## Police raid gambling den

## Snowstorm closes schools, blocks roads

Worst snowstorm of the winter season struck Plymouth Saturday, leaving five inches of snow by 7 a. m.

Schools were closed Monday because buses could not pass through secondary roads.

Some motorists found Route 61 between Plymouth and New Haven impassable late Saturday night.

Police Chief Robert L. Melsler skidded in Peru Center road and went in to a ditch. He was compelled to leave his family car there and walk for help.

Village crews kept streets and alleys open, state highway and county highway department crews worked on feeder roads in accordance with established priorities.

How much crop damage resulted from the heavy snow and freezing temperatures remains to be seen.

Warm days last week brought some fruit trees into early bud. Whether these are damaged will not be known for at least two weeks.

Warm temperatures in January induced peach and cherry trees to bud early, whereupon a killing frost all but ruined the Lake Erie basin peach crop and inflicted severe damage on the cherry crop.

Some Celeryville growers had begun to fit ground for an early radish crop. Losses, if any, will be slight.

## Invalid? Tell fact to PFD

Households occupied by invalids should be marked by a special "I" sticker available from the fire chief.

The sticker should be mounted in a conspicuous window of the first floor of the dwelling.

When the sticker is issued, the fire chief will complete three cards. One card records the name of the invalid, instructions as to where it should be mounted and directions on removal when the invalid leaves. A duplicate is sent to the American Red Cross office in Norwalk. A third is given to the applicant.

If the condition of the invalid is temporary, a telephone "Life Line" another Red Cross service, will be notified to call at a given time to inquire about the status of the invalid. When he is fully recovered, the card will be removed from the files of the fire chief and the Red Cross.

Permanent invalids will be called three times yearly to verify their status.

## Clerk-treasurer quits post

Resignation of Mrs. Delores H. Baker as clerk-treasurer was received by village council Tuesday night and accepted with regret.

After working a year as clerk, she has accepted a position with Peoples National Bank.

Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock had an application from a new resident for the position, but so far as could be determined, she has not lived in the corporation for the required six month period to become an elector. Another application is also being considered, she said.

On the suggestion of

Councilman Frank Gardner, the acceptance of the Fenfor development will be solved. He proposed a motion which the council passed, requesting Solicitor Robert A. McKown to prepare an ordinance to accept the allotment provided all streets are adequately installed according to village specifications. He said, "It is a way to break up this impasse and allow Fenfor to sell lots."

It is understood the whole allotment has already been sold to a Sandusky contractor.

The mayor asked if there would be a conflict of interest with the solicitor

preparing such an ordinance. McKown stated he no longer represents Fenfor.

Leonard Fenner and Harry Forquer, principals in Fenfor, asked the council to take official action to solve the problem of water running off the site of the Foodland market onto their property. McKown said he wrote to the leasees of the property in Defiance, but had not received a reply. R. Harold Mack, who owns the property, is to be asked to remedy the problem.

The council gave authority to the solicitor to settle the pending Caudill case, which has been

on the docket of Huron county common pleas court for several years. Judge Robert J. Vetter requested the village settle the case.

Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., said the village may share in federal funds to purchase radio equipment for the fire vehicles and ambulance. The total cost of the equipment will be \$2,150 with between 50 and 80 per cent being federally funded.

He reported a better alternative is being considered, rather than what he suggested previously. They will cost \$415 each. The previous estimate was \$325. Two will be purchased for the fire department.

The 19 members of the department who have been taking the special fire fighting class given by David Spain, a member of the Mansfield department, took their final test Tuesday. Beginning April 9, a. m., they will spend all day burning down the old house on the Cofer property at the north edge of the village.

# Brooms: for witches and knitters

## Afghan easy to make with leftover yarn

**By AUNT LIZ**  
If you have started your spring housecleaning and have come across batches of odds and ends of yarn which are hardly enough to go much with, there is an answer.  
You can make a broomstick lace afghan. Before the days of all the various sizes of knitting needles, it was actually made with a broomstick and there is not a thing now which says you cannot bring your broom out and use it. Otherwise you use a number 50 needle and a K crochet hook.  
For an afghan to measure 45 inches by 90, you start with a chain of 190 stitches, but for a prac-

tice piece to decide if you are going to like it, chain 25. Then follow these directions.

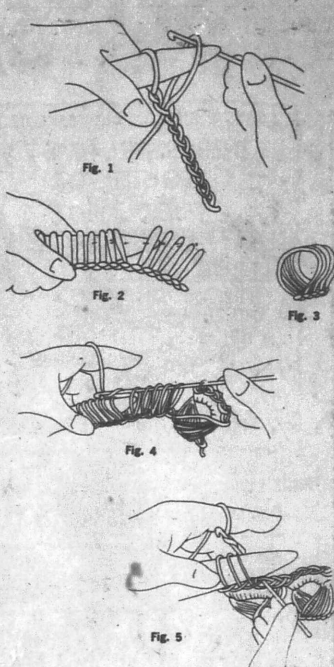
Row 1, Step 1 (see Fig. 1): Holding knit pin in left hand, slip loop of chain from crochet hook to knit pin. Working from left to right on ch, \*insert hook into next ch, draw loop through and, careful not to twist, place this loop on pin; repeat from \* to end of chain -- 25 loops on pin.

Row 1, Step 2 (see Figs. 2, 3 and 4): Working from right to left, slip 5 loops from pin; turn loops to the right in a group; insert hook through center of group and draw yarn through; careful not to tighten first loop, ch 1 at top of group, work 5 sc in same space. \*Sl next 5 loops from pin, turn to right as before, work 5 sc in center space of group; repeat from \* to end -- 5 pats. Do not turn.

Row 2, Step 1 (see Fig. 5): Place loop from hook on pin, \*working from left to right, insert hook under back loop only of next sc, draw loop through and place on pin; repeat from \* to end -- 25 loops on pin.

Row 2, Step 2: Same as Step 2 of Row 1. Repeat Row 2 for pattern.

Changing Colors: Fasten off at end of each row. Begin each succeeding row by drawing loop of next color through back loop of first sc; place it on pin.
