# PHS addition bids high, board to cut by \$6,000

How can bids to construct an addition to Plymouth High school be brought to what the schools can afford?

Plymouth Board of Education will meet its architect, D. James Crawford, Mansfield, to discuss what changes can be made in specifications so the board can save money.

Low bidders are Zahn Construction Co., Mansfield, \$44,304 for general construction; Bellville Electric Co., Mansfield, \$5,205 for electrical contract, and Shepps Plumbing & Heating, Monroeville, \$6,295 for plumbing, heating and ventilating.

If the school staff can paint the interior walls, if other adjustments can be made and if state regulations can be met by so doing, the schools can save about \$6,000.

# Watergate womanless, Auntie says with pride

One of the nice things about growing older is that you have nice memories.

Years ago there was a very pleasant place in the District of Columbia along the Potomac river. It was arranged with a semi-circle of steps with boxes of grass around it. Then just offshore in the river there was a barge built with a half shill back to it, and the Washington symphony played summer concerts. Free, too.

It played all the nice things like "Rhapsody in Blue," Strauss waltzes, the airy pieces which didn't put you to sleep, and it was a nice way to spend an evening. It was called Watergate, but I may be wrong, but I think it is the same site as Mr. Nixon's millions. It has got to go down in history. Either it will be the most miserably scandal this country has ever experienced or else the most stupid move made by men put into public office and trust by ordinary believing Americans. How grown men could possibly get themselves all decked out as they did and do such childish acts is beyond me, but then I am only a woman and those who do not believe in women's lib think we should not think.

Let us make one point quite clear: is the one woman involved in the whole thing except for Martha, and all she does is telephone and not break into other people's doors? Perhaps if a few women had been recruited for the underhandness, it could have been pulled off successfully.

It really is not a joking matter, it is pitiful, and as the investigation goes on, there are so many more ramifications to the whole story. It has already been said that the same tactics brought Hitler to power in the 1930's. Anyone who has been reading and listening; at

all during the last three years could see this coming.

And it was coming because the average person doesn't care at all so long as she (girls first) or he has what is needed for a good life. This is exactly what happened in one European country. No one cared what was really going on until the bombs started to mess up their backyards.

THIS IS GRADUATION time, and a whole new generation takes its place in the world, which can give us all hope for a better one, unless, they, too, fall into the same lazy pattern that seems to exist across the land. When afternoon dramas on television are more important than one's own rights and freedoms, then a change is needed.

Perhaps I simply believe in this country and what we call the democratic way too much. I also have had the experience of knowing what it is to live in countries where one's telephone was normally switched. In one country, one always had to hear the clock of a receiver before one's call went through because they listened to on each one. We all knew enough not to say much, and those poor souls who were assigned

to listen to our everyday conversations probably could write a cookbook if they were smart enough to have written down the tasty things that got passed via the telephone.

The one recipe that really got passed over the telephone was used by all of us for cooking the toughest, but tastiest, Argentine beef. It was very cheap, so naturally we all bought it, then got stuck on how to cook it so any set of teeth could consume it.

Some one came up with this method, and it can work today with cheaper cuts of meat. Finely cut a couple of carrots and an onion, and brown in oil or whatever you use, cut enough to cover the bottom of the kettle. Place the meat on top and brown it, then add half red wine and half water, and let it simmer for a couple of hours; in fact, the longer the better, but I am afraid that it is impossible to purchase such nice tough beef here. Actually, we cooked it from morning until night, and it needed it, and by then was so tasty. You had to add a little more wine and water as it cooked down. The secret was just barely simmering it.

Patience, sometimes, is the secret.

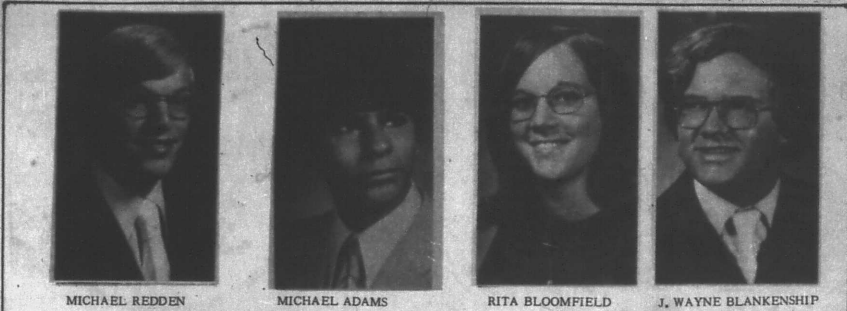

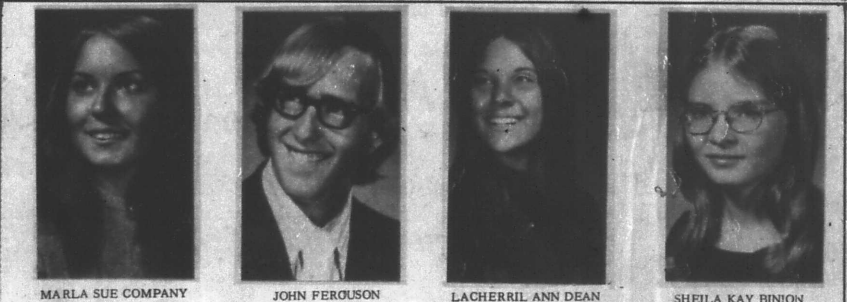

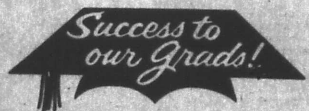

Community Bible school, sponsored by Mt. Hope Lutheran and Shiloh United Methodist churches, will begin Monday, June 11, and continue for one week.

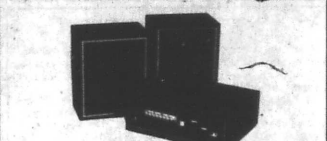

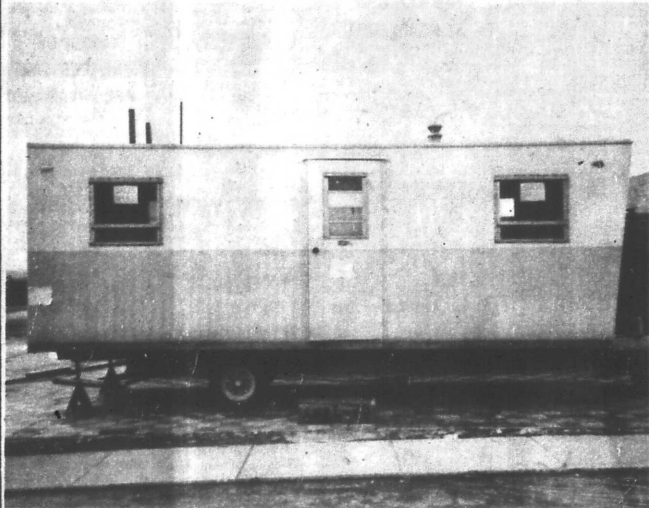
