Budget wins approval

A balanced budget calling for expenditures of \$38,862.00 from the general fund was sent to the Richland county auditor Tuesday night.

The 1973 proposal would leave no balance in the general fund on Dec. 31, 1973.

"This budget is a fairer and more reasonable approach to the real facts of municipal revenues than previous budgets and will challenge the council to make its appropriations sensibly and to approve expenditures cautiously," Mayor Eliza-

beth G. Paddock said. How the electric fund supports other departments is shown by its projection: receipts of \$137,235.76, disbursements of \$134,350, leaving a bal-

ance of \$2,885.76. All funds are in balance with a small working margin.

The problem of a trailer food handlers must submit to TB test

Huron County Department of Health reminds food handlers an annual skin test or chest x-ray is required. (Only those persons who have a positive reaction to the skin test need an x-ray.)

For persons who work as food concessionaires at the Huron County fair, the tests need to be done and read before the fair begins. Those who have had the test for some other reason within the past 12 months need only present their cards to the employer to show they have complied.

Tuberculin skin tests are offered free of charge at the health department offices on the third floor of the court house in Norwalk Wednesdays from 10 a. m. to 11 a. m.

The test is read two days later.

Those under 21 years of age who are not married must have written parental consent to get the test.

Baked beans offer variation on a theme

Baked beans are a great favorite with just about everyone.

There are dozens of ways to prepare them. Even the canned ones which you simply heat up can be very tasty. But if you have a little time, this recipe is worth it.

Start with a pound of dried pea beans. Wash them, cover with water and bring to a boil. Allow them to continue boiling for two minutes. Then put them aside, still covered, for an hour.

Again put them back on the burner and bring them to a boil and cook until they are tender.

In a bean pot or deep casserole place thin slices of salt pork and onions. Then add about half of the beans. Then place slices of pared apples on the layer of beans. Add remainder of beans. If you have some salt pork left, cube it, and press it into the mixture.

In a small bowl mix together a half cup of tomato pulp, a half cup of dark molasses, one and a half cups of beef broth, two teaspoons of salt, half a teaspoon of pepper, half

a teaspoon of celery salt and a teaspoon each of dry mustard and Worcestershire sauce.

Pour this over the beans, cover and bake in a slow oven at least six hours, if they look a little dry, add some water.

IF YOU SIMPLY DONOT have the time to cook them so long, you can use canned beans, and just make up the sauce mixture and bake a short time.

There's nothing like a good summer pie either, and this is just about the time for it.

Make up your best pie crust recipe and arrange the bottom crust in your best pie tin. Mix three fourths of a cup of sugar with two tablespoons of flour, a dash of salt, one tablespoon of lemon juice, a little grated lemon rind and a small amount of nutmeg and a little more of cinnamon.

Cover the crust with a generous layer of sliced peaches and apples, alternating them. Sprinkle them with the dry flavoring, then add another layer of fruit. Keep going until it is all used up. Dot the top with a little butter and roll out the

rest of the pie crust into lattice strips.

It bakes in a hot oven for not quite an hour. Once all these things are polished off, you can sit back and enjoy summer with a good book. Or you can simply watch the birds flitting around. It is the time to relax and be glad you aren't going to Miami, where no one will be relaxing.
