ORDINANCE NO. 6-72
AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION OF MOBILE HOME PARKS.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1: For the purpose of this Ordinance the term "Mobile Home Park" shall mean aplot of ground upon which mobile homes occupied for dwelling or sleeping purposes are located.
A "Mobile Home" is a detached single family dwelling unit with all of the following characteristics:

A "Mobile Home" is a detached single family dwelling unit with all of the following characteristics:

(a) Designed for permanent occupancy and containing sleeping accommodations, a flush tollet, a tub or shower bath and kitchen facilities, with plumbing and sewer and electrical connections provided for attachment to outside systems:

(b) Designed to be transported after fabrication on its own wheels, on odetachable wheels, or on flatbed or other hauling devices.

(c) Arriving furnished or unfurnished at the site where it is to be occupied as a dwelling complete and ready for occupancy except for minor and incidental unpacking and assembly operations. SECTION 2: MOBILE HOME PARK\_VISES.

Except as otherwise provided its this Ordinance, no part of any park shall be used for non-residential purposes, except such uses that are required for the direct servicing and well being of park residents and for the management and maintenance of the park.

SECTION 3: CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS.

Prior to the issuance of a zoning certificate for a mobile home park, or any portion thereof, a detalled site development plan shall be submitted to the Village of Plymouth and shall be approved upon a finding that all applicable regulations are met.

The site plan shall be drawn to a legible scale, shall show topographical features of the lot, building placement, mobile home spaces, activity areas, planting and clandscaping plan, and shall include a circulation and parking plan with appropriate engineering and construction details.

If development is to proceed in phases, a zoning certificate shall be gramed for only those phases meeting the regulations pertaining to the detailed development plan, bonding and other requirements entirely and the parking and construction details.

Detailed plans for any phase shall be accompanied by a general site development, proposed street, patterns and lot arrangement for the entire area proposed for development as a mobile home park. The site plan shall show that a proper relationship does exist between access drives, service roads, triveways, and parking areas to encourage pedestrian and vehicular safety.

SECTION 4: LOCATION:

The park shall be located on a well-drained ste, properly graded to prevent erosion or the forming of stagnans water pools on the site, and in conformity with the drainage pattern for the area.

SECTION 5: SIZE AND SPACE MINIMUMS.

Each mobile home space shall be a minimum of five thousand (5,000) square feet for each single unit and shall be clearly defined as to boundaries. The density of such develop-

ment shall not exceed eight (8) mobile homes per acre of total project site. Such buffer shall be maintained and landscanced from the state of the state of

All homes must be fully skirted and shall be connected to common walks, to paved access drives or to paved driveways or parking spaces connected to a paved access drive, Such individual walks shall have a minimum width of two (2) feet. SECTION 13: EXPOSED GROUND SURFACES.

SECTION 24: NON-CONNORMING LOTS, LAND USES AND STRUCTURE:
Non-conforming lots, land uses and structures that were in operation prior to this Ordinance shall not be enlarged upon, extended or used as a basis for adding other structures or for land uses prohibited by this Ordinance. Nothing in this section shall be deemed as prohibiting the continued use of non-conforming lots, land uses and structures. 




