Can track be installed on sewer lagoon site?

Can a running track be installed at the sewer lagoon site and will the village contribute to the cost?

Gerald Lillo, representing the high school athletics control board, asked those questions of village council Tuesday night.

Lillo asked if the village would furnish water, sewer and electrical facilities and what restrictions would be enforced, considering the sewer lagoons are adjacent to the site.

Councilmen Toy Patton and James L. Jacobs, Sr., told him the village would investigate the costs involved of extending lines and what could be done concerning an ordinance which says that no utilities will be extended outside the corporate limits.

Lillo said the lagoon site is one of three being considered. He asserted all facilities are available at a site on school property in Shiloh.

He estimated the complete installation will cost about \$20,000.

The village will also investigate the possibility of the school leasing the lagoon site, which would help defray costs to the village to furnish utilities.

Mayor Elizabeth C. Paddock pointed out the village's revenue sharing funds cannot be used for any school purpose.

Councilman Donald E. Akers and Jacobs said the revenue sharing funds are more badly needed in other areas.

Solicitor Robert A. McKown was authorized to prepare a resolution to allow the last revenue sharing check, received Apr. 6 in the amount of \$27,811, to be applied to the \$10,000 note owed Peoples National bank.

Akers, Jacobs and the mayor will meet tonight with trustees of Plymouth township to discuss terms of a new fire contract. They will meet Tuesday with the trustees of New Haven township.

THE NEW POLICE cruiser, which arrived last week, cost the village \$4,111 completely equipped.

Councilman Edward O. Ramsey said he was told the red flashers are the wrong size and "wobble" and the village did not receive the particular size it ordered.

Police Chief Robert L. Meiser said the village got the exact

flashers it ordered and they are in perfect working condition.

Cemetery board member Carl V. Ellis requested the council allow the board to close old grass driveways in Greenlawn cemetery and allow the land to be sold for graves.

The solicitor will determine if any legal action is required to allow this to be done.

Tools and tires worth about \$6,345 were stolen from the Backch Cattle Co. garage at Routes 598 and 61 in New Haven late Saturday or early Sunday.

Sheriff John Borgia said at Newark Monday.

The loss was reported Sunday.

It is the second major theft in the neighborhood within a week and apparently one of a skein of such thefts in the general area bounded by Tiro, Shelby, New Washington, Willard and Greenwich.

Seven issues appear on Tuesday's primary ballot.

Certainly the paramount one is whether Ohio shall authorize the state -- and only the state -- to conduct lotteries, the net proceeds of which shall be paid into the general revenue fund of the state.

The argument for it is chiefly that between \$10 and \$15 million in Ohio money goes out of the state each year into such as Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York lotteries. We've never seen any proof of this and we regard the argument as pretty much akin to that which says Ohioans spend so many millions of dollars a year on mail order items with such as Sears, Montgomery Ward, Spiegel and the like, wherefor this should be prevented because it takes business away from Ohio traders.

Lotteries appeal to those who can least afford to participate. And since there is no proposal to limit participation in a state lottery to those who can afford to lose, we're opposed to it.

Issue No. 2 would allow cities and villages which take private property by appropriation for sewer and water lines to do so at once, with payment to come later (which may depend on the sale of bonds that have been authorized, for instance). So long as payment to the private owner is guaranteed, we don't see that it makes any difference when title transfers. Sooner than later is all right with us. Vote for Issue No. 2.

Issues No. 3, 4 and 6 relate to obsolete sections of the Ohio Constitution that no longer seem to have applicability. No. 3 would repeal a section that says a convicted embezzler can't hold public office. Our statutes already so hold. Vote for No. 3. No. 4 relates to a Supreme Court commission, established in 1875 when there were problems that don't exist now. Vote for No. 4. No. 6 gives the General Assembly authority to change some of its procedures. It is always wise, politically speaking, to allow a deliberative house the right to adopt and enforce its own rules. Vote for No. 6.

No. 5 would give the General Assembly the authority to change the rules of court practices and procedures adopted by the Ohio Supreme Court, whose judges are already directly elected by the people. If the people are dissatisfied with the rules set by the Court, they can defeat the judges when they seek reelection. Vote against No. 5.

