Only 5% lived outside Ohio seven years ago

Say what you will about Johnnies - come-lately in Huron county, the fact is that only five per cent of all residents lived outside Ohio in 1965.

Among a total of 49,587, only 2,567 were the age of five, resided in another state seven years ago.

A total of 4,821 over five years of age, or roughly 10 per cent, lived in another county seven years ago.

Average family income was \$9,838, about four per cent below Ohio's average of \$10,313.

Per capita income was \$2,817. School population amounted in the 1970 census to 14,365 between age three and 34.

Of those over 25, 52 per cent of males and 59 per cent of females were high school graduates.

The work force? Huron countians aged 16 or over included as employed or eligible for employment amounted to 80 per cent of the male population and 41 per cent of the female population.

Of those employed, 34 per cent were engaged in white collar jobs and 11 per cent were government (federal, state and local) employees.

Thirty-nine per cent of married women living with their husbands were in the work force. Twenty-six per cent of these had children under six years.

Unpaid taxes subject to penalty, rollback lost

Harold B. Collier, Huron on County treasurer, says a ruling from the state board of tax appeals is unjust but he can't do anything about it.

The ruling says any tax remaining unpaid bears additional penalty. The taxpayer forfeits the 10 per cent rollback feature and the tax reverts to the normal half tax before the penalty applies.

The treasurer is now charged with this difference.

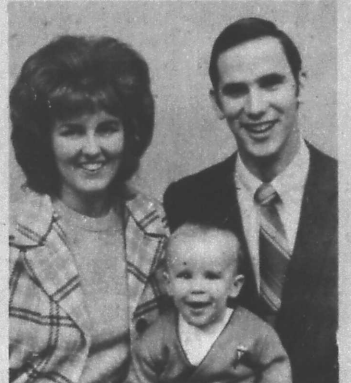

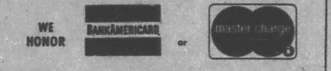
