There's still gold in Yukon, and you can stake a claim!

Going to Canada? Change your money in a bank and pay the 2.75 per cent difference in two counsels Anta Riedinger, 61 North street, Plymouth High school pupil touring the Pacific Northwest and Alaska.

"We have been changing along the way now," she says, "which is not recommended because of the day-to-day fluctuation of the value of the American dollar in Canada. Some places will charge two per cent, three per cent, four per cent and even five per cent. But a larger store didn't charge us anything and we received American money as change at the same time!"

She says a driver need not have insurance, but he must have a license, if he's interested in was-sail, he can bring 32 ounces back into this country duty free, if he's been in the States 48 hours or more. But you can do this once a month, only.

"We have paid as much as 80 cents a gallon for gasoline, but that's not so bad -- there're five quarts to a Canadian gallon. One place in a remote area they had no electricity and for the first time in my life I saw gas hand pumped into a 10-gallon container and then pumped into a car from there!"

TOURISM IN THE PACIFIC Northwest area of Canada has increased 38 per cent, Mike Riedinger found, because of the Al-Can Highway, now called the Alaska Highway.

Last year, because of the rains, bad weather and cold temperatures, many tourists reached Dawson Creek and then turned back. One gas station owner told me he bought the station on Monday and by Thursday his tanks were dry! And he added he hates to think of the Alaska Highway being paved, because 48 per cent of his trade consists of selling tires and repairing cars.

"We got two small cracks in our windshield

caused by semi-trucks throwing gravel. The road is not so bad if you average 20 miles an hour or slower, especially when pulling a trailer. One man who goes to Alaska on business every year told me the road is in better condition this year than since he started coming up here 10 years ago. He said he can make 70 miles an hour in son's places, I don't know how."

At Dawson Creek, British Columbia, the Riedingers bought their motel post for \$29.95 -- it's the custom for tourists to place the name of their home towns at Watson Lake in the Yukon. It's only 1,534 miles to Fairbanks, Alaska, from Milepost 0.

There were 81 posts, about the size of telephone poles, with every home town from Switzerland to Alaska I wish I had made out with a village limit sign, as most of the Ohio signs I saw were city or village limit signs, including Shaker Heights, Springfield, Lorain, Ravenna, Westerville, Akron, Jackson, Mansfield, Dresden, Dayton, Ashland, Miamiville, Bealsville, Kenton, Defiance, Mayfield Heights, Newart, Toledo, Coshocton, Marion, Powell, Bay Village, Tiffin, Davenport, Cincinnati, Lancaster, Cleveland and 17 others I won't mention. And I

saw one sign that said, "The Home of the Big Red -- Plymouth, Ind." I'm prepared to pay the big gold, but I need finger counsels. "Milk is 50 cents a quart, fresh fruit is practically unheard of. But I've had jobs pay very well up here, too."

SHOPS SEEM TO BE the same as encountered in the United States, she reports, "the brand names are the same but the prices are certainly different."

The Alaska Highway can't be paved because of the permafrost situation. This is permanently frozen ground just a few inches below the surface that, in some places, extends to 1,000 feet down. The Riedingers reached Dawson City, principal city of the Yukon, and promptly panned for gold.

We got a little -- very little! All you see in Dawson City and environs is "tailings", the debris and slag resulting from gold dredging. And if you're going to pan for gold, you must burn it first, otherwise the gold will slip out because the coating on the pan is slippery. Since gold is 16 times heavier than other metals, it settles to the bottom of the pan, which is what you want.

She recalled "The Cre-

mation of Sam McGee", the celebrated poem by Robert Service, when she saw his cabin. And she visited Jack London's cabin.

Dawson City was twice razed by fire, both set by the same woman, a dance hall girl who was angered by her roommate and flung a coal oil lamp, the first time, and did it again later when one of her clients couldn't or wouldn't pay his tab.