No. 5A has to do with changing compensation of judges while they are in the middle of their terms. Why? When a man advertises he wants a job at the advertised price, let him serve that term. Vote against issue No. 5A.

Light vote in primary expected

Light balloting is anticipated Tuesday when Ohioans go to the polls for the primary election.

Absence of local issues is expected to keep the turnout light and, consequently, raise the cost of each vote to embarrassing, if not excessive, levels.

Principal issue on the ballot is a proposal to amend the state's constitution to permit Ohio to conduct lotteries, whose proceeds would be paid to the general fund.

Opponents argue Ohio doesn't need the money now, and besides, a lottery appeals to those least able to afford to participate in them.

Other issues, as well as this one, are dealt with editorially today.

The bonds are issued for the purpose of paying the cost of constructing lateral sanitary sewers and necessary appurtenances to the municipal sewage collection and treatment system.

The bonds are not general obligations of the issuer, but will be payable, together with additional parity bonds which may hereafter be issued pursuant to the ordinance authorizing the same, solely from the revenues and properties of the sewage system after provision for the operating and maintenance expenses thereof. The bonds, and any such additional parity bonds, will be secured by a mortgage to be executed pursuant to Section 12 of Article XVII, Ohio Constitution, which will constitute a pledge of the aforesaid revenues and a first lien upon the issuer's interests in the properties of the sewage system.

The bonds shall be dated the annually on the first day of January next succeeding the date of the bonds, and the rate of interest shall be five per centum (5%) per annum. Anyone desiring to do so may present a bid for said bonds based upon their hearing a different rate of interest, but not exceeding five per centum (5%) per annum. Each bid shall be for the purchase of bonds at not less than the par value thereof. Different rates of interest may be specified, provided that bonds of the same maturity shall have the same rate.

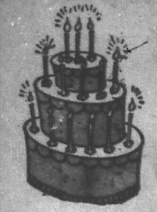

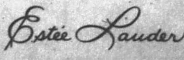

BOND ORDINANCE

ORDINANCE NO. 9-73F

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$968,000 SEWER SYSTEM FIRST MORTGAGE REVENUE BONDS BY THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO UNDER SECTION 12, ARTICLE XVIII OF THE OHIO CONSTITUTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAKING ADDITIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE MUNICIPAL SANITARY SEWERAGE COLLECTION AND TREATMENT SYSTEM, PRESERVING THE FORMER FUND, PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF REVENUE FROM SAID SYSTEM SUFFICIENT FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COSTS OF OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE THEREOF, PROVIDING ADDITIONAL FUND THEREFORE, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS AND FURTHER PROVIDING FOR THE SEGREGATION AND DISTRIBUTION OF SAID REVENUES, AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A MORTGAGE ON SAID SYSTEM AND THE REVENUES THEREOF TO SECURE SAID BONDS AND TO SECURE ADDITIONAL PARITY BONDS HEREAFTER AUTHORIZED; DEFINING THE TERMS OF A FRANCHISE UNDER WHICH, IN CASE OF FORECLOSURE, THE PURCHASER MAY OPERATE SAID SYSTEM; AND, PROVIDING FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE HOLDERS OF SAID BONDS IN ENFORCEMENT THEREOF; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Village of Plymouth, Richland and Huron Counties, Ohio, has a municipal sewerage collection and treatment system and the Village Council has found that it is advisable and necessary for the best interest of the Village that such sewerage collection and treatment system be expanded and improved to as the "Utility" or as the "System" to be improved pursuant to Section 4, Article XVIII of the Constitution of Ohio by installing lateral sanitary sewerage and related appurtenances; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Village Council have caused suitable and sufficient estimates to be prepared to inform the public of the nature, character and cost of such improvements and additions to the sewerage system to be made by competent engineers on behalf of said Village and said plans and specifications for the same, together with estimates, Consulting Engineer of the Village (hereinafter called the "Engineer"), have been accepted and approved by the Mayor and the Village Council and are now on file in the office of the Clerk-Treasurer open for public inspection; and

