

PARADE, RACE SET —

First alumni reunion since '54 Saturday

Plymouth will mark the nation's 104th Memorial Day Saturday with ceremonies at the cenotaph in Greenlawn cemetery, a parade and an address, a 2.2-mile road race for high school boys and the first mass reunion of Plymouth High school graduates since 1954.

Ehret-Parcel Post 447, American Legion is sponsoring the program. Its spokesman says, "The format is changed this year because we found we were spending most of our money on a part of the program that nobody attended. We're trying to correct that situation."

WREATHS WILL BE laid in the cemetery at 9:15 a. m. Prayer for the dead will be said by the Rev. Allan Colgan, minister of Plymouth and Shiloh United Methodist

churches. Legion firing squad will execute the volley to the dead, whereupon two Plymouth High school trumpeters will sound taps and the echo. The national anthem will be played by the high school band, directed by John O'Malley.

The parade will form at once and march north in Route 96 and 61 to Mills avenue, turning west to Railroad street, thence north to West Broadway and east to the library, where it will halt for a brief program.

Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., mayor of Plymouth, will lead the pledge of allegiance.

David Howard, president of the Class of 1972, of the Class of 1972, Plymouth High school, will read the general order of Gen. John A. Logan, commander-in-chief, GAR,

establishing Memorial day. Nancy Swind, also a 12th grader, will deliver "Some Thoughts on Memorial Day."

The Rev. M. P. Paetzner, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran church, Bucyrus, former Lutheran pastor here, will deliver the Memorial Day address.

The parade will march again to Sandusky street and conclude at Plymouth High school.

The road race will start immediately thereafter in the parking lot of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic church, where Harold W. (Pete) Ruckman will be starter.

Runners of 19 schools have been invited. Trophies will be presented to the first three individual finishers and the first three team finishers.

Route is west in Hoffman street, south in Park avenue, east in West Broadway, south in Bell street, east in West East High streets, north in Mulberry street, west in Trux street, north in Porter and Maple streets, through the school gate and into the park accessway, thence once around the park road and into the stadium, turning one lap before the finish.

Salvatore J. Glorioso is clerk of the course.

"We tried to reach all living graduates," the committee says. "Obviously it was impossible to do this by ourselves, because there are no records of the whereabouts of graduates except as they may be known by friends or families. Some relied on a class agent for each class, a person believed to be knowledgeable and reliable who would send invitations to each graduate. If a graduate did not receive such an invitation, it is likely the class agent was unwilling to perform as requested. It wouldn't be fair to publish the names of the class agents, but any graduate wishing to know who was the agent may consult the list on request."

A brief alumni program will be conducted in the high school at 1:45 p. m.

The Class of 1922, marking its 50th anniversary with all members alive and present, will be honored.

Raymond D. Pugh, Shelby, will respond to it. Class of 1947, marking its 25th anniversary, will be represented by Leonard Fenner, now a plumber and heating contractor and housing developer.

Young Howard will speak for the Class of 1972.

He is married and the father of four children, three of whom are teachers. He lives in Upper Arlington.

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ORDINANCE No. 6-72
AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION OF MOBILE HOME PARKS.

SECTION 1: For the purpose of this Ordinance the term "Mobile Home Park" shall mean a plot of ground upon which mobile homes are occupied for dwelling or sleeping purposes are located.
A "Mobile Home" is a detached single family dwelling unit with all of the following characteristics:
(a) Designed for permanent occupancy and containing sleeping accommodations, a flush toilet, a tub or shower bath and kitchen facilities, with plumbing and sewer and electrical connections providing for attachment to outside systems;
(b) Designed to be transported after fabrication on its own wheels, on detachable wheels, or on flatbed or other hauling devices.
(c) Arriving furnished or unfurnished at the site where it is to be occupied as a dwelling complete and ready for occupancy except for minor and incidental unpacking and assembly operations.

SECTION 2: MOBILE HOME PARK USES:
Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, any part of any park shall be used for non-residential purposes, except such uses that are required for the direct servicing and well being of park residents and for the management and maintenance of the park.

SECTION 3: CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS:
Prior to the issuance of a zoning certificate for a mobile home park, or any portion thereof, a detailed site development plan shall be submitted to the Village of Plymouth and shall be approved upon a finding that all applicable regulations are met.
The site plan shall be drawn to a legible scale, shall show topographical features of the lot, building placement, mobile home spaces, activity areas, planting and landscaping plans and shall include a circulation and parking plan with appropriate engineering and construction details.
If development is to proceed in phases, a zoning certificate shall be granted for only those phases meeting the regulations pertaining to the detailed development plan, bonding and other requirements of this Ordinance.
Detailed plans for any phase shall be accompanied by a general site development plan which shall show surrounding land use, recreation and open space development, proposed street patterns and lot arrangement for the entire area proposed for development as a mobile home park. The site plan shall show that a proper relationship does exist between access drives, service roads, driveways, and parking areas to encourage pedestrian and vehicular safety.

