

## Can village recover cost of chief's long sick leave?

The possibility of re-couping salary paid to Police Chief Robert L. Meiser for 120 days of sick leave was suggested to village council Tuesday night by Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock.

Since he was forced off the job by an accident that was not his fault, she

said there ought to be the possibility of the village being reimbursed by the insurance companies involved.

Meiser has used up all of his sick leave at this point and is now on vacation time until his doctors release him to return to duty.

Last year he used about a month's time to recuperate from injuries received in another accident, also not his fault.

Solicitor Robert A. McKown is to investigate the matter for the village.

## Family spat sends man to jail

Steven Patterson, Mansfield, posted bond of \$50 in mayor's court over the weekend and was released from the village jail after he was accused by Eugene Wechter of disorderly conduct.

Patterson was married to a young daughter, the complainant's step-daughter.

He said the mayor's claim shown in the new budget was more realistic for the coming year than it had been in the past was not accurate.

He said that costs for the police department will run over \$40,000 this year and asked how the general fund will repay the three loans to it from Peoples National bank which total \$15,000.

Councilmen Donald E. Akers and James L. Jacobs, Sr., were quick to point out that they have estimated salaries for the police will run between \$26,000 and \$28,000 this year, which takes in account that Chief Meiser has completed his 120 days of sick leave and is now using vacation time.

Mayor Paddock said tax money is slower coming in this year than last year and that the village has already a large amount (\$2,600) deducted for auditor's charges which did not occur last year and could anticipate another substantial sum because of the auditor's fee for the clerk's annual report in March.

Akers added that another reason the tax money is slower in coming in is that village clerks have changed frequently during the year. He said he found this to be true in the phases when he had served as councilman.

# Shades of Teddy Roosevelt! High school girl visits Badlands

A Plymouth High school pupil en route to Alaska by car has applied an inquisitive mind and a keen eye to what she's seen so far.

Anita Riedlinger, who'll be a 12th grader in September, is with her parents, the Raymond Riedlingers.

Her report: "North Dakota did seem

to have marshy areas in quite a few places where we stopped. The Indians living in their reservations are in just hurs with the animals going in and out of the but at their pleasure; the people are so thin, too!

"A large part of the Badlands is made of lava. The heat of a slowly burning coal bed then turned the

gray clay to red brick, hardened and now resists erosion because it is harder than rock. This "rock" is now called scoria, which caps the grassy flat encirles on top of mountains called buttes to make them look snow-covered. The other major part is comprised of shale and limestone.

"LIGNITE BEDS BURN. The slumping of the earth opens large cracks in it and speeds erosion. Sometimes lightning and spontaneous combustion ignite and cause a natural fire in the lignite. The scoria then encircles the fire. This process started many thousands of years ago.

"Prairie dogs are nothing but ground squirrels that bark and live in their own communities. A sentinel constantly keeps guard over each home. He marks the first sign of danger. The others then hurry to the tower. Nearby prairie dogs plunge underground while others bark and relay the danger message across town. Their natural enemies include hawks (which feed on them), eagles, snakes, badgers and the rare black-footed ferret.

"Never feed a prairie dog salty foods! They never drink water. They will also dehydrate. Rangers say to feed them carrots and such vegetables. And such vegetables. They obtain their moisture from grass roots.

"There are only two pairs of mating golden eagles in the park today. The others have been killed. These also feed on prairie dogs.

"Teddy Roosevelt's first home was in the Badlands. The Badlands are now dedicated to this great peconmaker and president, scientist and

family man, who was so moved by their beauty that he helped form them into a national park. He once told a friend 'I would not have been president had it not been for my experiences in North Dakota.' In the disaster of 1887, 60 per cent of his cattle herd was destroyed.

"I'D RECOMMEND seeing the Northern Badlands to the Southern. Cost is only \$2, plus \$2 if you plan to stay over in a camp site for one night, which you don't really need to do because the entire Badlands trips

only 29 miles round trip in the lower section and 38 miles in the upper section."

Miss Riedlinger was captivated by Yellowstone National park.

But she has some pithy observations. "I think Yellowstone is becoming more commercialized than it should be. There are too many motels, lodges and recreation places being built for people to actually enjoy the natural. You can get that in a city! To get the natural should be in a park! The government should not let this happen!

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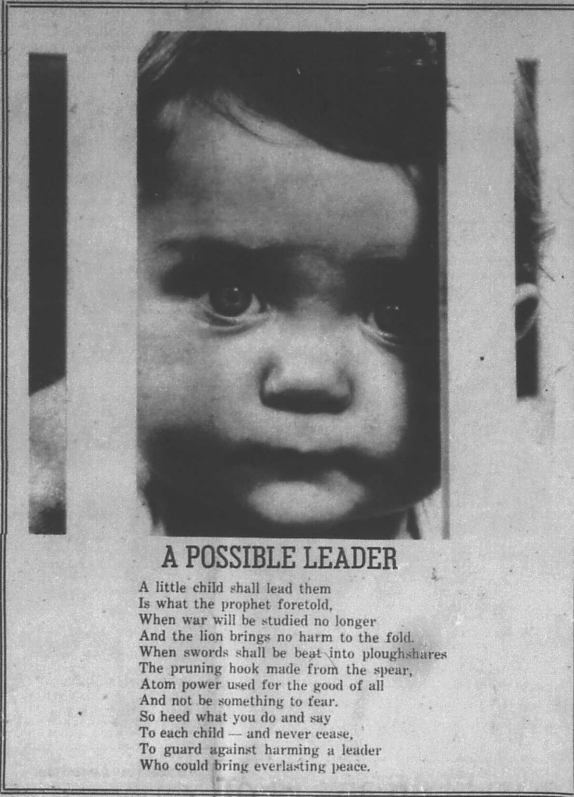
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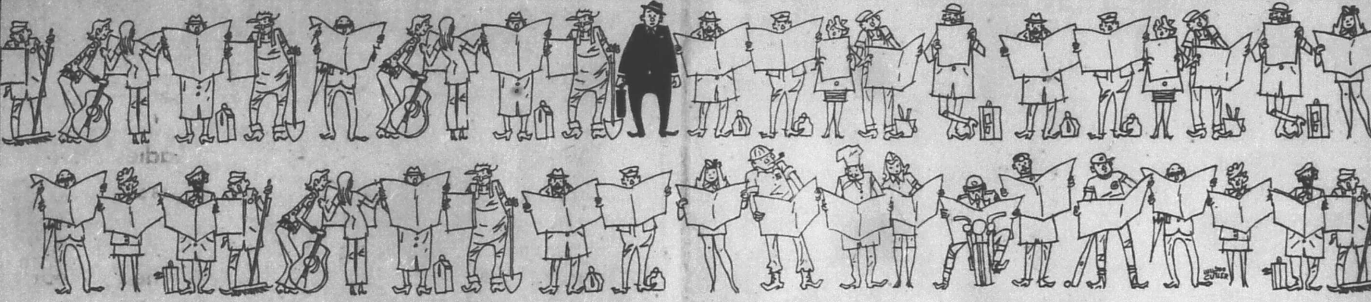