WHEREAS, the Village Council, after due investigation and based upon construction bids received, has determined that it will be necessary for the said Village to incur in an amount not exceeding \$1,009,200 to pay the costs of construction of said additions and improvements to the sewerage system including all construction expenses necessary to be incurred in connection with such construction, together with the cost of the interest on the bonds, and has further determined that it is necessary and proper for the Village Council to authorize the issuance of \$968,000 in revenue bonds, pursuant to Section 12, Article XVIII of the Constitution of Ohio for the purpose of providing funds to pay such costs. Such bonds to be designated Sewer System First Mortgage Revenue Bonds, which Bonds (hereinafter called "Revenue Bonds") together with any additional bonds to be hereinafter authorized hereunder (hereinafter called "Additional Bonds"), the Revenue Bonds and Additional Bonds being hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Bonds" are to be secured by the Mortgage hereinafter provided for (hereinafter referred to as the "Mortgage") upon the properties, assets and revenues of the Utility and by a franchise to become effective in the event of foreclosure of the Mortgage; and

WHEREAS, the balance of the cost of constructing said Utility will be furnished from existing funds of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village Council finds that all conditions precedent to the issuance and sale of said Revenue Bonds have been complied with.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VILLAGE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, COUNTIES OF RICHLAND AND HURON, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That the Village of Plymouth now proposed with the construction of the additions and improvements to the municipal sewerage system and furnish the Village and its inhabitants with sanitary sewerage collection, treatment and disposal and said additions and improvements to be made in conformity with plans and specifications and estimates referred to above. Said improvements to the sewerage system shall include lateral sanitary sewers, sewer connections, and all necessary appurtenances, together with the cost of the interest on the bonds, and has further determined that total estimated cost of the additions and improvements to the System is \$1,009,200 and that when said additions and improvements to the System are installed it shall be operated as a public utility, including the operation and improvements to said System; that prior to the issuance of \$968,000 Sewer System First Mortgage Revenue Bonds, rates and charges for the services of said Utility will be fixed in an amount sufficient to pay the costs of operating and maintaining said Utility and to leave an amount of revenue to equate for mortgage principal and interest, debt service, debt service, replacement and improvement requirements and all other requirements provided herein, and otherwise comply with the provisions of the Constitution of Ohio; that it is necessary to issue and sell the \$968,000 Sewer System First Mortgage Revenue Bonds (hereinafter called "Revenue Bonds") in the principal amount of \$968,000 and having the terms provided

herein, the proceeds to be used for the purpose of construction of the System and purposes incidental thereto and incidental to the issuance of the said Revenue Bonds, and for such other purposes as may be described hereinafter.

Section 2. That the Village Council hereby declares that the period of usefulness of the System to be constructed pursuant to this Ordinance is forty (40) years from the date of completion.

Section 3. The Revenue Bonds shall be initially issued in coupon or fully registered form without interest coupons as may be requested by the Original Purchaser and shall be dated the date delivered to the Original Purchaser. The Bonds shall be negotiable and shall be in the denomination of \$1,000 each, or in multiples of \$1,000 at the request of the Original Purchaser, provided the selected denominations permit payment and surrender of the Revenue Bonds in accordance with the maturity schedule herein set forth, and shall be registrable as principal. The Revenue Bonds in fully registered form shall be in the denomination of \$1,000 or any multiple thereof.

