Who's guilty?

Certainly no act of the village council in 10 years has evoked such critical response as the new sewer rates.

A council that had little or nothing to do with the sewers, and has done little or nothing either for or against them, is now harvesting the anger of citizens who think the new rates are too high.

And no amount of throwing up of the hands and pleading "we had to do what we were told by the federal government" seems to placate anybody.

This is a municipal election year. Four seats on the council will be subject to election on Nov. 7. If anybody wants to change things, or punish someone, here's his chance.

We report elsewhere today that the village may have to pony up some of the balance in the water fund, which is not so healthy, to settle a law suit.

It is worth noting now, aloud, what we noted quietly before: the incumbent solicitor firmly told the village not to shut off anybody's water; the village employee who did so made the disconnection on advice of two councilmen, not a caucus or even a majority; neither of those councilmen now holds office as such. Perhaps the village has a way of recovering from these miscreants what they cost us all.

And while we reflect on the high sewer rates, let us also consider why it took two whole years after our plans were approved to get an allocation of money from an office that was rolling in it and sought to make desperate last-ditch efforts to apportion its funds before June 30.

Could it be that its managers simply disliked the crude tactics employed by the village to obtain the funds?

And who initiated and executed these tactics?

Before the finger is pointed at all of the present council, that has done little or nothing either for or against the sewers, let the public examine whether there are not some present and former councilmen who ought to be singled out for such criticism.

But there's no chance of defeating anybody unless he has opposition, which is what this is all about; any public office out to be contested, by decent, upright, intelligent citizens who understand the obligations of community service and the demands of public honesty.

No julep? Use bourbon to make Derby cake

Even though the Derby is over with, it still is julep time. Our Kentuckian friends themselves. The fire-water concoction has a long history, going back to the 1400's in Arabia and Persia.

Crushed mint mixed with whatever is at hand seems to have a cooling effect when temperatures are very high. This doesn't really seem very logical since alcohol has a tendency to warm one up, and as one frontiersman wrote many years ago, "One small drink would stimulate the whole system . . . it brot out kind feelings of the heart."

If you missed the Derby this year and the juleps which go with it, then this weekend make your family a Derby Bourbon cake. This is an old, treasured recipe of the Bluegrass. It is baked in a large angel food pan in a slow oven at 300 degrees for a little less than two hours. When it shrinks away from the sides of the pan, it is finished.

Cream three-fourths cups of butter until soft. Measure two cups of white sugar and two and a fourth cups of brown. Add half of the sugar to the butter and beat until smooth.

Then beat six eggs until they are light and fluffy. Add the rest of the sugar to them and mix them all up. Stir the butter and egg mixtures together and gradually mix them with five and a half cups of flour which has a dash of salt and one teaspoon of mace mixed in it. As the mixture thickens, start adding two cups of short-

When the batter is all mixed, fold in three and a half cups of small pieces of pecans.

This cake can be refrigerated but not frozen. It will improve with age, and probably would be best served with iced tea under a shady tree.

NOW YOU KNOW WHY those Southern gals were such fantastic hostesses. With all that has been

written in the last couple of months about food prices and getting the most out of what you buy, perhaps we should re-examine our eating habits.

Let us face cold, hard facts: Americans have been eating off the gravy train for too long. We eat too much of everything, and the fact that all sorts of businesses engaged in diets have become so successful proves this right out loud. It seems silly that money can be made so readily by getting people to cut down on eating.

Then there is the other side of the globe which is engaged in trying to get people to eat more and better. It just doesn't add up.

If we need just so much of protein and such per day, then this recipe should come in handy. A few of these cooks should make a meal since they all make a meal since they have all the essential ingredients.

They are simply called Nut Balls.

Cream a half cup of butter with a fourth of a cup of sugar. Add an egg yolk with two teaspoons of grated orange rind, two teaspoons of lemon juice and a half teaspoon of vanilla. Gradually stir in a cup of flour. When all mixed, chill the dough for a while. When it can be handled easily without getting your fingers all

gooped up, shape into small balls, dip into the beaten egg white and roll in finely chopped walnuts. Bake until slightly brown at 350 degrees.

Now that your baking is

finished for the time being, trot to the library and ask for the book, "MASH! Goes to Maine". You'll deserve a real treat, and it is about the funnest book around.
