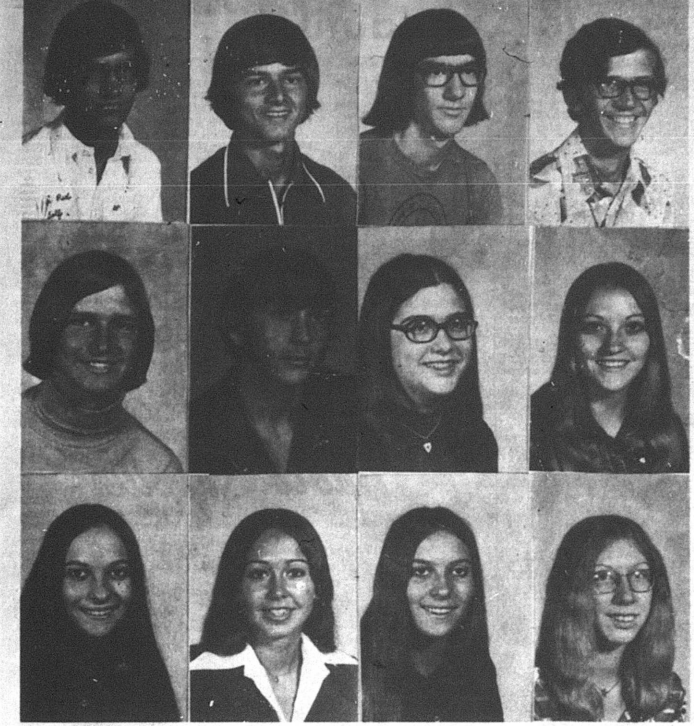

Six chosen for Boys', Girls' State

Six pupils of Plymouth High school's Class of 1977 will attend the annual Boys' State and Girls' State encampments in June.

Thirt-Parsel Post 447, American Legion, and its auxiliary will send Steven Shuty, elder son of the Albert Shuty, Plymouth route 1, as delegate to Boys' State and Patty Thornsberry, a daughter of the Daniel Thornsberys, 80 Plymouth street, and Debbie DeWitt, daughter of the Walter DeWitts, 59 Portner street, as delegates to Girls' State.

Garrett-Reist Post 503, Shiloh, and its auxiliary will send William Sutter, son of the Robert W. Sutters, Shiloh route 1, and Gerald Strong, 12 North Walnut street, Shiloh, as Boys' State delegates and Jill Von Stein, daughter of the Raymond Von Steins, Shiloh route 2, as delegate to Girls' State.

Robert M. Davis, son of the James C. Davises, 347 Willo drive, is alternate to Shuty. Peggy Thornsberry is her twin sister's alternate. Jody Courtright, daughter of the Marvin Courtrights, 75 North street, is alternate to Miss DeWitt.

James Parsons, son of Mrs. Hattie Lewis, Shiloh route 2, and Timothy Lewis, son of the Jack Lewis, Pettit street, Shiloh, are the alternates to Sutter and Strong. Cindy Faulkner, daughter of the James Faulkners, 67 Euclid street, Shiloh, is alternate to Miss Von Stein.

Girls' State will convene at Capital University, Pexley, June 12 through 20. Mayor Elizabeth G. Paddock will administer the oath to mayors of the model cities and address the delegates June 14.

Boys' State will convene June 19 through 27.

Brown, Slagle to seek reelection to Assembly

Filing deadline to appear on the June 8 primary ballot is today at 4 p. m.

Mrs. M. Joan Douglass, a Mansfield legislator who served a term in the Ohio House before she was defeated by the incumbent, Sherrod Brown, two years ago, will seek to return to that office. She faces a primary contest with a young lawyer, Kenneth Ross, who lives in Shelby but practices in Mansfield.

Rep. Sherrod Brown (D-Mansfield) will seek reelection to the House of Representatives from Richland county.

Brown said, "Much of the energy and consumer affairs legislation I've been promoting since my election two years ago has done well, and will, it appears, become law. I want to see that Ohioans receive the benefits which would come from passage of all of those proposals."

Brown, whose district includes Mansfield, Shelby and northern Richland county, has been active in public utility reform, consumer pricing legislation and commercial development legislation.

Sen. Gene Slagle (D-Gallion) will file today for reelection as senator from the 26th senatorial district. He must run in 1976, even though he was re-elected in 1974, because his term was cut in half by a maneuver that contested the validity of the hallowing in precincts where the names were not rotated on the ballot.

This time his term is for four years.

Slagle served for two years in the Ohio House and is now in his fourth year as a member of Senate. He is chairman of the agriculture and conservation committee, a member of the influential finance committee, of the powerful ways and means committee and of energy and environment.

His joint house and senate committee assignments are chairman of public improvements in inspection committee, Ohio land use review and education review. He has served on the joint select committee on energy that recommended the repeal of the RCN formula in order to curtail the rapid increase in utility rates.

Slagle has a class action suit pending against General Telephone Co. of Ohio on behalf of its 300,000 subscribers in Ohio. General Telephone Co. has publicly admitted overcharging \$14.3 million, and with related damages which utilities are required to pay, plus interest, it could mean a reimbursement to these subscribers of \$50 million for an average of \$165 each. Slagle does not agree to these figures, which he believes are too low. The Ohio Supreme Court ruled 6 to 0 in Slagle's favor, and the United States Supreme Court refused the appeal of the General Telephone Co., letting the Ohio Supreme Court decision stand.