The Revenue Bonds, in both coupon and fully registered form, shall be numbered as determined by the Fiscal Officer. There shall be no charge for registration or transfer. The Revenue Bonds shall be negotiable instruments. Said Revenue Bonds shall bear interest at the rate of five percent (5%) per annum or at a rate not exceeding five per centum (5%) per annum as may be fixed by a supplemental resolution adopted by the Village Council following an advertised sale and competitive bidding for the Revenue Bonds as hereinafter provided. In the event the Farmers Home Administration (herein also called "Government" or "United States") purchases all of said Revenue Bonds, two bonds of the same denomination, aggregating the principal amount restricted to the principal and interest in the name of "United States of America, Farmers Home Administration", shall be issued, which bonds shall, at the option of the Government, at the various principal sums will be advanced to the Village in the aggregate amount of \$968,000 such advances to be noted by the Government on the schedules set forth on the reverse side of such Revenue Bonds, in such manner that each advance shall be apportioned between the two Bonds based on the scheduled accretion of principal, and interest shall accrue on the amount of advance from the date such amount was advanced to said Village as shown on such schedules. The interest on said Revenue Bonds shall be payable annually on the first day of January of each year commencing on the first day of January next succeeding the date of the Revenue Bonds until the payment of the principal amount of each Revenue Bond. The Revenue Bonds shall be scheduled to become due and payable and shall be due and payable on January 1, as follows:

The principal of and interest on Revenue Bonds in coupon form shall be payable at a bank located in Plymouth, Ohio, as determined by the Original Purchaser, interest on the Revenue Bonds in fully registered form shall be payable by check or draft mailed to the registered holder or registered assigns at the address shown on the Registration Book of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, in numerical order on any interest payment date on or after January 1, 1984 at their par value plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption; provided, however, that if any of said Revenue Bonds are held by the Farmers Home Administration, all or part of the Revenue Bonds may be redeemed at any time in inverse order of maturity, or, in the case of coupon bonds, in inverse numerical order. Notice of redemption, specifying the date of redemption, shall be published in the Register of the Village once a week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in Richland County, the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption, which date all interest upon the Revenue Bonds so called shall cease except for those as to which default shall be made, upon presentation, in the payment of the redemption price. Notice of redemption in the Register of the Village in fully registered form shall also be mailed by certified mail to the registered holder thereof not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Said bonds shall be signed by the Executive and the Fiscal Officer of the Village, and the corporate seal of said Village impressed thereon. When used in this Ordinance, "Executive" shall mean the Mayor, "Fiscal Officer" shall mean the "Clerk-Treasurer" and "Legal Officer" shall mean the Solicitor. The authority, operation or board which hereafter succeeds, by operation of law, the powers and duties of any such authority of any such officer shall be deemed included in the applicable official designation while having such powers and duties as are herein provided upon the request of the registered holder of a (each) fully registered bond, at any time at the expense of such holder, and within ninety (90) days after such request, issue the Village's negotiable coupon bonds, payable to bearer, as registered as principal only, in an aggregate principal amount equal to and maturing in conformity with the unpaid principal of the bond(s) exchanged therefor, and in the form of such coupon bonds, as provided in Section 4 hereof, and the principal of and interest on the bond(s) exchanged. Coupon bonds shall be issued and substituted only for and upon surrender to the Village of the corresponding fully registered bond(s), which shall then immediately be cancelled by the Fiscal Officer, provided that if the fully registered bonds are purchased by the Farmers Home Administration and issued as provided hereinabove, the holder, at his option and expense, subject to the condition that both of said fully registered bonds may be exchanged for coupon bonds if the option is exercised, may exchange such Revenue Bonds for coupon bonds or fully registered bonds in accordance with the above procedure.

That the form and tenor of the Revenue Bonds in coupon form shall be substantially as follows: UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that the Village of Plymouth, in the Counties of Richland and Huron and State of Ohio, acknowledge itself to owe and of value received, hereby promises to pay to the revenue and interest thereon hereinafter set forth, to bearer, or, if registered, to the registered holder hereof, the sum of

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS

on the first day of January, 1974, with interest thereon from the date hereof at the rate of per centum (%) per annum, payable annually on the first day of January in each year, commencing January 1, 1974, as evidenced by the coupons attached hereto and which coupons shall become due and payable. Until required for such purpose, moneys in the Surplus Fund shall, when so directed by the Fiscal Officer, be invested in direct obligations of the United States maturing, or redeemable by the United States, not more than five years from the date of investment.

Any Revenue Bonds purchased for cancellation shall be purchased at a price not exceeding their face amount less the interest thereon. Interest on any moneys or investments in such Fund shall be credited to such Fund.

