

Mayor scores council failure to seek bids on water tower

Two days later, on Apr. 26, the company asked the council to look at other parts of the inside of the tower, which it believed requires attention and would bring the price up to just under \$10,000. The council then told the company to stop working until a decision was reached.

At a special meeting Thursday night, Solicitor Robert A. McKown said the company should be required to furnish a performance bond and show its coverage for liability and workman's compensation.

By Monday the company had furnished proof of its liability and the council informally told its members that work could continue, but only the part designated originally, with the condition that the village would cause a thorough inspection to be made before any painting is done.

Tuesday night Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock pointed out the council had acted illegally and contrary to Ohio statute. She particularly cited the signing of the contract by Ramsey, of which he does not even have a copy.

Councilman Frank R. Garber admitted the council acted improperly and said the future such work would not be undertaken without strict adherence to the law.

The solicitor was instructed to prepare the legislation, which will pay for the repairs from the water fund and its reserve fund. A sum of \$1,400 would be taken from the latter. The remainder

will come from the water fund since the work is in the nature of "capital improvement."

The old water storage tank has not been worked on since 1958, when it was thoroughly gone over.

APPROVAL WAS GIVEN to the vacating of Austin alley, which runs between Lots 108 and 109 in West Broadway to Mrs. James St. Clair and the Larue St. Gulletts. Mr. Gullett presented a petition signed by them, the Salvatore J. Giordanos and the John Gantzborns and the Elton A. Robertsons, whose property adjoins.

Upon recommendation of Fire Chief Judson A. Morrison, David Polachek and Ervin Howard were approved as new members of Plymouth Fire department.

Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., suggested the fire department repair the old tanker, which he said is unsafe to drive. It needs new tires, which will cost about \$300, plus body work, which Morrison said might be more expensive than the vehicle is worth. He admitted, however, that the vehicle is needed.

Councilman Toy Patton suggested the money would be well spent since the vehicle is needed. He asked that estimates for the repairs be obtained. He also offered the suggestion that a retirement age of 65 be set for the department. Morrison agreed but said it is becoming more difficult to find younger men willing to offer their time.

Councilman Hubert Akers said he felt the council is dragging its feet on a village ambulance

service. He said professional service in Mansfield had written to the council Oct. 3, 1971, offering to set up such a service.

The mayor said she knew nothing of the offer and was waiting for a report from Ramsey about obtaining the services of a qualified person to administer the program. It was finally agreed that Akers, Ramsey and the mayor will arrange a meeting with officials of the Fitee-Root-Heath Co. to see what can be worked out to supply service for the factory and village.

A SHORT DISCUSSION of speed limits near the Square ensued. Jacobs suggested a 25-mile-an-hour limit should be enforced from South street to Mills avenue. The matter was tabled until the council can determine if an ordinance calls for a lower speed.

Ramsey is to ask householders in Curtis drive if they will share in the cost of installing a new sewer line, which was put in this week.

When the houses were constructed there 15 to 20 years ago, their septic tanks and sewer lines emptied into a tile in a field to the north. The tile has completely plugged up over the years, so a new line was laid to collect the effluent wastes until the lateral connections are made under Phase III of the sewer program. Afterwards the line will serve for storm waters.

Herner, Arthur, Welch win in Huron county

Arthur F. Herner, veteran GOP commissioner who lives in Route 99, soundly defeated former Monroeville Mayor Kenneth G. Salisbury for the party's nomination for the Jan. 2, 1972, term in Tuesday's primary election.

Unofficial count showed Herner with 2,819 votes, Salisbury with only 1,076.

The main Democratic contest was for nomination for sheriff. Loren Welch, former Green-wich policeman now serving as police officer at New London, defeated C. J. Allison.

IN RICHLAND COUNTY, Raymond Scott and Freeman Swank won Democratic nominations for treasurer. R. E. Orewiler the race for county recorder and George Griffith defeated Anthony Cappadonna for treasurer.

On the Republican side, M. Joan Douglass won the right to face Robert R. Sawyer for 61st district representative to the Ohio House in November. Robert Mangan won the race for clerk of the court of common pleas, Anthony D. Krovinsky and Richard McFarland won the nominations to make the race for county commissioner.
