She faces a primary contest with a young lawyer, Kenneth Ross, who lives in Shelby but practices in Mansfield.

Rep. Sherrod Brown (D-Mansfield) will seek re-election to the House of Representatves from Richland county.

Brown said, "Much of the energy and consumer offairs legislation I've affairs legislation ive been promoing since my election two years ago has done well, and will, itspears, become law, iwant to see that Ohloans re-ceive the benefits which would come from passage of all of those proposals."

Brown, whose district includes Mansfield, Shel-by and northern Richland county, has been active in public utility reform, consumer pricing legis-iation and commercial development legislation.

Sen. Gene Slagle (D. Gallon) will file today for re-election as senator from the 26th senatorial district. He must run in 1976, even though the 1974, because his term was cut in half by a maneuver that contested the validity of the halloting in precincts where the names were not

the legislature, Senator Slagle has been record ed on every roil call vote on the floor of both the House and the Senate, He is believed to be the only member of the present senate to have never missed a roil call vote during his term of office. 


