Three teachers ask to retire, woman to speak at graduation

Three teaching careers spanning a total of 78 years will come to an end this week.

Applications for retirement were accepted by Plymouth Board of Education Monday night from Herman Workman, principal of Plymouth Elementary school; his wife, Myrtle, and Mrs. Nettie Hull.

Workman and his wife, who teaches sixth grade, came here six years ago from Mapleton district. He has taught 36 years, she 30. Mrs. Hull, a kindergarten teacher, has taught 22 years.

Over the stout objection of Ivan Hawk, who said he wants no part of "women's lib in Plymouth", Mrs. Nodine Cook Henninger, former president of Columbus Board of Education and now ombudsman for the City of Columbus, was approved as commencement speaker June 4 at 3 p. m.

A. L. Paddock, Jr., was appointed to the athletic

control board. PARTICIPATION IN the Mohican school of the out-of-door, at an estimated cost of \$5,000 for about 125 sixth graders, was tabled. Supt. John Fazzini said he has reservations about the program this year and wants to reexamine his findings before committing the board to another year.

School purchases will be unified by means of data processing at a cost of \$30 plus three cents a pupil, the board ruled.

Annual Richland county school boards meeting will be in Clear Fork district Apr. 25 at 6:30 p. m.

A school calendar for 1973-74 calling for 180 days of school, two professional days and four work days was approved. It coincides with the Pioneer Joint Vocational school calendar.

Classes will begin Sept. 1 and close Jan. 23. Thanksgiving recess is for Nov. 22 and 23, Christmas recess for

Dec. 21 through Jan. 1. Easter recess begins Apr. 8 and ends Apr. 12.

CONDUCT OF PUPILS and spectators at home football and basketball games was so exemplary, the board was told, that officials engaged by the Johnny Applesseed conference voted Plymouth to be the outstanding school for crowd sportsmanship. A rotating trophy is on display in the high school.

Whether to initiate a wrestling program in the high school will depend on recommendation of the athletic director and the high school principal during a work session Mar. 21. Paul McClintock, junior high school teacher who conducted an experimental program there during December and January, said interest reached 23 boys but waned when the boys realized there would be no interscholastic competition. Neverthe-

less, in an exhibition meet with Crestview, which has an established program, only two competitors were beaten. Three won easily and six narrowly lost.

Acrimony marks council's routine

Village council dealt Mar. 6 with some routine matters, at least one of which involved an indignant citizen.

Upon recommendation of Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., the council approved appointment of Percy Dean as a volunteer fireman.

Approval was also given for the payment of an additional \$60 for an advanced fire fighting session being given by David Spain, a member of the Mansfield department. Arrangements have been made for the burning of the Armbruster house on Route 61. It will give the class an all-day experience in fire fighting. It will occur sometime next month.

Complaints of late utility bills were repeated by Councilman Toy Patton. In February the bills were several days late because the billing machine had a mechanical problem and this month the assistant clerk has an additional burden of preparing records of water users for the FFA.

Seven loads of cinders were obtained this week from the B&O railroad at Willard. There will be used to fill holes in streets and alleys. Councilman Hubert Akers, the street committee member, will receive notice of where work needs to be done.

Mrs. Thomas DeWitt asked the council if it intends to raise the water rates. The mayor assured her it does not so intend now. Her question was a result of an apparent confusion by Councilman Edward O. Ramsey, who did not understand that a proposed schedule left last week by an FFA representative was for sewer rates which are based on water usage, and not to raise water rates.

Ramsey was the target of a complaint by John Robinson, who said he should receive an apology for the remarks Ramsey made at the last council meeting concerning the newly opened pool hall. He asked whether Ramsey had visited it, and if he had not, how could he make such statements? Chief Meiser told the council harshly that any complaints by members against his department should be directed to him.

NOTelCo makes exchange changes

Work is under way in the Plymouth exchange on two projects totaling more than \$26,000, Northern Ohio Telephone Co. reports.

C. T. Winn, Norwalk district commercial manager, says one project involves installation of equipment that will change the dial tone for the Plymouth exchange. The new tone will be smoother and softer.

The other project will increase by 50 per cent the long distance transmission facilities between Plymouth and the Norwalk toll center. The increase in facilities will be accomplished with cable "carrier" system. Systems such as a 12-channel "carrier" enable up to 12 separate conversations to be carried simultaneously over a single pair of wires.

Voice impulses are converted into radio frequencies for transmission. At the receiving end the frequencies are changed back into speech impulses. "The use of the carrier systems reduces the need for installing great quantities of expensive cable facilities. In the long run this helps keep down the cost of providing telephone service," says Winn.

Office hour dispute rages at courthouse

Huron county courthouse is a divided house. Commissioners and the health department stoutly adhere to office hours on Saturday mornings.

Common pleas and juvenile courts will be closed on Saturdays, although the juvenile judge, Russell E. Antrim, may take advantage of the fact schools are not in session on Saturdays to conduct juvenile traffic court during those hours.

The other officers -- the auditor, the treasurer, the clerk of courts, the recorder, the engineer, the prosecutor and the sheriff -- met Thursday at 10 a. m. to discuss the matter and decided to take no action until the hours were presumably the whole question may have blown over.

These seven, joined by the probate court staff, discussed the likelihood of extending present hours 30 minutes to 4:30 p. m. every day save Monday. The extension would be extended two hours 30 minutes to 6:30 p. m. Presumably this would mean Saturday closing, although no specific statement to that effect was forthcoming.

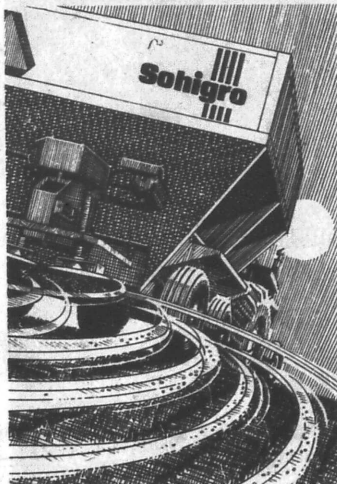
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Gene Gowitzka weds
