Huron county earmarks funds of revenue sharing

Revenue sharing allocations for Huron county is based on an estimated \$100,434 for the period Jan. 1, 1973 to June 30, 1973.

Report mailed to the Department of the Treasury states the planned expenditure of \$100,434 revenue sharing is for public safety, \$6,500; libraries, \$25,000; social services for the poor or aged, \$3,500; capital expenditures, debt retirement, equipment and construction, \$65,434.

The use of the revenue sharing is to reduce debt increase and enable reducing the rate of a major tax, thus preventing enacting of a new major tax, say the commissioners.

\$77,908 suit laid against ex-coach

A former teacher and head football coach in Plymouth High school is defendant in a suit seeking damages of \$77,908.