Section 10. That the Village shall have the right from time to time to issue Additional Bonds for the purpose of providing additional funds, if necessary for the completion of the Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account, or otherwise for the purpose only of making replacements, extensions and improvements to the Utility, which Additional Bonds shall be payable from the Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account and be secured by the same security as the Revenue Bonds; provided, that when any such Additional Bonds are issued, the Village shall have furnished to the Fiscal Officer and Legal Officer of the Village certifying that, to the best of their knowledge, the Village is not, on the date of issuance of such Additional Bonds, in default in the performance of the complete set of its obligations under the Ordinance, in the Mortgage or in the Revenue Bonds; and (b) Certificate of an independent engineer, showing that:

balance remaining in the Construction Account shall be promptly used to the nearest \$1,000 thereof for the redemption and retirement of Revenue Bonds in inverse numerical order, subject to the Agreement by the holder to surrender such Revenue Bonds in inverse numerical order, and such balance are not herein subject to call; and if any balance shall be deposited in the Reserve Account.

B. So long as any Revenue Bonds remain outstanding, the revenues from the operation of the Utility, as now or hereafter approved, approved or extended, shall be transferred to or deposited in the "Sewer System Fund Account", which shall be maintained in the name of the Village in a bank separate and distinct from all other funds of the Village. Out of the proceeds of the System Fund Account, and of other moneys and funds serving therein at all times an adequate sum for working capital for the Utility, the following payments only shall be made and in the following order:

First: All reasonable and proper expenses of operating and maintaining the Utility and all its appurtenances, such expenses to exclude those of other utility shall be operated on a single unit with the Utility, and to exclude depreciation and capital replacements.

Second: Monthly on the fifteenth day of each month into the "Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account" beginning with the first day of the month next following the month in which the Bonds are issued, the System is operational: (1) the equal monthly amount necessary to provide for the interest payment due upon all Bonds outstanding; and (2) the equal monthly amount necessary to provide for payment of the next ensuing principal payment due on such Bonds outstanding.

Third: Monthly, as aforesaid, such sum in addition to any of the foregoing allocations as may be necessary and available after meeting the requirements of the preceding Paragraphs First and Second, to make up any previous deficiency in any such monthly allocations.

Fourth: Out of the balance of income and revenue after the allocations required by Paragraphs First to Third hereof have been made there shall be set aside and deposited in the "Reserve Account" the sum of \$480,000, or such lesser amount as may be determined in such Fund the sum of \$57,383 after which no further deposits need be made into said Reserve Account except to replace withdrawals.

The Reserve Account shall be used and disbursed only for the purpose of repairing or replacing any unforseen catastrophe, for making extensions or improvements to the Utility, and when necessary for the purpose of making payments of principal of and interest on the Revenue Bonds if the amount in the Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account is not sufficient to meet such payments. Whenever disbursements are made from said Reserve Account monthly payments shall be resumed and there shall again accumulated the maximum amount of \$57,383, which such payments may be again discontinued. The funds in the Reserve Account may be invested in obligations of the United States or in time or savings deposits, such investment will be a part of the Reserve Account.

Fifth: Annually on January fifteenth, beginning January 15, 1975, the revenues available in the Sewer System Fund Account at the end of the preceding calendar year, after making the payments required by Paragraphs First to Fourth hereof, and after reserving therein an amount sufficient to provide adequate working capital and to provide necessary accruals against the current requirements of Paragraphs Second to Fourth, shall be transferred to a fund designated "Surplus Fund".

Section 9. That the Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account shall be maintained in the name of the Village, and shall be used solely for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, and to the extent provided in this Ordinance, for the redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purpose, moneys in the Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account shall, when so directed by the Fiscal Officer, be invested in direct obligations of the United States maturing not later than the interest and principal payment date next following such investment. If at any time there shall be sufficient moneys and investments in the Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund, to retire or pay the principal of and interest on the outstanding Revenue Bonds, without thereby reducing the balance thereafter remaining in said Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Sinking Fund below the amount which on such call date would be required by this Ordinance to be paid in respect to Revenue Bonds not to be so retired, such moneys shall be used to accomplish such retirement.

