. How to solve a small crime with deduction and why it was committed takes more than the usual hour Raymond Burr is assigned. Right now we have four and none of them took the right things, so they had to be committed for a certain reason. And since none followed any real pattern, they are unrelated. It is a good thing I have read mystery books all my life.

The biggest part of it all is simply being nice to people. That really isn't hard since one has known them so long. The catch

is that some of those nice people do not take to new ideas sometimes, and that is what we need here and there: new ways of doing things. It is like adding something extra to a roast beef which you haven't tried before, and the flavor is much better.

ONE THING I HAVE learned is that some of the things done in the past which everyone griped about weren't too bad at all. We have really had some councils and boards that thought ahead. The big catch is that you get caught up in the everyday thing and there isn't much time left to plan too far ahead, and that is what we need.

Somewhere there is always an answer. Here I sit looking out the window at the snow-covered ground while small birds are disgustingly looking for something to eat - none of us really expected snow on Easter Sunday - but they will find something and so will we. Somehow.

This minute hardboiled eggs are really the great problem. You can eat just so many of them or slice them up to decorate things.

THIS RECIPE TAKES care of eight of them at one clip.

Start by molting two tablespoons of butter in a sauce pan. Add two small finely chopped onions and brown them for about 20 minutes over a very low flame. Add two tablespoons of flour and stir it for a few minutes. It is not to get brown. Then stir in a cup of scalded milk with a teaspoon of salt, a half teaspoon of white pepper and bits of grated nutmeg and some sprigs of parsley. The parsley is just for flavoring and can be removed

in a few minutes. Add the eggs, sliced or cubed, and continue cooking for another few minutes. Add another tablespoon of butter cut into bit pieces, and serve it on toast of Chinese noodles.

Then there's always deviled eggs. For these we have never used a recipe out of a book and I cannot remember whoever told me how to do them, but we like them. Take the yolks out and mash them

up in a bowl, then gather up half of the spices in your cupboard, like thyme, marjoram, salt, pepper and basil and shake a little of each into them, add some sweet pickle juice (not too much or they will be too liquidy), then mix mayonnaise into it all. They can be perked up with a thin slice of a stuffed olive or, if you are lazy, just sprinkle them with paprika. For a really fancy plateful, stuff

the egg whites with just enough yolk mixture to come to the top, and put the rest through a small frosting decorator and squirt fancy little designs on the top.

If none of these will solve your hardboiled egg problem, you can always give a little present of them to some of your weight watching friends. It would be a very welcomed gift.

Motor court pioneer, villager's kin, dies

Brother of John Vanderbilt, Lambertus Verburg, 78, a pioneer in the motor court field, died of cancer at Fredericksburg, Va., Mar. 27.

He built the 10-unit Brown's Court No. 1 near Falmouth, Va., in U. S. Route 1 and enlarged it over several years to include the 56 units it had in 1959 when it was leased to an Alexandria, Va., company.

Later he opened two other motels, Brown's Court No. 2 at Pt. Royal, Va., and in 1959 the 120-unit Mt. Vernon Motel at Charlottesville, Va. He also operated the Dutch Pantry restaurant connected with the Mt. Vernon.

For six years he was vice-president of Quality Courts United and supervised distribution of its guide books, numbering six million.

Mr. Verburg was active in Fredericksburg in relief for war-torn Holland, where he was born in Amsterdam. He came to the United States in 1921 and after nine years in the dairy business in California settled in Fredericksburg in 1932.

His wife, Cornelia, died in 1968. He is also survived by seven daughters, three sons, two sisters, Mrs. J. DeVries, Utrecht, Netherlands, and Marie, Soesdyk, Netherlands; 22 grandchildren and 26 great-grandchildren.

Services were conducted Mar. 29 at Fredericksburg by the Rev. Samuel L. Beik. Burial was in Oak Hill cemetery.
