

Record budget set for schools in 1973

A record general fund budget for 1973, an increase of about 21 per cent over last year was approved after public hearing by Plymouth Board of Education Monday night.

The budget exceeds the previous record by \$22,411.

It calls for expenditures of \$1,124,762, which would leave a balance in the general fund on Dec. 31, 1973, of only \$2,801.

Stephen Root Fazzini told the board the anticipated revenues certified by the Richland county auditor include payments due from the Penn Central railroad, which is in bankruptcy proceedings and stopped by federal court order from paying real estate taxes.

Other anticipated revenues due to Plymouth Local School district approximate \$27,000 a year.

Anticipated revenues during 1973 include an estimated general fund balance of \$44,000 on Dec. 31, 1972; \$400,000 from property taxes, \$658,083 from state foundation payments, \$15,000 from federal sources and \$10,000 from other state sources.

Principal purposes of expenditure include \$56,998, up from \$55,980, for administration; \$655,554, up from \$642,700, for instructional services; \$29,580, up from \$29,000, for library services; \$72,400, up from \$71,000, for transportation of pupils; \$500, a new appropriation, for playgrounds and community centers; \$133,314, up from \$130,700 for other auxiliary agencies; Also, \$105,356, up from \$103,300, for operation

of school plant; \$29,570, up from \$29,000, for maintenance of school plant, and \$41,500, up from \$38,207.44, for capital outlay.

Bond retirement fund receipts during 1973 are anticipated at \$137,204.40 and disbursements at \$122,543.60.

Bonded indebtedness is now \$845,000, of which \$72,000 plus interest of \$49,982.50 will be settled by 1975, freeing all buildings save the high school addition and the new elementary school at Shiloh from indebtedness.

New law sets greater income for homesteader

Taxpayers who feared they would not qualify for homestead exemption because the total income of members of the household exceeded \$8,000 may now do so.

The law has been changed so that any related person's income is to be included in arriving at the total income of the applicant and spouse.

Final date for filing this year has been extended from July 1 to and including July 31.

Applicants who have already filed their application with the county auditor are requested to check their buff copy of the application form to determine the amount of related persons' income that should be deleted and notify the county auditor's office. The incomes of both husband and wife are to be included, but the income of any other related person or persons residing in the homestead is to be excluded.

Any taxpayer who may now be delinquent in the law may apply at the county auditor's office.

Applicants should submit a copy of their 1971 federal income tax return.

Robert Garrett appointed chief of ambulance service

Robert Garrett, present head of Plymouth Civilian Defense unit, was appointed temporary head of the new village ambulance service by village council Tuesday night.

He will meet with any prospective volunteers to man the service Tuesday night at 7:30 p. m. in the firehouse.

He told the council that so far, including himself, there are seven persons interested in taking the required training, a special rescue course of 80 hours over a 20-week period.

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock said she hopes there will be at least 20, which would spread the burden of maintaining a schedule over more persons.

Once it is determined how many are interested, arrangements will be made for the instruction.

With a 20-week training period, the mayor said it may be possible to use persons being trained along with Garrett and Donald Vanderpool, who are taking the course now, to share the responsibility with R. Earl McQuate sooner than planned.

The ambulance is to be repaired by Carl M. McPherson for \$125.

A formal resolution was passed to express the village's gratitude to Miles Christian and the officials of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. for their gift of the ambulance.

At the suggestion of Village Administrator Kenneth R. Amburgey, the resolution to invest \$7,000 in the electric re-serve fund in a time deposit with Peoples National bank was rescinded.

He told the council that his working funds are dangerously low and that receipts of the electric department barely exceed expenses. He pointed out that rates have not been changed since 1964, but in the eight-year period costs have risen substantially. The money is to be transferred from the reserve fund to the electric fund, thus leaving a little over \$30,800 in the re-serve fund, with \$30,000 invested in time deposits.

Free lunches run up costs of cafeterias

Fifteen per cent of pupils who eat in Shiloh cafeterias don't pay for their meals, says John Fazzini, kind told Plymouth Board of Education Monday night.

The figure in the two cafeterias in Plymouth is nine per cent.

His report showed a total of 179,368 meals served during the 1971-72 school year, 86,608 of them at Shiloh, where 13,604 free lunches were served to pupils who cannot pay for them. A total of 44,932 meals were served in the elementary school here and 33,901 in the high school, of which 7,322 were not paid for.

Each free meal served in the high school costs five cents more than we receive in subsidy," Fazzini said, "but each grade school meal costs us five cents less than we receive."

Average daily serving of meals in all cafeterias was 1,050, amounting to 78.4 per cent of enrollment.

The average cost per serving in Plymouth was 53.8 cents, in Shiloh 45.4 cents.

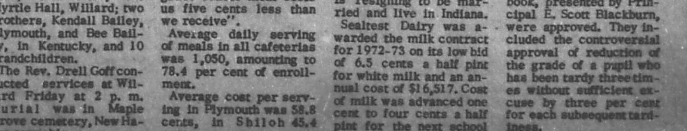

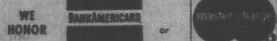
