Akers returned to council, sewer bids await state OK

Donald E. Akers was appointed and sworn as village councilman Tuesday night.

The veteran attorney will fill the last two years of Kenneth Eichelberry's term. Since Eichelberry resigned Mar. 30, and the council did not choose a member within the allotted 30 days, Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock appointed Akers.

She said his experience on previous councils and having been a councilman during the first phase of the sewer installation will be "invaluable."

He will be a member of the finance and park committees.

Councilman Edward O. Ramsey said he spoke with Mayor M. Fadden, district director of the FHA, and was told only some engineering details which must be supplied by Eugene Gerken, the village's engineer for the proposed continuance of the sewer system, are needed and he berkenotwards these to the FHA engineers, the village will be able to advertise for bids.

The mayor said Gerken told her Tuesday he will forward the papers for the necessary easements Monday.

Councilman Toy Patton

reported the Fate-Roof-Heath Co. plans to move from Charles Rhine avenue to its own building during the week of July 4. The mayor was reminded by Ramsey the GSA should be notified. He also said it is time to negotiate another contract so the village can retain use of the building and grounds.

She said she will comply, but is still searching the village files for copies of the contracts. One, she said, signed by former Mayor William Fazio for 1969, turned up while she and the clerk were looking for something else. It is the only one she has seen. The contracts seem to be on an annual basis.

Councilman Frank R. Garber presented a request from the CD unit to purchase eight coats and four pairs of boots for a total cost of \$336. It was approved.

The council also approved the repair of the fire department tanker and purchase of new tires not to exceed a total cost of \$400.

Two estimates were obtained. Heister's, Inc., Willers, was the lower.

At the last council meeting it was thought the repairs would be too costly and not worth the money, even though the vehicle is needed. Even though it has been in an unsafe condition to drive, it is taken to every fire.

Akers asked whether it would be more sensible to spend the money repairing the CD tanker, which has several bad leaks. The council indicated that would also be taken care of soon.

DOGS RUNNING LOOSE

Police officers and the mayor said they have called the dog wardens from both counties requesting they visit Plymouth more frequently. The last time one warden was here, at an early morning hour about a month ago, there was not a dog in sight. The mayor suggested the police summon owners of dogs running loose.

Junk cars and rubbish will get the same treatment. The council said that Ordinance 17-68, which prohibits such rubbish, will be strictly enforced.

Administrator Kenneth Amburgey will send notices, if they are not complied with, the persons involved will be summoned. Amburgey will inquire of Division 3, Department of

Highways, to see what state funds may be available to undertake repairs to the bridge in Route 61. Warnings of the super-structure and the village has been officially notified repairs are necessary.

The village's backhoe is again in need of repair. The mayor suggested it would probably be cheaper in the long run to rent one when needed, since the repair bills on have far exceeded its cost.

Amburgey is to determine how much the repairs will cost and decide if the village can hire one on a bid basis.

Clerk Colores Baker was instructed to follow the suggestion of the state examiner and list the complete village payroll on one voucher, which will be signed by the council's finance committee, the cemetery and park boards.

BILLS FOR THE PARK and cemetery will be turned over to the boards for approval, since each has its own levy and budget.

ORDINANCE NO. 6-72
AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION OF MOBILE HOME PARKS.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1: For the purpose of this Ordinance the term "Mobile Home Park" shall mean a plot of ground upon which mobile homes occupied for dwelling or sleeping purposes are located.

A "Mobile Home" is a detached single family dwelling unit with all of the following characteristics:

(a) Designed for permanent occupancy and containing sleeping accommodations, a flush toilet, a tub or shower bath and kitchen facilities, with plumbing and sewer and electrical connections provided for attachment to outside systems;

(b) Designed to be transported after fabrication on its own wheels, on detachable wheels, or on flatbed or other hauling devices.

(c) Arriving furnished or unfurnished at the site where it is to be occupied as a dwelling complete and ready for occupancy except for minor and incidental unpacking and assembly operations.

SECTION 2: MOBILE HOME PARK USES:
Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, no part of any park shall be used for non-residential purposes, except such uses that are required for the direct servicing and well being of park residents and for the management and maintenance of the park.

SECTION 3: CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS:
Prior to the issuance of any portion thereof, a detailed site development plan shall be submitted to the Village of Plymouth and shall be approved upon a finding that all applicable regulations are met.

The site plan shall be drawn to a legible scale, shall show topographical features of the lot, building placement, mobile home spaces, activity areas, planting and landscaping plan, and shall include a circulation and parking plan with appropriate engineering and construction details.

If development is to proceed in phases, a zoning certificate shall be granted for only those phases meeting the regulations pertaining to the detailed development plan, bonding and other requirements of this Ordinance.

Detailed plans for any phase shall be accompanied by a general site development plan which shall show surrounding land uses, recreation and open space development, proposed street pattern and lot arrangement for the entire area proposed for development as a mobile home park. The site plan shall show that a proper relationship does exist between access drives, service roads, driveways, and parking areas to encourage pedestrian and vehicular safety.

SECTION 4: LOCATION.
The park shall be located on a well-drained site, properly graded to prevent erosion or the forming of stagnant water pools on the site, and in conformity with the drainage pattern for the area.

