Tree packets ready

For second time —

"The quality of mercy," said William Shakespeare in "The Merchant of Venice," "is not strain'd." Bryan Neff showed Friday night that he learned his Shakespeare well by applying that philosophy to a basketball game with Crestline here.

He put only just enough pressure against the Bulldogs to make them submit and coasted to a 79 to 60 victory.

The 19-point difference at the game's end was not a true indication of how badly the Bulldogs were beaten. 8 by outscoring Plymouth's bench in the final eight minutes was Crestline able to even become respectable.

Eight players get into the scoring act for Plymouth, an oddity in itself so far as the waning season goes. The Big Red had the game won after the first period and simply toyed with the Bulldogs thereafter.

Auntie's strong on salads —

Where to go, what to eat on return

It may still be wintery, but spring is on its way, and it is time to think of little jaunts.

Those who have children should start planning trips to places that will help them in school. Ohio is absolutely loaded with historical things to see.

Everyone knows about Edison's house, the Harding Memorial and the State Historical society in Columbus, but there is one that most people do not know exists except those who support it. This is rather sad, and it should have more publicity. It is merely a house, but has been maintained to show what it was back in the early 1800's.

It is the Waldschmidt house, about 18 miles northeast of Cincinnati at Route 126 and the Route 50 bypass. You will have to get a good map to figure this out.

I am ashamed to say we have never been there, but some day we will see it. It is a restored house built in the early years of the 1800's by Christian Waldschmidt, who came to Ohio from Pennsylvania.

He came with 10 or 12 friends through a gap in the mountains down the Ohio river. He was a veteran of the Revolution, the whole Northwest ter-

ritory was opening and he wanted to be a part of it. In 1796 he went back to get his wife, Catherine, and their eight children.

At first they all lived in a one room cabin, which later grew into a beautiful brick home.

Eventually there was no more Waldschmidt family to live in it, and it was deserted until the Civil War, when it was the headquarters of General Joshua Bates. When that was over, the house lingered on in complete loneliness until 1941, when it was bought by a Cincinnati couple, the Chesters Krogers, who gave it to the Daughters of the American Revolution. With a vengeance, all the chapters pitched in to restore it. They still are at it and would welcome any contributions of things that come from the early 1800's.

Your kids will enjoy it all. They will have a chance to see what a really old bed, and the kitchen stove, were like. This is good for them. After all most of us can well remember the day when electronic ovens did not exist, but they don't.

THE DAR'S HAVE come up with another little way to raise money which will help to keep the house going. They have

published a cook book. Granted, it is a fund raising deal; the recipes were contributed by members all over the states, and they are good. You know no self-respecting housewife is going to sign her name to one that is a complete flop. The book costs \$4.95, with \$1 of that going to the house. And it is worth it.

This is one of the gems from it and considering it is spinach salad, not bad at all, even if you do not like the stuff.

Use a pound package, wash, drain and remove the stems, and kind of tear up into smaller pieces. Then mix up a quarter of a package of herb-seasoned stuffing mix with two cur-hard-boiled eggs. In another bowl mix a third of a cup of sugar with a cup of oil, a third of a pound of cashew vinegar, a half of a teaspoon each of salt and pepper, a chopped up little onion and a teaspoon each of ordinary mus-

tard (actually the Dijon type is tastier) and celery seed.

Mix it all up so that the spinach is well coated. AND IF YOU WANT to make a real meal of just one salad, put slices of salami or boiled ham and more wedges of hard-boiled egg on top.

If you want it as part of a meal, you can use this recipe, which is good enough for guests; we still go on the theory that when you invite people to dinner, you have something special, not just the ordinary stuff you eat every day.

Prepare chicken so you end up with about three cups of diced-up pieces. Then chop up a fourth of a cup of onion and a whole cup of celery. Sauté this in some butter. Then add the chicken, with about a fourth of a pound of cashews, a can of cream of mushroom soup and a fourth of a cup of chicken broth. You can sprinkle Chinese noodles on the

top, put in a casserole and bake for a half hour. When it is finished, serve

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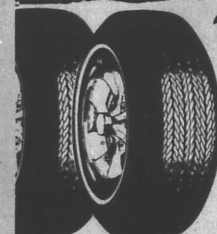
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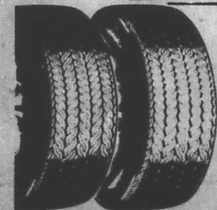
