

# County buys building

Purchase of the former Norwalk Truck Lines building at Norwalk for \$300,000 will be paid for without new taxes, commissioners announced this week.

Auditor Kenneth W. Reed said it makes no difference how the commissioners opt to pay the bill, whether by issuance of general obligation bonds or by borrowing from Huron county banks, he will meet the settlement from the existing 2.1-mill operating levy.

The price of \$300,000 includes remaining contents of the building, including a computer, a bookkeeping machine, a duplicator, about 25 desks and some chairs.

The seller, Ringsby-United, successors to Norwalk Truck Lines, Inc., has agreed as a condition of sale to the purchase of air conditioners and heating system.

First occupants of the building will be four agricultural agencies.

To the departing clergyman, we owe good wishes for the future, with the prayer that he will find in his new assignment riches that he did not find here, recurrences of pleasantries that he did find here, and the opportunity to serve in ever greater measure the needs and demands of the faithful.

So, to the Rev. Mr. Colgan and his bride, hail and farewell!

And to the Rev. Mr. Reckart and his family, good luck!

# Water meter for each household likely by Sept. 1 under plan

Separate and unmetered units of multi-occupied facilities within and outside the corporation will be liable for water charges, including the minimum monthly rate of \$4, village council ruled Tuesday night.

Councilmen James L. Jacobs, Sr., and Edward O. Ramsey said the move should be passed as an emergency ordinance so

that it will be effective winter. There is a 30-day period from the date it is officially passed before it is effective.

Councilman Donald E. Akers held out for three readings and won support of the council.

At the suggestion of Solicitor Robert A. McKown, Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock will check with the FIA office in Norwalk to determine if there is a particular date required of the village to show how many water users it has. Right now, the village lacks the required number. FIA has determined to be necessary for the use of the proposed new sewer installation.

Three readings of the ordinance will mean that no additional billing can be done before September. The mayor pointed out that the village is also losing some revenue. The proposed ordinance incorporates three other water regulations for convenience. The rates established by Ordinance 22 in 1956 remain the same after the minimum incorporation of metered units and charges for users outside the village area also the same as those in effect now.

The council agreed with the police committee that the purchase of a used motor with low mileage for the cruiser should be investigated. Sgt. Robert Seal thinks one can be bought for around \$500.

Councilman Frank R. Garber said a battery purchased a year ago for a CD vehicle is dead. He said there should have been a warranty with it, but since it was not purchased from a retailer, there is none. A new one is being ordered.

Village Administrator Kenneth Amburgey said that last week's muddy water in bathtubs and washers was caused by a broken pump in the water plant, which was repaired promptly.

## Village hall repairs set by Shiloh

About \$500 will be spent to improve the council chambers at Shiloh, the council ruled June 14.

Ross Russell was hired at \$200 to install wall panels. New chairs to accommodate an audience, the mayor, councilmen and the clerk, new curtains and new draperies will be purchased. Painting and lighting fixtures repaired.

Pett street will be repaved at a cost of \$1,300 for 200 tons of asphalt, labor to be furnished by Richmond county highway department.

## 92% of homes in county equipped with television

Ninety-two per cent of all homes in Richmond county (38,431 of 41,631 housing units) had in 1970 at least one television set (15,746 UHF-equipped), the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, announces today.

The figures are from the first report on Ohio which presents detailed statistics on housing for each county.

The report shows that in the county:

- There were 5,036 housing units with air conditioning (3,769 with room air conditioning and 1,267 with central air conditioning).
- There were 3,646 units with a clothes washing machine, 25,311 with a clothes dryer and 7,279 with a dishwasher.
- The 1970 population was 129,997, with an average of 3.2 persons per housing unit.
- A total of 23,354 housing units were built before 1949, 4,483 during 1950-64, and one (in 1965-71) within the five years preceding April, 1970, census.
- Utility gas was used to cook the meals in 18,000 households, electricity in another 19,727.