SECTION 4: LOCATION:
The park shall be located on a well-drained site, properly graded to prevent erosion or the forming of stagnant water pools on the site, and in conformity with the drainage pattern for the area.
SECTION 5: SIZE AND SPACE MINIMUMS:
The minimum size site to be developed shall be ten (10) acres. Each mobile home space shall be a minimum of five thousand (5,000) square feet for each single unit and shall be clearly defined as to boundaries. The density of such develop-

ment shall not exceed eight (8) mobile homes per acre of total park site. Each home shall have a minimum living area of 720 square feet, and be occupied by no more than two persons per bedroom.
SECTION 6: CLEARANCE DISTANCES:
There shall be at least ten (10) feet clearance between adjacent mobile homes, including their structural additions as carports, porches, patios, etc. No mobile home or structural addition shall be closer than twenty (20) feet to an access drive within the park, or twenty (20) feet from any property line bounding the park, or two hundred (200) feet from any permanent existing residence outside the park, unless separated therefrom by a natural buffer or artificial buffer six (6) feet in height. Such buffer shall be maintained and landscaped to provide an obscuring screen. The type, quantity and planted height of materials used for buffering shall be shown of the site development plan. No structure of any type shall be closer than twenty (20) feet to any property line bounding the park.

SECTION 7: ACCESS DRIVES:
All mobile home spaces shall abut upon an access drive of not less than twenty-five (25) feet in pavement width, which shall have unobstructed access to a public thoroughfare. Paved off-access drive parking shall be provided at the rate of at least two (2) spaces per mobile home space. All access drives, parking and service areas shall be paved with concrete, asphalt or equivalent and shall conform to construction standards approved by the County Engineer as adequate for the type of use proposed.
SECTION 8: UTILITIES:
The installation of all utilities, including electrical and street lighting, and waste, water supply and plumbing shall comply with all applicable state and local codes and regulations. Every mobile home shall be provided with proper connections to the village utility systems. Tanks for stored gas, fuel oil or other fuels shall be stored upon properly secured mounts and shall be away from home entries and exits.
SECTION 9: REFUSE COLLECTION:
Procedures and facilities for refuse and garbage collection shall be provided for according to Codes set forth by the State of Ohio.
SECTION 10: FIRE PROTECTION:
Each park shall be equipped at all times with adequate fire extinguishing equipment as determined by the local fire department and according to the regulations of the State Inspection Bureau.
SECTION 11: PETS AND ANIMALS:
No pets or animals shall run at large or commit any nuisance within the limits or any mobile home park.
SECTION 12: WALKWAYS AND SKIRTING:
All homes must be fully skirted and shall be connected to common walks, to paved access drives or to paved driveways or parking spaces connected to a paved access drive. Such individual walks shall have a minimum width of two (2) feet.
SECTION 13: EXPOSED GROUND SURFACES:
Exposed ground surfaces in all parts of every mobile home park shall be paved, or covered with a stone or screenings or other solid material or protected with vegetative growth capable of preventing erosion, mud or objectionable dust.
SECTION 14: ENTRIES:
No entrance to the park shall be within 200 feet of intersecting public streets.
SECTION 15: SIGNS:
There shall be but one park sign which shall be no higher than eight (8) feet and adapted to the entrance of the park.
SECTION 16: ANCHORS AND THE DOWNS:
Every mobile home shall have at least four (4) anchors or the downs and each able to sustain a minimum tensile strength of 2,800 pounds.
SECTION 17: AREA MAINTENANCE:
All common walks and drives shall be well-lighted throughout the night.
SECTION 18: VEHICLE PARKING:
Parking spaces for boats, trailers, recreation vehicles and other vehicles shall be provided, and such vehicles shall not be parked in home drives or common access drives unless they are being loaded or unloaded.
SECTION 19: UTILITY LINES AND ANTENNAS:
All utility lines shall be underground and there shall be one community antenna situated in a corner away from the homes area. Cable television (CATV) is permissible when properly installed.
SECTION 20: TRASH BURNING:
No burning of trash, refuse or garbage shall be permitted.
SECTION 21: INSPECTION:
The park and the registry of the occupants thereof shall be at all reasonable hours open for inspection by the Village of Plymouth or its agents.
SECTION 22: NEW OR ADDED FACILITIES: REMODELING:
Additions or remodeling of established facilities such as driveways, walkways landscaping, fences, etc. shall be subject to the approved site plan.
SECTION 23: SANITARY CODE REGULATIONS:
Conformance with the State of Ohio and the Village of Plymouth sanitary code and health regulations relative to prohibiting the use of, or for land use operation of Mobile Home Parks shall be complied with except where the applicable regulations to this Ordinance requiring a higher standard shall be passed.
SECTION 24: NON-CONFORMING LOTS, LAND USES AND STRUCTURE:
Non-conforming lots, land uses and structures that were in operation prior to this Ordinance shall not be enlarged upon, extended or used as a basis for adding other structures or for land uses prohibited by this Ordinance. Nothing in this section shall be deemed as prohibiting the continued use of non-conforming lots, land uses and structures in operation prior to the Ordinance. However, if any such non-conforming use is once abandoned the conditions of the Ordinance shall apply to any new or renewed use of lots, lands and structures. Any non-conforming lot, land or structure where service or usage has been discontinued for a period of two (2) years shall be considered as abandoned.
SECTION 25: SALE OF MOBILE HOMES:
Nothing contained in this Ordinance shall be deemed to prohibiting the sale of a mobile home located on a mobile home stand and connected to the pertinent utilities.
SECTION 26: VIOLATIONS:
Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined \$50.00 for the first offense and \$50.00 for every subsequent offense. Each day that the provisions thereof are violated shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.
SECTION 27: REVOKATION:
Any other Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance is hereby revoked.
SECTION 28: EFFECTIVE DATE:
This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law. Elizabeth G. Padock, Mayor

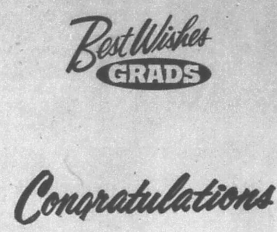
