PFD to get radio units, 'dirty' water explained

Four mobile radio units costing \$760 each will be purchased for use by Plymouth Fire department. Urged by a delegation of firemen, village council approved the purchase Tuesday night.

At the suggestion of Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock, half of the total cost of \$3,040 will be paid from the capital outlay fund of the fire department and the other half from 1973 revenue sharing funds.

Assistant Fire Chief William L. Van Wagner told the council he has forms with which to request federal aid in the purchase of a base unit and radio equipment for the ambulance.

Appointment of James H. Cashman to the department was also approved. He is the 29th member.

Complaints of flooding Tuesday afternoon from residents in Willow drive resulted in the council instructing Village Administrator Thomas Baker to install a catch basin where one was removed some years ago when the interceptor sewer line was installed.

The mayor said at her suggestion Plymouth township trustees will summon the Richland county engineer to inspect the Trux street storm-water problem, since the water coming from the township into the village that is flooding yards, driveways and basements.

Solicitor Robert A. McKown told the council he believes all paper work for Contract III of the sanitary sewer system will be completed within 10 days. The bond transcript is completed and has been sent to the Columbus office of Warren Home Administration.

Today the engineer, Eugene Gerken, will meet with the contractor, FHA and village officials. Complaints of "dirty" water have been forthcoming during the past several weeks. Councilman Frank R. Garber said he believes in each case it occurred when householders were filling pools and the unusual amount of water going through their pipes caused a certain amount of flaking.

Baker said administrative operations within the water department, by which the water storage tanks were all but drained when there was an interruption of electric service caused by the Willard tornado, may have contributed to the complaints.

A smaller obstruction occurred at Plymouth street and Mills avenue. Councilman Donald E. Aker's was without power for about four hours because a large limb tore the electric connection at his house. But his neighborhood encountered no interruption of power.

Trees in North street were particularly hard hit. Trees in the yard of Mrs. Ruth Davis at North and Porter streets were felled.

Village Administrator Thomas Baker was summoned from a camping trip to take charge of the clean-up.

Street lights in about 45 per cent of the village were out. There were on-ly two burnings in West Broadway between the Square and the D. W. Ellis property for much of the night.

Police plagued by park traffic

It's the out-of-the-ordinary cases that exasperate police. Chief Robert L. Meiser and his department are seized this week of "The Road Bump Capes."

They've the names of perhaps 25 or 30 suspects but no hard evidence on which to prosecute.

It all started when trustees of Mary Fate park determined to construct ridges or "bumps" across the roadway in the park to discourage excessive speed. By ordinance, speed in the park is limited to five miles an hour.

The result was self-defeating. Drivers -- and according to some testimony, most of them "young people under 21 or so" -- don't like to drive over the bumps so they turn out and drive over the grass.

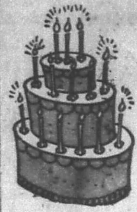

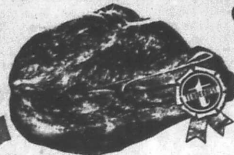

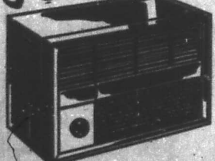
