\$9 minimum sewer rate enacted, \$100 now prime cost of renting

Sewer rates at a \$9 monthly minimum per household were passed by village council during a special session Monday night. The council passed the ordinance "with great reluctance" but "complying with instruction of the Farmers Home Administration which computed the rate to realize an annual revenue by which repayment of bonds can be made. We have no choice."

The ordinance also stipulates that a \$50 deposit be required from all tenants of a property with the owner and tenant being jointly responsible. The deposit will be held against any unpaid bill if the service is discontinued. Should the bill exceed the deposit, then the remainder due to the village will be certified to the county auditors and placed on the tax duplicate. This raises to \$100 the initial cost for renters; another \$50 must be paid for utilities.

The council heard complaints from a household, Calvin French, and about 230 tons a year over Beejman street and thinks a more direct route would be better. Its manager, Ivan Hawk, appeared before village council April 3 to seek two concessions. One of them was that he wants the sewer to be laid in Beelman street (at a time convenient to the trucking operations of the business). And he was told the village will do what it can to cooperate with him. But it's a matter of contractor's priorities.

Kessler build in Willet road

Merton Kessler has obtained a building permit to erect a \$26,000 house in Willet road, Cass township. Buel Thornsberry has obtained a permit to erect a \$17,000 house in Kuhn road, Plymouth township. Harry L. Tackett has obtained a permit to erect a \$5,000 repair garage avenue along the AC&V tracks. He said he hauls

the owner of a coin-operated laundry, F. L. Hockett. The latter stated his sewer bill will be so excessive he probably will have to close his business. French questioned the legality of having to pay the new charge beginning with the July 1 quarter before the sewer lines will be installed for his use. The council also passed a routine required ordinance setting up rules and regulations of the sewer system. It is similar to a previous ordinance passed in 1964, which states the type of pipe to be used and how the connections must be made.

The council briefly discussed fire contracts for New Haven and Plymouth townships which will expire next month. It was agreed that Councilman James L. Jacobs, Sr., will gather data and figures to determine the exact cost of running the fire department and the depreciation on the vehicles and fire station.

The one bright spot of the meeting was the informal announcement by Clerk Delores H. Baker the village has received a revenue sharing check in the amount of \$2,781 for the first quarter of 1973. If the next three quarter checks are in the same amount, the village will receive \$11,124, which is about \$2,000 more than received for 1972.

What accommodations should be made by the village for Sohigo Service Co.?

He also inquired about the feasibility of constructing a new street from Sohigo to Riggs avenue along the AC&V tracks. He said he hauls

Clerk Delores H. Baker said the general fund is about \$6,000 in the red. To date the village has received \$1,500 from Huron county and \$957.38 from Richland county and there is little likelihood that any more tax money will be forthcoming until late June or July.

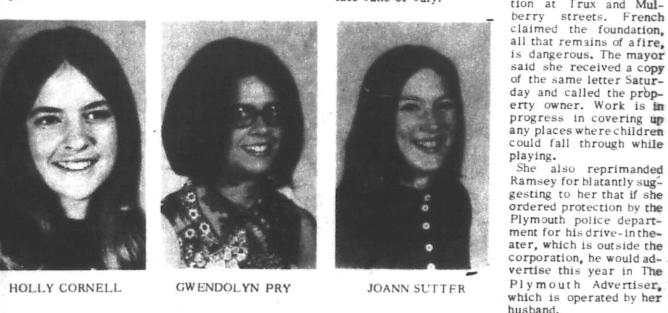
Jacobs suggested the three-month time deposit for the first revenue sharing check of about \$4,300 be retained, so it would be available to pay for the new police cruiser, which would be delivered next week. Jacobs criticized a used car dealer in West High street of parking on the sidewalk and also suggested that one side of Walnut street should be a fire lane. Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock suggested he make a survey of the village, and come up with a list of streets which need a fire lane on one side.

Councilman Edward Ramsey read a letter from Calvin French about the unsafe foundation at Trux and Mulberry streets. French claimed the foundation, all that remains of a fire is dangerous. The mayor said she received a copy of the same letter Saturday of this year. In the Plymouth Advertiser which is operated by her husband.

Garber reported the old water tower is again filled and that a new booster pump needs to be purchased for No. 1. It will cost \$710 and council gave its approval. 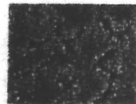

It's season for tornado!

It is tornado time again, and the Ohio Report put out by the Wooster Experimental station came out last month with a very interesting article about it all.

March through September are the big months. During a 20-year period from 1953 to 1972, there were 235 tornadoes in Ohio. None in January, eight in February, 12 in March, 47 in April and May, 36 in June, 34 in July, 25 in August and 13 in September.

January is the only month you need not worry about. There were none. Three out of every four in Ohio touched ground between 2 and 10 p. m., so plan your day when there is an early warning.

In our immediate area, the counties struck are Erie, six times; Huron, once; Seneca, six, Richland, five, Ashland, two, Sandusky, two and Lorain 11 times. Maybe they gather up more speed by the time they get to Lorain. It has been determined that 90 per cent of all tornadoes come from the southwest, west and west-southwest.

The history of tornadoes have really only been accurately recorded since the 1950's which seems strange. Unofficially there have been about 420 in the state since 1900.

Perhaps there are some of you who can remember the one which struck June 28, 1924 late in the afternoon. It hit Sandusky, Cedar Point and landed on Lorain.

The next really bad one was in April, 1943 when Akron got it, and we all can remember the Palm Sunday night one in 1965. We had gone to bed early since it was Sunday so we could get a good start for the coming week, and about 11 I woke up and came downstairs and thought, "Jeey, is it windy?" It wasn't until almost noon the next day that I knew what had happened.

We are in the season, so take care should one come our way which is very likely to happen. Keep yourself safe by being completely out of the way.

Maybe we should all migrate since the United States has the maximum frequency of such things. Other countries are being completely left out of such things. Nevertheless, the others have their little problems too. There is nothing like the rainy season in some countries. Can you imagine having a dinner party where everyone simply eats without talking because it is beating down on a tin roof and no one can shout above the noise? After 10 minutes or so, it may let up, so the conversation resumes and some one says, "What were you saying?" and after such an interval of eating, no one can really remember. That can be a highly successful dinner party - the best left unsaid.

Should this ever happen to you, then you must get something which will keep everyone very busy eating because it is that good.

And what is better than a real, live coconut cream pie? You can cheat a little and buy a pie crust, but it would be nicer to make a real one with a real lard recipe. You do need a baked pie crust ready to put it all into.

Mix a fourth of a cup of sugar with three tablespoons of cornstarch with a dash of salt, and gradually stir it into two cups of scalded milk. Add a tablespoon of butter. Do this in a double boiler, stirring with one hand while you use your other to get things ready. Slowly add to beaten egg yolks, as it thickens, take of the stove to cool a little. Then add a teaspoon of vanilla and a cup of coconut - even more, it will

make it that much better. All this then goes into the pie shell.

Beat the egg whites with a fourth of a cup of sugar, and put over the filling.

It needs to brown with more coconut sprinkled