And Adam L. Mumea, a retired railroad worker who is active in citizen's band radio work, has filed a nominating petition to be Democratic central committeeman. He says he was solicited by Democratic party officials in Mansfield. He would supplant William G. Hamilton, who was appointed to the post.

Councilman John Ray was asked by the mayor to make a thorough investigation of the village's water tower problems and how they may be solved financially. Jacobs said the new water tower needs maintenance this year.

The question arose about the feasibility of repairing the old water tower. The mayor said it is needed and suggested that councilmanic bonds be issued for a 10 year period to do the needed repairs, which were estimated (with repairs to the new tower) at about \$20,000.

She said these could be paid off from current revenues if bonds are bought locally by individuals or institutions at a fairly low interest rate, since the earnings would be tax free.

Brumbach insisted again that the solution is for the sewer fund to repay the water fund the \$17,500 that was borrowed five years ago. This could then be loaned to the water fund at a higher rate of interest than what is being paid now. The interest is five and a half per cent now. He suggested the

water fund could pay eight per cent for the use of the money.

The village has been informed through the mayor that farmers Home Administration will not approve the repayment of the \$17,500 from the sewer fund because the village has not furnished FHA with monthly records for almost two years.

At the request of Independence Chapter, Order of DeMolay, the council approved a motion for the mayor to sign a proclamation declaring Mar. 14 through Mar. 21 as DeMolay week.

The mayor read a proclamation from Plymouth, Mass., which confers honorary citizenship on all the people of Plymouth, Ohio, for the bicentennial year and includes an invitation to visit the first Plymouth in the United States.

Another invitation was received from Geraldine Knight, chairman of the bi-sequential committee of Plymouth, Mass., to visit that community during its celebration June 25-27.

I always want it to be there. The day it isn't, best we all hide for good.

We would really welcome letters about this to know what our readers think of the idea.

CHANGES MUST COME and always people will object. But eventually they take them in their stride. Some changes are good and some are not so good, so the battle is on. Somehow there can be little compromises and one person has suggested that 'America the Beautiful' be adopted officially as our second national anthem, then people would have a choice of how to start football, basketball and baseball games.

Somehow there has to be a continuity from one generation to another. We certainly cannot expect the younger one to do the same things, sing the same old songs or wear the same clothes we do. But have you noticed that some of the really good old things keep popping up after years of being buried? Even Bette Midler has gone back and dug up a couple of songs that were popular 50 years ago. Another singing group has dug up 'Chloe', which was around when I was about five, and that really goes way back.

Probably the changes that are the most welcome and no one objects to are in the kitchen. It gets better and better. But

still, here too, there is a trend to go back to old fashioned recipes. Infact, one frozen food company has gone back to the Revolutionary period to honor the bicentennial.

This recipe is not so bicentennial. It comes from a cookbook published by John Farley in England in 1787 and it is still workable today.

Start with bulk pork sausage. Form into patties that can be rolled in bread crumbs. Use a little

butter to start them off. When finished, remove them to another pan and keep warm. Pour off most of the resulting grease. Core a couple of apples, do not peel. Slice them and put the rings into the skillet to cook slowly for about five minutes. Turn once.

Then sprinkle them with a little brown sugar and cook covered until they are tender. Remove the cover so they can take on a nice glaze.

Serve with the sausage patties which are sprinkled with a little cinnamon.

The cinnamon is really an added touch and not so necessary in 1976 as it was in 1787. It covered up some very spoiled meats. If someone had invented refrigeration back then, then maybe today we wouldn't have a 'single spice'.

Can you really believe that this recipe can be so old?

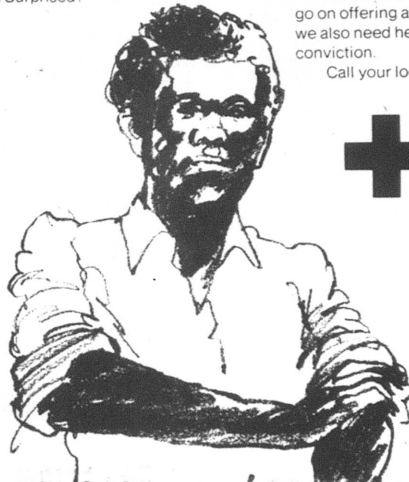

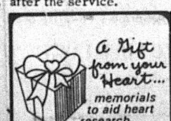

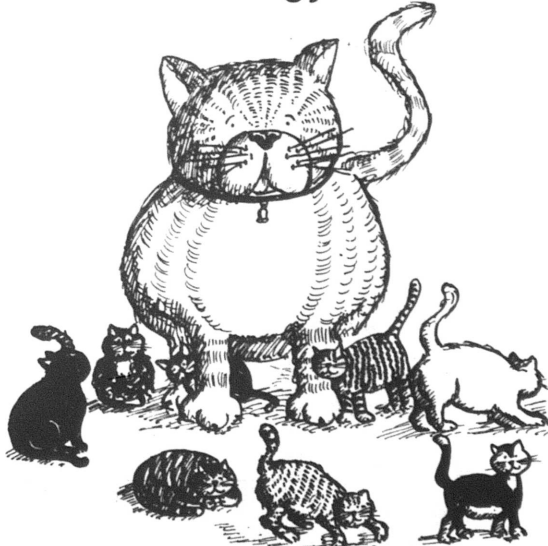

AN ORDINANCE OF THE

application for service.
Suitable application
forms shall be provided
in accordance herewith
by the Clerk of the Elec-
trical Department.
SECTION II. PAYMENT OF

Bills shall be rendered