## Owners occupied 29,006 units, renters 10,865

There were 40,566 occupied units and one (in 1965-71) within the five years preceding April, 1970, census.

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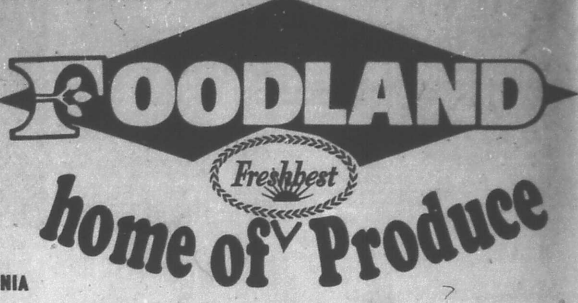

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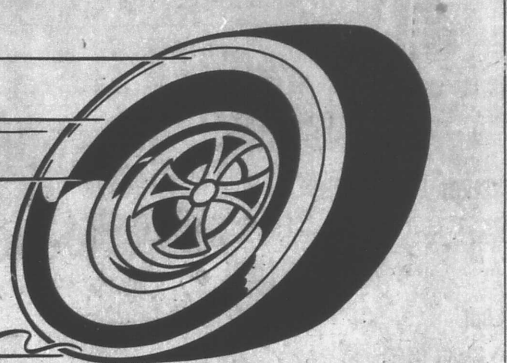

## Migrant hirers dispute claims of health board

An official of the Ohio Agricultural Marketing association, an affiliate of the Ohio Farm Bureau, says his organization would be glad to cooperate with the Ohio Department of Health in working toward adequate housing for migrant workers.

Paul Slade, OAMA general manager, says "we continue to work for good migrant housing as we have for many years." However, Slade has some objections to the manner in which the health department has handled the current situation.

"I feel that the new stories released by the department have done a great disservice to many growers who have spent thousands of dollars in improving their facilities and providing quality housing."

"Their news release stated that 900 housing sites were inspected, when in fact, only about 125 had been inspected at that time. And, a health department spokesman admits that the inspectors went directly to some of the poorer sites to start the inspection campaign," Slade claims. He says this same official stated that Ohio has some of the best migrant housing facilities in the United States.

"We realize that there are some migrant housing facilities which aren't what they should be. It's our job to make them better. But to make such serious charges on the basis of having inspected less than 15 per cent of the migrant facilities required a bit of premature judgment," Slade says.

RESOLUTION NO. 18-72 A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, DECLARING THE NECESSITY TO CONSTRUCT PHASE III OF THE SEWER SYSTEM.

WHEREAS, the Village of Plymouth has concluded and placed into service certain sewer lagoons, sewer lines, pumping stations and forced mains which collect and discharge the sewage generated by the inhabitants of the Village of Plymouth.

WHEREAS, the Council of the Village of Plymouth find that the surveys, construction of additions, extensions and enlargements of the sewer system, and the construction of lateral lines are necessary to protect and preserve the public health, safety and welfare of the Village of Plymouth.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1: It is hereby determined to be necessary for the protection and preservation of the public health, safety and convenience of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, to make surveys, construct additions and enlargements of the Village Sewer System including lateral lines in accordance with plans and specifications currently on file in the office of the Clerk in said Village.

SECTION 2: Said additions and enlargements shall be constructed by the Village not presently serviced by sewer as described in Section 1 of this resolution and all such plans and specifications on file and shall include W. Broadway, East Main, Sandusky Street, Plymouth Street, Railroad Street, Mills Street, High Street, Millberry, Park Avenue, W. Clinton Street, Fortner Street and all other districts set forth in said plans. The character of the material to be used in the construction of the sewer system shall be as set forth in the plans and specifications on file.

SECTION 4: The Clerk of said Village shall cause this resolution to be published once a week for not less than two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the Village of Plymouth in accordance with Section 73-35 of Ohio Revised Code.
