New London in fight over water supply fore the council is to borrow \$819,000 from FHA to be paid back in 40 years at five per cent interest so that a reservoir can be built

Not everybody among the 2,336 (a drop of 56 or 2.3 percent since 1960) residents of New London agrees that a new upland water reservoir is needed to assure an adequate supply for that village,

The lines are drawn for what appears to be a to-the-death fight be-tween one faction which says the village ought to borrow money from the Farmers Home adthe Farmers Home ad-ministration to fund a \$2,6-million reservoir and another that claims there may be adequate water right now, but in any case a shortage can be overcome by less expensive meth-ods.

Engineers told the vil Engineers told the vil-lage council last week that water rate in-creases of 40 per cent -- and possibly 90 per cent -- will be nec-essary to fund the cost, This would raise the cost of 6,000 gallons of water in each quart-er from \$6.30 to \$1.



Then stir in a cup of scalded milk with a teaspoon of white pepper and bits of grated nutrneg and some sprigs of paraley. The paraley is just for flavoring and can be removed