The Surplus Fund shall be in the custody of the Village and shall, to the extent necessary, from time to time be used for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, and to the extent provided in this Ordinance, for the redemption of Bonds. Until required for such purpose, moneys in the Surplus Fund shall, when so directed by the Fiscal Officer, be invested in direct obligations of the United States maturing, or redeemable by the United States, not more than five years from the date of investment.

Any Revenue Bonds purchased for cancellation shall be purchased at a price not exceeding their face amount less the interest thereon. Interest on any moneys or investments in such Fund shall be credited to such Fund.

It's tornado time, so take precautions!

It is tornado time again, and the Ohio Report put out by the Wooster Experimental station came out last month with a very interesting article about it all.
March through September are the big months. During a 20-year period from 1953 to 1972, there were 235 tornadoes in Ohio. None in January, eight in February, 12 in March, 47 in April and May; 36 in June, 34 in July, 25 in August and 13 in September.

January is the only month you need not worry about. There were none.
Three out of every four in Ohio touched ground between 2 and 10 p. m., so plan your day when there is an early warning.
In our immediate area, the counties struck are Erie, six times, Huron, once; Seneca six, Richland five, Ashland two, Sandusky two and Lorain 11 times. Maybe they gather up more speed by the time they get to Lorain. It has been determined that 90 per cent of all tornadoes come from

the southwest, west and west-southwest.

The history of tornadoes have really only been accurately recorded since the 1950's which seems strange. Unofficially there have been about 420 in the state since 1900. Perhaps there are some of you who can remember the one which struck June 28, 1924 late in the afternoon. It hit Sandusky, Cedar Point and landed on Lorain.
The next really bad one was in April, 1943 when Akron got it, and we all can remember the Palm Sunday night one in 1965. We had gone to bed early since it was Sunday so we could get a good start for the coming week, and about 11 I woke up and came downstairs and thought, "Jeessy, is it windy!" It wasn't until almost noon the next day that I knew what had happened.
We are in the season, so take care should one come our way which is very likely to happen. Keep yourself safe by being completely out of the way.
Maybe we should all mi-

grate since the United States has the maximum frequency of such things. Other countries are being completely left out of such things. Nevertheless, the others have their little problems too. There is nothing like the rainy season in some countries. Can you imagine having a dinner party where everyone simply eats without talking because it is belting down on a tin roof and no one can shout above the noise? After 10 minutes or so, it may let up,

so the conversation resumes and some one says, "What were you saying?" and after such an interval of eating, no one can really remember. That can be a highly successful dinner party - the best left unsaid.
Should this ever happen to you, then you must serve something which will keep everyone very busy eating because it is that good.
And what is better than a real, live coconut cream pie? You can cheat a little and buy a pie crust, but it would be nicer to make a real one with a real lard recipe. You do need a baked pie crust ready to put it all into.
Mix a fourth of a cup of sugar with three tablespoons of cornstarch with a dash of salt, and gradually stir it into two cups of scalded milk. Add a tablespoon of butter. Do

this in a double boiler, stirring with one hand while you use your other to get things ready. Slowly add to beaten egg yolks, as it thickens, take it off the stove to cool a little. Then add a teaspoon of vanilla and a cup of coconut - even more, it will make it that much better. All this then goes into the pie shell.
Beat the egg whites with a fourth of a cup of sugar, and put over the filling.
It needs to be brown with more coconut sprinkled over the top under the broiler for a few minutes.

Should you be a realifee as a cook, you can use prepared packages of coconut mix which are really as good as what you can do from scratch, but add more coconut.

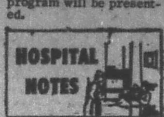

HOT LINE TO THE FUTURE
Where Will You Spend Eternity?
To better understand the seriousness of eternity let's take a look at our fantastic universe. Our earth is 8,000 miles high and 25,000 miles around. The sun, if hollow could hold within it 1 million earths. Some of the larger planets could hold, if hollow, 30 million suns.