SECTION 5: SIZE AND SPACE MINIMUMS:
The minimum size site to be developed shall be ten (10) acres. Each mobile home space shall be a minimum of five thousand (5,000) square feet for each single unit and shall be clearly defined as to boundaries. The density of such develop-

ment shall not exceed eight (8) mobile homes per acre of total project site. Each home shall have a minimum living area of 720 square feet, and be occupied by no more than two persons per bedroom.
SECTION 6: ENTRANCE DESIGN.
There shall be at least ten (10) feet clearance between adjacent mobile homes, including their structural additions as carports, porches, patios, etc. No mobile home or structural addition shall be closer than twenty (20) feet to an access drive within the park, or twenty (20) feet from any property line bounding the park, or two hundred (200) feet from any permanent existing residence outside the park, unless separated therefrom by a natural buffer or artificial buffer six (6) feet wide. Such buffer shall be maintained and landscaped to provide an obscuring screen. The type, quantity and planted height of materials used for buffering shall be shown on the site development plan. The structural of any type shall be closer than twenty (20) feet to any property line bounding the park.
SECTION 7: ACCESS DRIVES.
All mobile home spaces shall abut upon an access drive of not less than twenty-five (25) feet in pavement width, which shall have unobstructed access to a public thoroughfare. Paved off-access drive parking shall be provided at the rate of at least two (2) spaces per mobile home space. All access drives, parking and service areas shall be paved with concrete, asphalt or equivalent and shall conform to construction standards approved by the County Engineer as adequate for the type of use proposed.

SECTION 8: UTILITIES.
The installation of all utilities, including electrical and street lighting, sewage and waste, water supply and plumbing shall comply with all applicable state and local codes and regulations. Every mobile home shall be provided with proper connections to the village utility systems. Tanks for bottled gas, fuel oil or other fuels shall be stored upon properly secured mounts and shall be away from home entries and exits.
SECTION 9: REFUSE COLLECTION.
Procedures and facilities for refuse and garbage collection shall be provided for according to Codes set forth by the State of Ohio.
SECTION 10: FIRE PROTECTION.
Each park shall be equipped at all times with adequate fire extinguishing equipment as determined by the local fire department and according to the regulations of the State Inspection Bureau.
SECTION 11: PETS AND ANIMALS.
No pets or animals shall run at large or commit any nuisance within the limits or any mobile home park.

SECTION 12: WALKWAYS AND SKIRTING.
All land shall be to be skirting shall be connected to common walks, to paved access drives or to paved driveways or parking spaces connected to a paved access drive. Such individual walks shall have a minimum width of two (2) feet.
SECTION 13: EXPOSED SURFACES.
Exposed ground surfaces in all parts of every mobile home park shall be paved, or covered with a stone or screenings or other solid material or protected with vegetative growth capable of preventing erosion, mud or objectionable dust.
SECTION 14: ENTRIES.
No entrance to the park shall be within 200 feet of intersecting public streets.
SECTION 15: SIGNS.
There shall be but one park sign which shall be no higher than eight (8) feet and adapted to the entrance of the park.

SECTION 16: ANCHORS AND TIE DOWNS.
Every mobile home shall have at least four (4) anchors or tie downs and each shall sustain a minimum tensile strength of 2,800 pounds.
SECTION 17: AREA LIGHTING.
All common walks and drives shall be well-lighted throughout the night.
SECTION 18: TRAILER PARKING.
Parking spaces for boats, trailers, recreation vehicles and extra vehicles shall be provided, and such vehicles shall not be parked in home drives or common access drives unless they are being loaded or unloaded.
SECTION 19: UTILITY LINES AND ANTENNAS.
All utility lines shall be underground and there shall be one community antenna situated in a corner away from the home areas, which television (CATV) is permissible when properly installed.
SECTION 20: TRASH BURNING.
No burning of trash, refuse or garbage shall be permitted.

SECTION 21: INSPECTION.
The park and the registry of the occupants thereof shall be at all reasonable hours open for inspection by the Village of Plymouth or its agents.
SECTION 22: NEW OR ADDED FACILITIES: REMODELING.
Additions or remodeling of established facilities such as driveways, walkways landscaping, fences, etc., shall conform to the approved site plan.
SECTION 23: SANITARY CODE REGULATIONS:
Conformance with the State of Ohio and the Village of Plymouth sanitary code and health regulations relative to construction, drainage, safety, sanitation and operation of Mobile Home Parks shall be complied with except where the applicable regulations to this Ordinance requiring a higher standard shall be passed.

SECTION 24: NON-CONFORMING LOTS, LAND USES AND STRUCTURE:
Non-conforming lots, land uses and structures that were in operation prior to this Ordinance shall not be enlarged upon, extended or used as a basis for adding other structures or for land uses prohibited by this Ordinance. Nothing in this section shall be deemed as prohibiting the continued use of non-conforming lots, land uses and structures in operation prior to the Ordinance. However, if any such non-conforming use is once abandoned the conditions of the Ordinance shall apply to any new or renewed use of lots, lands and structures. Any non-conforming lot, land or structure where service or usage has been discontinued for a period of two (2) years shall be considered abandoned.
SECTION 25: SALE OF MOBILE HOMES.
Nothing contained in this Ordinance shall be deemed as prohibiting the sale of a mobile home located on a mobile home stand and connected to the pertinent utilities.
SECTION 26: VIOLATIONS:
Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined \$50.00 for the first offense and \$50.00 for every subsequent offense. Each day \$50.00 for the provisions thereof violated shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.
SECTION 27: REVOCATION.
Any other Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance is hereby revoked.
SECTION 28: EFFECTIVE DATE.
This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

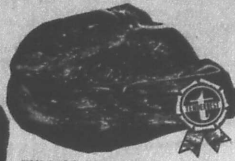

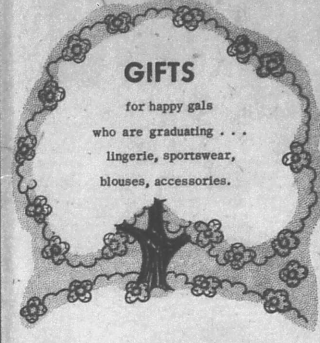

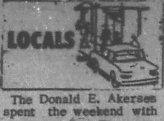