WANT TO STAKE A claim? Claims staked now are on small pyramid-type iron pots or piles of rocks in a pyramid shape with the name of the stake and how many feet above or below Discovery. Discovery is the place where the first gold was found and all claims relate to it as point zero. A claim is 500 yards in any straight direction and 1,000 yards on either side.

"Is there still a chance?" I found out the Mother Lode has still not been found despite the fact that hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of gold has been taken from this place. It is estimated three times as much remains to be found and mined."

Sale of Central Ohio Industrial Park, Inc., Shelby, the former Wilkins Air Force station, for \$5.3 million to a California firm was reported Friday by Jack W. Berger, president and general manager.

The new ownership is a partnership formed and headed by Andrew P. Asbra, Burlingame, Cal.

An operation in Cleveland, similar to the Central Ohio park and owned by the Berger group, was also sold.

The sale included 12 major buildings with more than two million square feet of space and covering about 24 acres with a railroad siding.

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Pickle onions, advises Auntie

By AUNT LIZ
 This is the time to gather all those empty jars you have saved since last winter and start making them useful.
 You can perk up those quick summer suppers with this recipe for onion chutney. There is one catch to it: It must be made in a glass bowl. I suppose there could be some kind of chemical reaction from a stainless steel one.
 Slice two large yellow onions very finely and wash well in cold water, in the glass bowl. Wash them five separate times and drain.
 Rub them with two teaspoons of cumin seed, then sprinkle a little salt, four teaspoons of chili powder and a few drops of Tabasco and about two tablespoons of lemon juice and a half teaspoon of lemon rind. Mix well, pour into sterilized jars and seal and stash away in your refrigerator for a few weeks to age it.
 Apple chutney can always make an ordinary looking pork chop look more chic, it is good, and apple season is coming.
 Chop up enough apples for five cups. Then add a half cup of vinegar, a cup each of thinly sliced onion sliced candied ginger and chopped walnuts, two cups each of chopped walnuts and light brown sugar, a teaspoon of salt, four of mustard seed and two of chili powder.
 Bring to a boil and let simmer for a half hour or so, and jar up.
FOR THIS RECIPE, YOU just need one good, sturdy mason jar.
 Everyone seems to like pickled things except me, which is rather stupid because you can pickle

most everything and have something tasty. Have you ever tried carrots? Peel two pounds and slice in thin strips. Simmer for a few minutes in salted water until they are not quite tender. Drain, but save two cups of the liquid. To this you add two cups of vinegar, four cups of sugar, a tablespoon of pickling spice, a teaspoon of mustard seed, about three turns of a pepper mill and a dash of coarse salt.
 Cook this until it becomes syrupy, add the carrots and cook slowly for about 20 minutes. Let them stand in their jars, sealed, for several weeks before serving them.
IF YOU HAVE A MINT patch, this is the time to unpatch it. Usually we use the Sure-Jell recipe for mint jelly, but this has a little more to it: apple juice, even though it will take a little more time. About a week ahead, pick some mint and dry it. Then you crush up enough for a teaspoonful, which you tie up in a little cheesecloth bag. When you are ready to start cooking, pick some fresh leaves, wash off and pat aside.
 Mix two cups of bottled apple juice with three and a half cups of sugar. Add the mint bag and bring to a boil, stirring all the time. When it starts to boil, add a half bottle of liquid pectin, bring to a rolling boil and cook for just one minute.
 Skim off the top and pour into little jars which have two mint leaves placed in them. Seal.
 These recipes can make nice little gifts, but put them in the nicest looking jars you can scrounge up.

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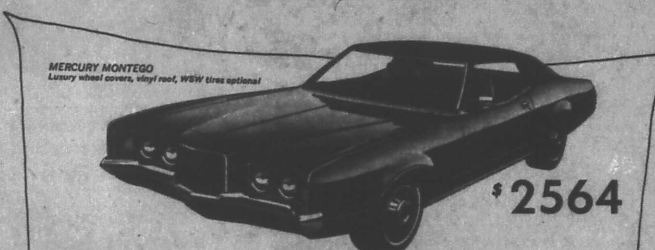
